

Colds Vs. Allergies

McLean's course is pasture golf at its finest and has the last sand greens in Texas. The "clubhouse" is a small shed that houses tools and scorecards. It sits just left of the No. 1 tee, which offers an impressive view of the sloping farmland fairways that roll through the wheat fields below.

Only nature waters the fairways, so the recommended play for most shots is a low, hard-running line drive with whatever club gives you the best chance to execute that shot. The wind can be relentless, gusting up to 25 mph on nice days and up to 60 mph when cold fronts loom large over the plains. It's nice that the holes are short.

As for strategy, swing

easy and get the ball rolling on the firm fairways. For approaches, don't worry about pinpointing accuracy but rather focus on just getting the ball into the 30-foot diameter sandpits. The sand greens are no longer hard packed for roll, making it necessary to use the string at the pin to measure the distance to your ball before placing it on a strip of outdoor carpet that serves as the true putting surface.


No. 9 is the best hole, a long par-5 that rolls downhill into one of the widest fairways in Texas, then chutes back up around a few trees to the course's only grass green, which was installed in recent years and is cut with a regular mower.





The next meeting for the Pioneer Study Club will be May 5 at Elizabeth's.



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

Enrollment Is Looking Upwards As The 2005 Session Ends At GISD

Groom School has seen some hard times. Decreased funding from the state, sagging property values and a dwindling population have been the harbingers of bad tidings during the past few years. The number of students esrolled in Groom School reached a 25 year low point of 107 students last year. Things were beginning to look pretty grim.

However, there may be a light at the end of the tunnel. The school has enjoyed a steady increase in it's enrollment and is now up to 121 students. Several families that seem to have no family ties to have no family ties of groom have moved here for various reasons including Groom's location along I-40, high achievement on student test scores, and a desire to

live a way from Amarillo.

One always expects a certain amount of families to want to return home, but to survive, Groom is also very interested in attracting new people.


This spring, GISD will graduated 4 students from ligh school. For the first time in many years, officials are expecting a bigger crop of kinder gartners than what they lost in seniors. At least 7 students are expected to pre-register at the kindergarten round-up to be lield on May 3 for the fall se nester of 2005.

The jury is still out on what, if any, financial help will be forthcoming from the powers that be in Austin. There does not seem to be a clear plan of action from legislators on how education will be financed in the future so

the unknown is still a big factor in Groom ISD's future. One thing is almost certain... funding will at least in part, depend on enrollment.

Aside from Groom's wonderful school system, Groom's Economic Development Corporation has also had a hand in attracting new families. Two wonderful new homes were built in recent years as well as the giving away of several lots for trailers and moved in homes. Their home buyers assistance program has, at the very least, encouraged potential residents to take a look at Groom.

This upward trend is encouraging to all. Do your best to continue to support our school, churches, businesses and make Groom an even better place to live.

Laws Concerning ATV's and Golf Carts Explained

I have received several calls about the legality of the operation of scooters, go-carts, ATVs and the like on public streets. It can be a confusing issue. Without being more confusing let me explain what the law says.

As of September 1st, 2003 the law recognizes motor assisted scooters and neighborhood electric vehicles for limited street usage. A neighborhood electric vehicle is any electric powered vehicle that is designed to carry up to 4 persons- with a top speed of 20 to 25 MPH. Basically neighborhood electric vehicles are golf carts. They can be driven on any street or highway with a posted speed limit of 35 MPH or less. They may cross streets or highways with a higher posted speed

limit The neighborhood elect ic vehicle must be regis ered and have a licen e plate. The operator must have a driver's licen e and the vehicle or oper tor must be covered with the required liability insurance. The golf cart is also required to display a slow moving vehicle

A motor assisted scooter is a self propelled device that has at least 2 wheels in contact with the ground during operation, has a braking system capable of stopping the device under typical

operating conditions, has a gas or electric motor not exceeding 40 cubic centimeters, has a deck designed to allow a person to stand or sit while operating the device, and the ability to be propelled by human power alone. Like a golf cart, scooters can be operated on any street or highway with a posted speed limit of 35 MPH or less.

A scooter operator is not required to have a driver's license, liability insurance, registration, doesn't have to display a slow moving vehicle emblem, and doesn't have to be inspected. The operator has to comply with all traffic laws that apply to bicycles (speed limits, stop signs, turn signals, etc.)

An ATV is a vehicle such as a Mule or any 4 wheeler. They can be rated on a public street or highway that is not an interstate if they are being used in connection with agricultural operations. They can only be so operated during the daytime. The operator must have a valid driver's license, illuminate the ATV's headlights and taillights, attach a triangular crange flag to a 8-foot-pie on the back of the ATV, and travel no more than 25 miles from the point of origin.

I have not addressed nopeds. They do require a license, which can be obtained at the age of 15. They must also be registered and have liability insurance.





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ELDERLY HOMEOWNERS MAY DEFER PROPERTY TAXES

Texans aged 65 or older may postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes. They may take advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral" by signing an affidavit at the Carson County Appraisal District.

This special form of tax relief also halts a lawsuit filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's home, according to Donita Davis, chief appraiser of the Carson County Appraisal District. "To stop a delinquent tax suit", Davis said, "the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending."

"If the affidavit is on file, an older homeowner

cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes,"

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home.


Davis stressed that the tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home, it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and interest of 8 percent per year continue to add up. She said, "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns and lives in the home, the taxes become due. If the taxes are not paid, taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred taxes and interest.

There is no penalty on the delinquent taxes during the deferral time. However, filing the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties that were already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, a taxing unit may charge an added penalty if the account goes to a delinquent tax attorney.

Tax deferral forms are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Davis said. For more information, taxpayers may contact the Carson County Appraisal District, at 102 S Main or at 806-537-3569.

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
