FEDERAL MEALS PROGRAM ANNOUNCED The Department of Agriculture has announced the income guidelines for determination of eligibility for participation in the Federal program administered at the
Groom School, according to Joyce Hutsell, Administrator of the district's program. These guidelines ar published in this issue of the published in this issue of the Groom News so that families can check for
eligibility and apply to Joyce eligibility and apply to Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager of the School.

Nutritious meals are provided by the Groom School District in accordance with the districts participation in the Federal program. "Any families who progr they may qualify for think they may qualify for the program should check the advertisement in this week's paper. Check the number of persons in the household and follow that line across to check the minimum and maximum weekly, monthly, or yearly income which can be earned.
"Applications can be completed at the school business office. In addition, each family will be given an application at the time of student enrollment.

The district takes part in the National School Lunch Program in order to provide this benefit to all district families who qualify," states Hutsell, "and it is also a benefit to the school as well as to the family who participates."

Hutsell explains that ceriain state programs are financed in proportion to the number of students who qualify for child nutrition assistance. The business manager submits monthly manager submits monthly reports to the state, and the federal assistance to the district is channeled to the district from the State agency.
"The guidelines for assistance have been slightly increased this year," concludes Hutsell. For instance, last year a family of four qualified for of four qualified for assistance if the income was
less than $\$ 1959.00$ per less than $\$ 1959.00$ per
month. This year the family month. This year the family
would qualify if the income falls below $\$ 2,066$ per month.
"Heads of households who are self-employed can determine an average monthly income by dividing the adjusted gross income from the 1990 Form 1040 from the 190 Form 1040 Revenue Service by Iternal Revenue Service by twelve. This will determine eligibility for those who do not have a monthly income."

## Public Notice

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utllity Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect ${ }^{*}$ be avallable to all PLEXAR I customers by Including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is avallable only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone rumber within or outside their PLEXARI system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avold toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be avallable to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be $\$ 4.00$ for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who recelve the service $\$ 1.50$ for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible.
