Lewis Killed In Crop Dusting Accident NW Of Panhandle

A Panhandle man and nephew of Alice Kuehler, died last week when his crop duster crashed in western Carson County.

Andrew Lewis, age 33, crashed his plane after becoming tangled in power lines. The fire that ensued burned 500 acres. It is unknown if Lewis died as a result of the crash or the fire.

Lewis owned his own

business. The crash is currently under investigation by the Federal Aviation Administration.

The downed power lines disabled about half of Amarillo's water wells and about 87 Southwestern Public Service customers.

Services were held for Lewis on Friday at St. Theresa's Catholic Church in Panhandle.

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
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

Dear Editor:

Because of a lack of moisture throughout the southern United States, many states are tinderboxes for wild fires. Because the vegetation is so dry and easily being set fire through lightning, sparks, tossed cigarettes, burning trash, and other acts of care essness, that caused many thousands of acres of grassland. forests, and crops and structures have been and are being destroyed, cannot believe that Carson County is one of a very few counties that did not ban the sale and use of fireworks.


This Sunday, our firefighters and lawmen were called to put out a grass fire caused by someone playing with fireworks west of Panhandle.

The years also brought many repeat omers. "O.J. customers. fascinated people with the way he could remember where every item in the store was."


