Where: McLean (80 miles east of Amarillo) Details: 9 holes, Par 35, 2,802 yds.
Price: Technically $\$ 0$, but you should make a donation to the blue box next to No.
On the course: "Muhclane" is a crusty ranch town that surprisingly exudes little charm despite its downtown restoration and dowalgic location on the nostalgic location on the old U.S. Rt. 66

McLean's course is easy and get the ball pasture golf at its finest rolling on the firm and has the last sand fairways. For approaches, greens in Texas. The "clubhouse" is a small shed houses tools and scorecards. It sits just Ieft scorecards. 1 which of the No I Fessive wiew offers an impressive view of the sloping farmland fairways that roll through the wheat fields beiow.
Only nature waters the fairways, so the recommended play for most shots is a low, hardmost shots line drive with whatever club gives you the best chance to execute that shot. The wind can be relentless, gusting up to 25 mph on nice days and up to 60 mph when cold fronts loom large over the plains. loom large over the plains. It's nice that the holes are short.

As for strategy, swing
don't worry about pinpointing accuracy but rather focus on just getting he ball into the 30 -foot diameter sandpits. The sand greens are no longer hard packed for roll making it necessary to use, the string at the pin to measure the distance to your ball before placing it on a strip of outdoor carpet that serves as the true putting surface
No. 9 is the best hole, a ong par-5 that rolls downhill into one of the widest fairways in Texas, then chutes back up around few trees to the course' only grass green, which was installed in recent years and is cut with a regular mower.

The number of students esrolled in Groom School reached a 25 year low poist of 107 students last year. Thiags were beginaing to look pretty grim.

However, there may be a light at the end of the mancl. The school has eajoyed a steady increase in it's enrollment and is sow up to 121 shadents. Several families that seem to have no family ties to Groom have moved here for various reasons includiag Groom's location along I-40, high schievemest on student test scores, and a deaire to
live a vay from Amarillo. One always expects a certain amount of families to wast to return home, but to survive, Groom is aiso very interested in attraci ing new people.

This spring, GISD will graduated 4 students will graduated 4 students
from ligh school. For the from ligh school. For the officials are expecting a
bigfer crop of kinder gartners than what they lost in seniors. At least 7 students are expecisd to pre-register at the ki adergarten round-up to be leld on May 3 for the tall se nester of 2005 .
The jury is still out on what, if any, financial help will le forthcoming from the owers that be in Austin. There does not seem io be a clear plan of action from legislators on how chucation will be financsed ia the future so
the unknown is still a big factor in Groom ISD's future. One thing is almost certain... funding will at least in part, depend on enrollment.

Aside from Groom's wonderful scheol system, Groom's Economic Development Corporation has also had a hand in attracting new families. Two wonderful new homes were built in recent years as well as the giving away of several lots for trailers and moved in homes. Their home buyers assistance program has, at the very least, encouraged potestial resiGents to take a looik at Groom.
This upward tread is encouraging to all. Do your best to continue to support our school, churches, businesses and make Groom an even better place to live.

## Laws Concerning ATV's and Golf Carts Explained

By Sberiff Tasa Terry I have received several calls about the legality of the operation of scooters, go-carts, ATVs and the like on public streets. It can be a confusing issue. Without being more confusing let me explain what the law says.
As of September $1^{1,}$, 2003 the law recognizes motor assisted scocters and aeighborhood electric vehicles for limited street usage. A neighborhood electric vehicle is any electric powered vehicle that is designed to carry up to 4 persons- with a top speed of 20 to 25 MPH . Basically neighborhood electric vehicles are golf carrs. They can be driven on any street or highway with a posted speed limit of 35 MPH or less. They may cross streets or highways with a higher posted speed
limit The neighborhood elect ic vehicle mest be regis ered and have a licen e plate. The operator must have a driver's licen re and the vehicle or open tor must be covered with the required lisbility insur ance. The golif cart is also required to display a slow moving vehicle embl am .

operating conditions，has a gas or electric motor not exceeding $40 \quad$ cubic centimeters，has a deck designed to allow a person to stand or sit while operating the device，and the ability to be propelled by human power alone． Like a golf cart，scooters can be operated on any street or highway with a posted speed limit of 35 MPH or less．

A scooter operator is not required to have a driver＇s license，liability insurance，registration， doesn＇t have to display a slow moving vehicle emblem，and doesn＇t have to be inspected．The operator has to comply with all traffic laws that apply to bicycles（spoed limits，stop signs，tum signals，etc．）

An ATV is a vehicle such as a Mule or any 4 whecier．They can be operated on a public street or highway that is not an interstate if they are being used in councotion with agricattural operstions． They can only be so operated daring the daytime．The operstor mast have a valid driver＇s license，illuminate the ATV＇s hendlights and taillights，attach a triangular crange flag to a 8 －foot－ple on the back of the ATV，and travel no more than 25 miles from the point of origin．

I have not addressed mopeds．They do require a license，which can be obtained at the age of 15 ． They must also be registered and have liability insurance．

Friday (4/15): Deputy Trevor McGill picked up a 26 year old female from the Hutchinson County Jail where she was being held on

Instead we emailed the information and photo graphs of the trailer to area law enforcement agences. Deputy Rick Armstrong and Sgt. Heath Cates are investigating the theft. A suspect has been charg and is currently being held on separate charg's in Gray County.

all know our system of justice is based on the premise of innocent until proven guilty. Because of this premise I do not think that is fair or just to release names of accused persons until they have had their day in court and are convicted of an offense This is one of several instances where I find my personal feelings run contrary to the letter of the law. The Texas Public Information Act states that certain information including names of persons arrested, cannot be withheld. Therefore when formal. written, open records request are received my office has no choice but to comply, if the information qualifies for release. Even though I find myself in disagreement with our local papers over this issue, I appreciate their willingness to work with me and also their willingness to allow me to publist this weekly report.

(Editor's note: While we understand Sheriff Terry's concerns for those who are arrested in error, this is not a matter of choice on our part. It is one of the many checks and balances provided by law
and improper actions out of our public offices. For instance, take the case of the former Gray County District Attorney. The law says that public has a right to know that he was being charged with a crime. Had the law not been in place, and if the people in power were unscrupulous: his arrest might have been covered up and voters covered up and voters
would have never known. would have never known.
What if no one knew Michael Jackson had been arrested for child mostestation? Considering how long it takes for "justice" to be done these days, it can be months before a case goes to trial and while we too, subscribe to "innocent until proven guilty," we have an obligation inform the public.

The Groom News has tried very hard, with the cooperation of the sheriff's office and the District Clerk's office to let our readers know what happens on cases after the arrest is made, by publishing the results from indictments and district court If anyone has been arrested mistakenly, we are happy to give them the equal space to tell their story after the charges are dropped.)

Texans aged 65 or older may postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes. They may take advantage of a tax option cailed "over65 deferral" by signing an affidavit at the Carson County Appraisal District.

This special form of tax relief also halts a lawsuit filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's home, according to Donita Davis, chief appraiser of the Carson County Appraisal District. "To stop a delinquent tax-suit", Davis said, "the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending."
"If the affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Davis said.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home.

Davis stressed that the tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home, it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and interest of 8 percent per year continue to add up. She said, "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns and lives in the home, the taxes become due. If the taxes are not paid, taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred taxes and interest."

There is no penalty on the delinquent taxes during the deferral time. However, filing the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties that were already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, a taxing unit may charge an added penalty if the account goes to a delinquent tax attorney.

Tax deferral forms are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witressed by a notary public," Davis said. For more information, taxpayers may contact the Carson County Appraisal District, at 102 S Main or at $806-537-3569$.
