Brumley Finishes Historic Project



Johnny Brumley has just finished an interesting project. an early oil tanker. He started on it last summer when it was found it in the sand hills near Gage, Oklahoma. All the wood had rotted and had to be reproduced in order to fit in its special place. He had Tom Black Sandblasting and Painting in Pampa to sandblast the metal and paint it. After that he began assembling the parts that he disassembled some six or eight months ago. At times it was a challenge to remember what went where and how it fit. The wagon belongs to Eddie and Judy Longhofer near Canadian. They have a high quality wagon collection.

Most of the eastern U.S. oil fields were in rugged terrain which required staunch wagons to haul heavy equipment. This wagon is no exception. It has heavy duty springs that would support twice its load. The t an k h as three compartments, one for gas, one for kerosene and one for oil. *Polarine* was

division of the oil Standard Oil of New York. Standard Oil was forced to break up into 33 component companies in 1911. A number of them, alone or in combination. leading eventually to nine major brands, would eventually market gasoline. The breakup of Standard would thus coincide with the development of the retail gasoline station and related marketing efforts that would introduce gasoline brands to worldwide motorist. Polarine was another of the shared Standard trademarks, used by the other divisions for their motor oils.

Kramer Wagon Builders located in Oil City, PA, and dates back to the 1860's built many tankers like this one. This tanker was popular around 1907 when the automobile was to be the market for the product it hauled. Until now the tanker was used to deliver kerosene for heating fuel that replace coal stoves. It can be said that this tanker was a "transition

piece" for it delivered oil and fuel by horse drawn means for the automobile. Not for long because in 1918 companies mounted tanks on truck chassis. As the means of transport changed heavily to motorized vehicles the companies had to build different tanks to fit the motorized chassis, thus the end to the horse drawn tanker except for those who could not afford the motorized chassis

In the 1890's the tank wagons were usually pulled by one horse, two and even three horses depending on the size of the tank and weight of the load. This tanker required two big mules because of its weight. When this tanker was popular, major companies such as Standard and its affiliates had large departments overseeing the bulk marketing of products by tank wagons. The usual daily sales and delivery radius from the station was more or less 12 to 15 miles, but distances such as 20 miles or more were sometimes undertaken



The main span of the tank wagons only lasted about 30 years or a little more except for a few diehards.

A piece of history has been restored that gave way and at the same time served the needs of the newly invented internal combustion engines. It would be interested what this old tanker would say if it could talk. An interesting project for our friend, Johnny Brunly! We are all looking forward to the next one. Card Of Thanks Dear Friends,

ELDERLY HOMEOWNERS MAY DEFER PROPERTY TAXES

Texans aged 65 or older may postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes. They may take advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral" by signing an affidavit at the Carson County Appraisal District.

This special form of tax relief also halts a lawsuit filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's home, according to Donita Davis, chief appraiser of the Carson County Appraisal District. "To stop a delinquent tax suit", Davis said, "the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.'

"If the affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes,' Davis said.


Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home.

Davis stressed that the tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home, it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and interest of 8 percent per year continue to add up.

She said, "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns and lives in the home, the taxes become due. If the taxes are not paid, taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred taxes and interest."

There is no penalty on the delinquent taxes during the deferral time. However, filing the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties that were already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, a taxing unit may charge an added penalty if the account goes to a delinquent tax attorney. Tax deferral forms are available at the appraisa

district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Davis said. For more information, taxpayers may contact the Carson County Appraisal District, at 102 S Main or at 806-537-3569


A business meeting will be held in the BAC from 11:30 a.m. to noon followed by a break for lunch at a restaurant of your choice.
