Carson County Commissioners met in regular session January 8, in the Commissioners Courtroom in Panhandle.

The Court acknowledged the notice GTE and AT&T to install buried communication lines in Precinct 2 and Precinct 4.

Danny Neusser met with the court to discuss the purchase of a stock trailer for the extension office. The court discussed the request and approved the purchase with stipulations concerning the type of trailer, color of the trailer and lettering to be printed on the trailer.

The Court approved the trade of a 4020 John Deere Tractor and \$3,000. for a 4230 tractor for Precinct 1.

John Ward and Nolan Brown of Ward-Brown and Associates met with the court and presented the design and development phase of the handicap assessable project for the courthouse. The court approved this phase of the project following the presentation.

Four individuals were selected from members who were on the last grand jury panel to serve on the grievance comittee for 1990.

A bid was presented by A. J. Wieser and Co. of \$9547. for auto liability insurance for the county. The court approved the bid.

The court also approved the purchase of a tractor for precinct 3. The bid was from Pampa Equipment in the amount of \$19,260., less \$9500. trade allowance, making the total price of the purchase \$9750.

The Carson County Personnel Policy was discussed briefly by the court. Commissioners decided to discuss the matter in more detail at the next meeting.

Anyone interested in purchasing windbreak trees from the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District should do so as soon as possible. Many of the species are beginning to sell out. However, there are still several types to choose from, including: Austrian Pine, Ponderosa l'ine, Redcedar, Honey Locust, Russian Olive, Sandcherry, Pecan, Osage Orange, Caragana, Cotoneaster and Willows.

Deadline for placing an order is March 9, 1990 and order forms may be obtained by calling 665-175 or come by the District office which is located at the Gray County Courthouse Annex on East Frederic. To be assured of receiving the desired trees, orders should be made soon.

The District also sells drip irrigation supplies, staking flags and flagging tape.

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
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Kick-Off Of Vote 90 Campaign

Promising a patriotic, upbeat campaign that should "capture the attention of Texans," Secretary of State George S. Bayoud Jr. has announced the kick-off of Vote '90-the state's 1990 election year voter registration-education drive.

"We hope this campaign will make Texans stand up, take notice and feel proud about their state," said Bayoud, Texas' chief elections officer.

"Our aim is to remind every one how important it is to participate in the democratic process by voting," Bayoud said. "We are

directing our message at those people who for too long have been standing on the sidelines watching."

In a major, related announcement, Bayoud said, the award-winning, nationally recognized advertising agency, GSD&M of Austin, has agreed to donate its creative talent to help in the Vote '90 effort.

GSD&M has helped develop the campaign's slogan and theme, "Vote 90. Every One Matters," Bayoud said.

"It is short, simple and to the point," Bayoud said. "In a nutshell, I think it captures the essence of our

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
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message-that every one's vote can and does make a difference."

GSD&M also will supervise production of the campaign's public service announcements.

The main goals of Vote '90, Bayoud said, are to register new voters and increase turnout. Of the state's currently estimated 12.4 million eligible voters, about 8.2 million or 66 percent are registered. Nationally, about 68 percent of eligible voters are registered.

Texas voters in 1990 will elect a U.S. senator, governor, lieutenant governor and hundreds of other statewide and local officeholders. The Democratic and Republican party primary elections are March 13, while the general election is Nov. 6.

Historically in Texas, voter registration and turnout rates in gubernatoirial election years drop from the previous presidential election year.

In 1986-the last time Texans elected a governoronly 47 percent of those who were registered turned out at the polls in the general election. In Texas' 1986 primary elections, a 21 percent turnout rate was recorded. Of the state's 11.8 million eligible voters in 1986, about 7.3 million, or 62 percent, were registered.

The 1986 numbers were down from the 1984 presidential election year. In 1984, 68 percent ofd those Texans who were registered turned out at the polls in the general election. In the 1984 primaries, the turnout rate was 26 percent. Of the state's 11.4 million eligible voters in 1984, 7.9 million, or 69 percent, were registered.

In 1988, a 36 percent turnout rate was recorded in the primaries with a 66 percent turnout in the general election. Sixty-seven percent, or 8.2 million, of the state's 12.2 million eligible voters were registered in 1988.

In August of even-number years, usually about 10 percent of the total number of Texas' registered voters are purged, or removed, from the registration rolls because they have moved and failed to notify their local voter registrar of their new address.

"My goal is to try and keep pace with the 1988 presidential election year numbers," Bayoud said. "I want to put a halt to the historical trend of fewer registered voters and smaller turnouts in gubernatorial election years. I think we can do much, much better in 1990."

Bayoud said the Vote '90 campaign initially will promote voter registration for the March 13 primary elections. The deadline tor Texans to register to vote in that election is Feb. 11. To obtain a voter registration application, call your local voter registrar or the Secretary of State's office at 1-800-252-VOTE (8683).

The Vote '90 campaign will include a series of public service announcements produced for radio, television, newspaper, magazines and other media.

The commercials and and advertisements are now in production. Bayoud said the commercials will begin airing after the holidays as public service announcements. A song titled, "Every One Matters," also

will be part of the campaign.
"The ads, commercials
and song all are outstanding," Bayoud said. "I'm
confident that Vote '90 is
going to capture the attention of Texans."

Roy Spence, president and founding partner of GSD&M said his agency is honored to be involved in such a "worthwhile, non-partisan project."

Secretary Bayoud and his staff are putting together a full-court press to motivate the people of Texas to register and vote in the 1990 elections," Spence said.

"We applaud their efforts. And we are excited about having the opportunity to help develop a powerful, public service campaign to spread the word on the importance of voting." Spence added.

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In Texas, GSD&M probably is best known for developing the "Don't Mess with Texas" campaign for the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The firm also has done tourism ads for the Texas Department of Commerce. Among GSD&M's other clients are Southwest Airlines, Wal-Mart, Coors Beer and Sea World of Texas.

Bayoud said GSD&M should be commended for its role in the Vote '90 drive.

"There have been times when George and I have duked it out politically on whom people should vote for," Spence said. "But, we always have been totally together on the idea that everyone should get out and vote."



It is with great pleasure that I come before y ou today to sign the most hard-fought and the most significant piece of legislation to come out of the Texas Legislature in 20 years.

Clearly it's been a long haul, a tough road. Yet, despite the many obstacles put before them, the individuals with me today pushed, they prodded, they persuaded..but in the end they prevailed. What would you think if you put money in the bank every year for specific household expenses, and when you tried to withdraw it, the bank would let you have only part of what you had deposited?

That's the way our federal government is handling the money we pay into the Highway Trust Fund. Motorists all across the nation contribute to the fund through a dedicated tax on fuel. By dedicated, I mean that the money can't go to anything other than the Highway Trust Fund. Billions of dollars pour into that fund, yet in recent years the federal government has been holding back a significant portion of the money as a paper mechanism to offset the federal deficit.

Is this the reason we pay gasoline taxes?

Not in Texas. Every dollar we collect from motorists is meant to be an investment in our highway system. Nearly 77,000 miles of our roadways depend on state and federal highway dollars for maintenance and improvements. And Texas motorists travel over 46,707 bridges in the state--many of them in need of repair or replacement.

Yet Congress in order to juggle the apparent amount of the federal deficit, keeps \$14.2billion in the Highway Trust Fund instead of funneling it back to the states from which it was collected. Maintaining a needlessly high balance in the trust fund doesn't reduce the enormous federal it only serves as a smoke screen for the amount. We could be putting these unused dollars to work on our nation's highways if the federal government would cease this bookkeepling charade and release the money in the Highway Trust

It doesn't take an expert economist to see that this is a poor use of tax dollars. all we have to do is examine the important historical role highways and transportation have played in providing a healthy economy.

We're entering a new decade now--one last chance to make a mark on this century, to see our children safely into the year 2000. Highway leaders in every state have been analyzing the transportation needs of the nation from now through the year 2020. They have outlined a sound plan that will update and upgrade our existing transportation network so that it can meet future needs.

In less than two years, authorization for the Highway Trust Fund expires. The future of this very important source of mobility funding is at stake. The American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials proposed in early December that the

highway trust fund be made permanent, and that we expand our nation's transpportation programs in the coming decades. An increase in federal highway dollars is needed to accomplish this.

The AASHTO plan contains a number of other solid points, all of which we on the Texas highway commission support. But none is as critical as the future of the Highway Trust Fund. The success of the Interstate system in the past 30 years is clear evidence that fuel taxes are best used to improve and maintain a mobile

Rather than requiring a tax increase, in its initial years the AASHTO plan could be funded simply by putting to use the highway dollars that are now trapped in a budgetary sleight of hand. These dollars would generate more jobs, expand the nation's mobility network, and boost our national economy.

AASHTO's plan would return to Texas aditional federal funds each year, beginning with about \$350 million in 1992. By 1995, we would get about \$1.9 billion a year from the federal government double the amount we now

Just how critical is this money to our Texas? We have identified more than \$82 billion in highway needs for the next 20 years. At our carrent funding level, only about 60 percent of those needs can be met. An additional \$350 million a year would boost that projection to 71 percent.

We can either spend the last decade of this century giving a 100 percent effort to our future, or we can do two-thirds the job we need

to, and limp into the year 2000 unprepared.

We could use fancy political phrases to talk about this issue, but let's call a spade a shovel--it's time to stop using the Highway Trust Fund to artifically reduce the federal deficit.

civic Every community leader in Texas should give Congress a clear message; make the Highway Trust Fund permanent, and remove it from the unified federal budget.


