Warren Chisum, Representative to the

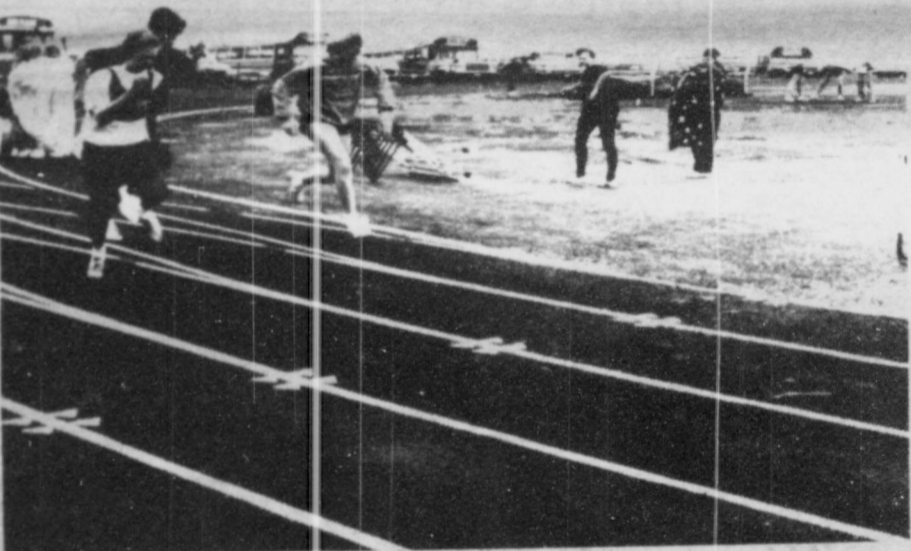
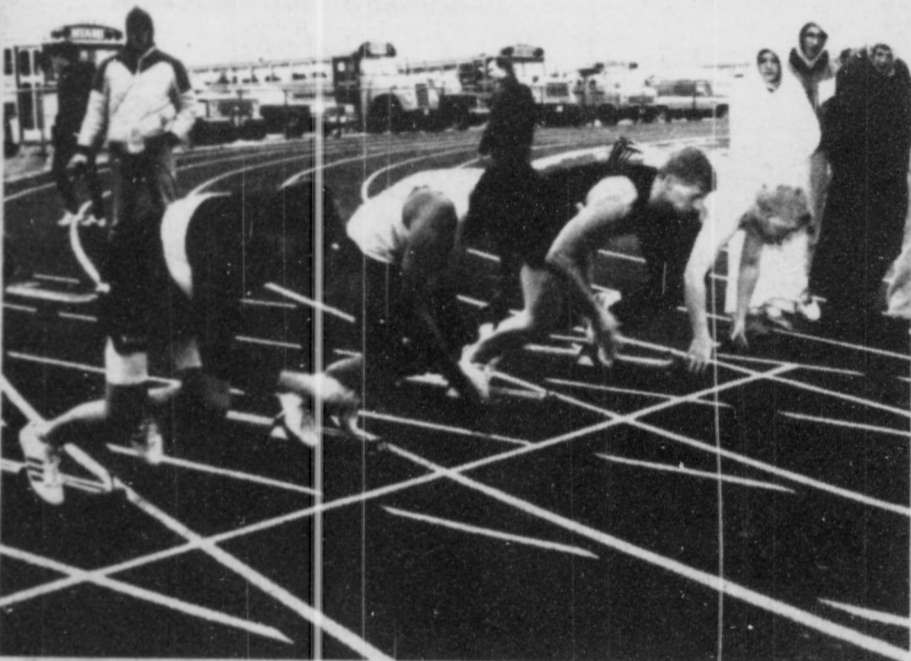
House, will do the honors for the Old 66 Museum. He will present a resolution passed through the House of Representatives to commemorate the opening of the Museum.

City Accepting Bids On Extension Of Water Line

McLean City council met Tuesday in regular session with all members present. visitors included Joe Gamble, Dwight Brandt, Garth Thomas, Mrs. Scott Shirley, Laverne Back, Ruth Basham, Mr. and Mrs. Monty Joiner, Doyle Lee, F. J. Hess, Terri Hall, Bob Glen and Stella Lee.

The minutes of the February meeting were read and approved.

Harold Smith moved to postpone work on the ceiling and wall of City Hall until a later date due to lack of funds.

Bids will be accepted for water line service to the Bybee property and the new Post Office and the cost of boring under I-40. Bids will be opened at the april 11th meeting. The vote was unanimous.

Bids for seal coating were

opened and are as follows: Appian Corp. \$23,335.61; G. W. James, Inc. \$19,837.63; E. D. Baker Corp \$19,939.50; and Lewis Construction Co. for \$17,679.66. The Council bid from Lewis Construction.

In an unanimous decision the council voted to make Delbert and Ruth Trew Honorary Citizens of McLean.

A resolution supporting the expansion of the Pantex Plant was adopted.

A discussion was held concerning use of the landfill. In a motion made by Dalton, seconded by Bybee, no fee will be charged for its use the next three weeks. The attendant will keep the landfill open on Sunday 2-4 p.m. in addition to the normal hours. The vote was split

with Dalton, Bybee and Smith voting for the motion while Bailey and Billingsley were against.

Mike Bybee was on the agenda but did not appear.

Mr. McAnear is trying in clean-up campaign to get the south side of his building painted.

The billboard the city is trying to obtain was tabled until more information is available.

Another split decision occurred in the purchase of lots 11-30 of Block 30 from Edward Mechek for \$2,000.00. All were in favor except Bailey who voted against

The board unanimously approved to pay the bills. The meeting adjourned at 8:35 p.m.

School Board Renews Contracts For 1991-92

McLean School Board met in regular session last week. Superintendent Rex Peoples resigned as stated in last weeks article.

In other business, the school board employed all teachers seeking re-employment for the 1991-92 school year and voted on the board of directors for the Region XVI Education Service Center.

The board also: Agreed to pay an additional insurance claim of \$175.90 to Dale Glass. The claim was one not paid when the insurance company, Educators Group Health trust, went bankrupt several years ago.

Voted to advertise for bids for a 72-passenger

school bus.

Adopted a resolution supporting the proposed Pantex expansion.

Had a brief discussion over discipline techniques.

Heard the business manager's report, which included approval of checks, the February financial statement and tax assessor's report, a report on delinquent tax collections, and the February cafeteria report.

The board also discussed a list of items that will need budgetary attention in the future.

All members of the school board were present for the meeting, which lasted about three hours.

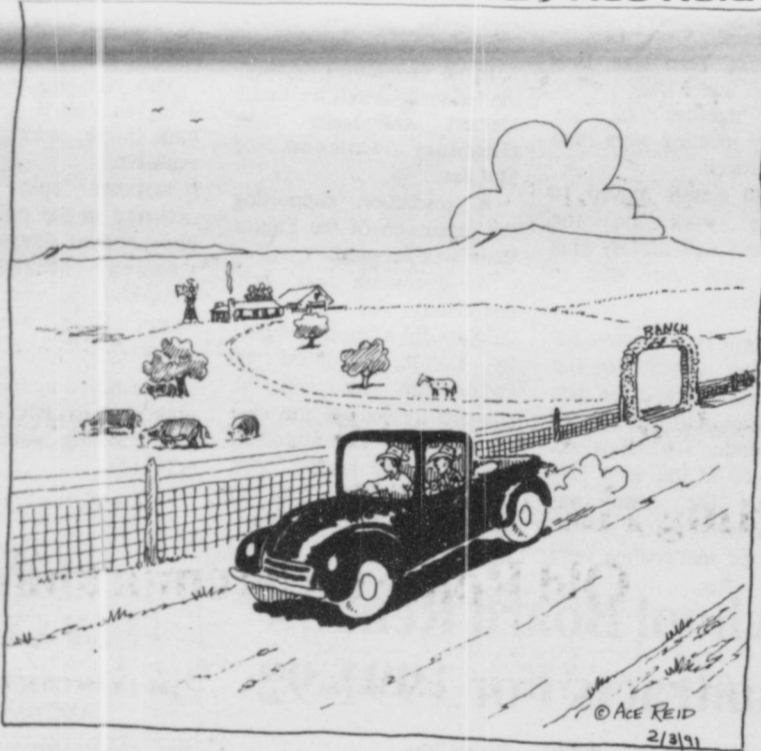
Proceeds from the cookbook sales will go toward the many benevolences of the United Methodist Church.

**Mrs. Winfred Price
McLean School
Teacher 1942-51**

This is continuation of recognition of Pre 1951 teachers.

Winfred Price-Mrs. Price taught in McLean High School from 1942 to 1945. She had taught earlier elsewhere but following her marriage had not planned to teach in McLean. Many teachers, however, had entered military service during those years of World War II, and the McLean superintendent asked Mrs. Price to help meet the resulting need. she responded affirmatively and taught American History, Texas History, Civics, Social Studies and Economics. Mrs. Price recalls that the war situation resulted in the high school having a lady principal, which in that era was quite out of the ordinary.

In addition to her teaching duties, Mrs. Price served as a junior class sponsor, and helped with the junior play and the junior-senior banquet

American history was a required subject and Mrs. Price recalls that a number of upper classmen who had

put off taking it earlier were in her classes, along with the freshmen and

sophomores. This helped increase the range of her acquaintance with the students. Mrs. Price says that she greatly enjoyed the opportunity that teaching gave her to know so many of the local kids.

When the war ended, however, she thought the time had come for her to resign. The superintendent did not agree. For one thing, he noted a raise in salary was in prospect this in contrast to the low pay that pervaded during the war. He advised that she should teach awhile longer to enjoy it. Mrs. Price, though, elected not to do so.

Catherine Weaver-Mrs. Weaver began teaching in McLean in 1946 and continued to do so for thirty years. She recalls that as a very young pupil she had loved her teacher, a Miss Thompson, so much that one day after coming home from school she told her parents that she was going to be a teacher like Miss Thompson. Mrs. Weaver says she never varied from that decision.

Her teaching prior to

1951 was done in the old west side of town school. Her main subject the first year was geography, but when the science teacher, a Mr. Bodenhammer, became principal, she took his place. One year Mrs. Weaver had sixty students in her sixth grade science class. Desks had to be scooted close together, and there was little aisle or unoccupied space.

Toward the end of her tenure in the old school Mrs. Weaver had plans to convert a part of her science room into a "Science Museum". The kids helped her paint apple crates to be stacked one on another and used as display cases for the exhibits they made, on which would be otherwise obtained. The move to the new school though came before the museum could become a major attraction on Route 66.

Every so often the school would have a tornado drill and teachers would practice shepherding assigned classes of kids to designated places and shelters such as storm cellars and home basements in locations as nearby as possible. One day, Mrs. Weaver recalls, the gong sounded an actual tornado warning. She responded by getting her assigned flock of

kids of out of the building as quickly and orderly as possible, and aboard a school bus for transportation to their shelter. So many parents had rushed to school for their kids, however, that the bus was hemmed in by the traffic and crowd and could not move. Mrs. Weaver accordingly had to get the kids off the bus and hurry with them on foot several blocks to a designated basement. It was raining and everyone became thoroughly drenched.

It was always very gratifying for Mrs. Weaver to see her students learning, and in junior high attending science fair, and often winning honors. In 1963, Mrs. Weaver was chosen to attend a six weeks all-expense paid National Science Foundation Institute for Teachers of Science and Mathematics at Texas Christian University. She retired from teaching at the end of 1975-76 term.



Senior Overnight Trip Request Denied By Board

The Groom School Board met in its regular monthly session last Tuesday night. Also in attendance were a large crowd of parents and teachers. They were Judy Miller, Diane Meaker, Mike Meaker, Bill Riley, Frances Payton, Kenneth Payton, Ronnie Fields, Linda Fields, Mary Howard, Betty Rae Brown, Marcia Conrad, Connie Riley, Mike Conrad, Jeffery Fields, Katonia Meaker, Sherrie Weinhiemer, Brent Payton, Robert Miller, Susan Babcock, Heather Brown, Gary Britten, Sharon Britten, Jolee Burger, Brian Baker, John Alan Homen, Susan Burgin, Steve Hutsell, Debra Addy, Junior sponsor Donna Forbes, Senior Sponsors Buck Burk and Janetta Lamb.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Senior students, sponsors and parents led a discussion on plans the seniors had made for their

Senior Field Trip. They proposed a trip to San Antonio. They planned to leave Amarillo at 6:45 and return at approximately 11:30 the next day, have lunch in Amarillo, arriving back at Groom about 4:00.

The seniors had a unique opportunity to earn an unusually large amount of money this year. They bid on painting the old Conway Church and received the bid. The group spent their Thanksgiving vacation working on the building. Therefore they could afford to take the opportunity to explore as much of San Antonio as possible.

The Administration opposed the trip as it did not fit into the guidelines set in the policies of the school regarding such trip. The current policy stated that field trips could be taken up to 50 miles away. The board in the past had given one time permission to other senior classes to be gone overnight. The class

of 90 was allowed to attend a lock-in held at a bowling ally in Dallas.

One of the main concerns administrators had was that if they allowed this class to stretch the limits of the policy to this degree -- where would it end. They feared that the next class would ask for even more. How would another class raise the kind of money that this particular class had raised was also an issue.

It seems that some businesses were concerned that they would be asked to help support some type of fund raising event in the future to allow another class to take the same type of trip.

Representatives of the Senior Class felt that theirs was a one time opportunity. The kind of fund raising that they utilized did not hurt the community, nor was it necessarily true that other classes might feel the need to compete with them.

As the discussion wore on, a second proposal was presented to the board. It included the following:

1:30 - 6:00 Hemisphere, River Theatre, Lone Star Brewery, Ripley's Museum, Pioneer Mills, Sea World, as time permits.
6:30 - Arrive at airport
7:45 - Depart San Antonio

The Board voted unanimously in favor of this proposal. The original policy, however, was not rewritten and remains as is.

Junior Class Officers and their sponsor presented the rules for their Jr. Sr. Prom. Principal Babcock reminded students and visitors that the school does not sponsor dances, as such, but makes an exception in allowing the "Prom". The rules will be as follows:

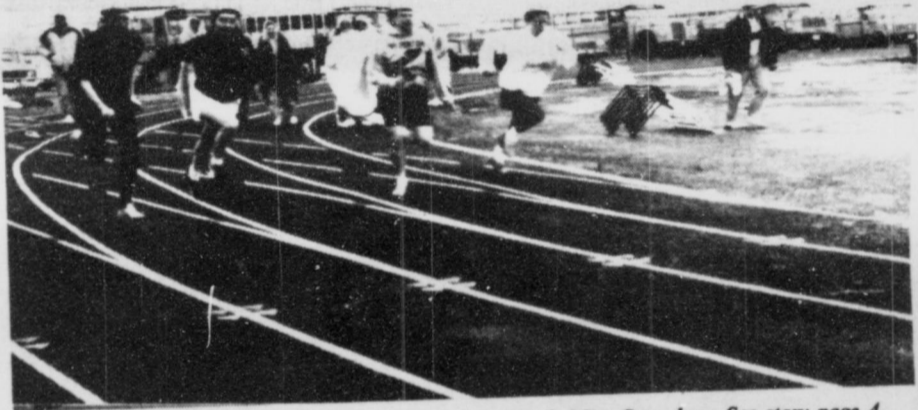
Prom Rules

5. Junior Class Sponsors and chaperons for the dance will be \$5.00 each.
6. Smoking and other use of tobacco will not be allowed.

Marie Conrad won the meter run with a time of 2:50.22.

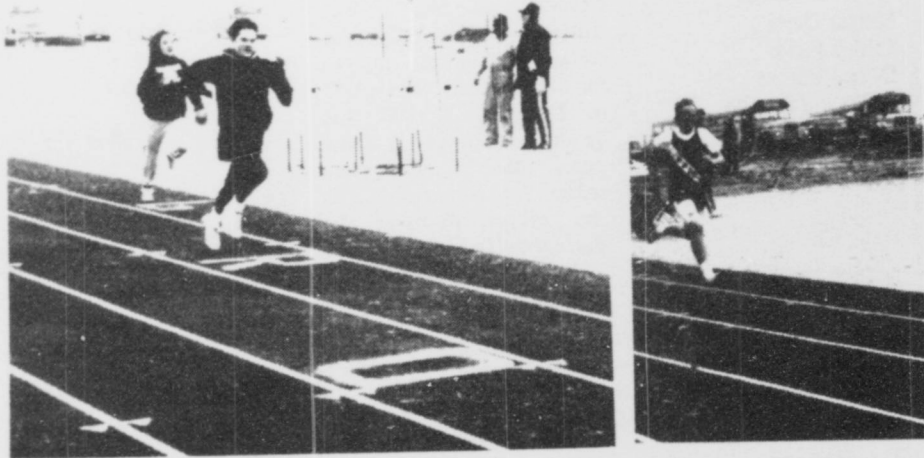
800 meter relay team, Lesa Sweatt, Karen Babcock, Melinda Burgin and Shannon Fields won first place with time of 2:02.49.

In 1991-92, the TILF expects to award an estimated 480 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$590,000. The TILF funds are made

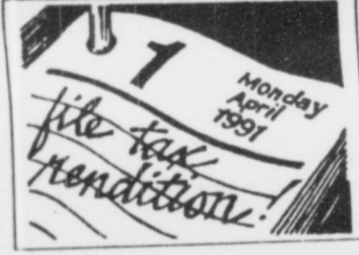

PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS—



RENDER YOUR PROPERTY

A **rendition** is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1991. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar form.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district wants a higher value for your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for

paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

- You can also file a *report of decreased value*, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1990. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1991.

The last day for filing or post-marking 1991 renditions is Monday, April 1. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the April 1 deadline.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below.

Sheriff's Office Personnel

Approved by By Commissioners

Sheriff Terry Timmons met with county commissioners Monday morning, March 11, and reported some changes in his department personnel. Tim Taylor has resigned his deputy position and Ray Davis has been promoted for jailer/dispatcher to fill the vacancy. Cathy Stephens has been employed as jail-dispatcher.

Commissioners approved an annual salary of \$19,152 for Davis and \$12,499 for Stephens.

A committee of local officials and personnel will be appointed in the next few weeks' to execute the road marking plan. Sheriff Timmons will contact

mayors of cities in the county to discuss the plan and selection of personnel.

Roselius also reminded the Court that an exercise to test the county Emergency Management procedure will be held Friday morning, March 1, at 9:00 o'clock. The simulated emergency will involve a ruptured pipe value in Skellytown.

Wanda Hood, County emergency Management Coordinator, received an certificate of recognition for completion of the courses in Professional Development Series in Emergency Management.

A letter from High Plains Food Bank was received, thanking the court for financial support from the county this year. The Food bank is a non-profit organization that supplies food to other non-profit organizations. By donations from various entities, The Food Bank is able to distribute \$20 worth of food for every dollar spent to operate the Bank. Commissioners also approved a contract for data processing service in the tax office.
