## Practice Begins For Tigers

"Two A Days" as they are affectionately called, began last week for Groom football players. Head Coach Lott announced that 29 players reported for practice.
This will be Groom's return to 11 man football after a 6 year absence.
Groom, Valley and several other schools lost their six-man football status when the cutoff mark for six-man football was lowered to 79 -and-below. Groom and Valley reported enrollment figures greater than 79 , but less than the old cut-off limit of 85 .
Relief may soon be in sight for these schools that were re-classified from six-
man to 11 -man football teams for the next two years by the UIL.

Bill Farney, the director of athletics for the University Interscholastic League, said there is a proposal to raise the sixman cut-off figure to 85 . Farney met with sports writers recently at the Texas High School Coaches High School Coaches Association summer clinic. The proposal also would allow a school to remain in six-man for one more realignment period should its enrollment climb as high as 95 students due to an unusually large class or two. unusually large class or two. returned for a least two service station along the different surgeries and I especially remember a large family from Illinois who had several members to return at different times for treatment or surgery.
These victims, though unwilling in the beginning, found excellent medical treatment as well as friendly, caring atmosphere. Many Many times a patient's relatives would be housed by the area residents while they recovered.
"Down home" treatment made Groom a place that was remembered for the goodwill it promoted and not the fateful events that happened to it's passersby.

ship, President Nixon stayed on the Arlington the night prior to the splashdown; mingling in amongst many of the crewmen, shaking hands and visiting many of the sailors, Jack included.
Not many crewmen slept that night, anticipating the recovery of the capsule.
After a majestic descent the command module itself set down in full view of the Arlington sailors a scant 3.2 miles from the ship.
"To be part of this history as it unfolded, will always fill me with great joy," said Mr. Syfrett.

Remember Road Safety
The Texas Department o Public Safety State Troopers are asking all drivers to begin thinking about the safety of our school children as the beginning of a new school year commences.

"Many youngsters are attending school for the first time and others might be going to a different school where they are unfamiliar with local traffic conditions."
Another problem is that during the summer vacation some drivers have gotten alert for both school beng and school buses. and school buses. "Every year there appears to be an unnecessary rash of accidents caused by drivers who fail to follow safe driving habits for a stopped school bus," Snider stated.
Texas State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that is stopped to load or unload students, to also stop until the school bus driver has turned off the flashing red lights. This law applies unless the vehicle is separated from the bus by a divided highway with a median strip.
Just because most of the children will be in school, we must not forget the preschoolers who will still be playing in the residential areas. Remember, drive as if you had a child in and around school areas because someone has!
