## PROPOSITION NO. 1

ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that rize the Texas Higheral law may autho nating Board to issue genation Coord bonds of the state in an ceeding $\$ 300$ million to finance educa tional loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows;
"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of $\$ 300$ million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

## PROPOSITION NO. 2

## ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would aualorem taxation the property of an orga nization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organi zation as defined by general law. The identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, als know as the Masonic Lodges, as the pri mary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Cor gress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

## PROPOSITION NO. 3

## ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not vided by current law. In addition, the vided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment of $\$ 200$ million of the $\$ 500$ milproceeds in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural microenterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agrimaltural products."

## PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two
or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the prop-
erty. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resoluto 46 would allow the lending institution fo foreclose on the homestead property defaulted on the partition if the purchaser proposed amendment would adlow the the proposed amendment would allow the renally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and
