




Commandment Monument News

The McLean Housing Authority has jurisdiction over the HUD housing and the Rural Housing Development in McLean. The purpose of the housing authority is to provide housing for people who really need it.

There are 12 HUD units. There are 4 two bedroom units, 2 one bedroom units and 6 three bedroom units. All have central heat and air. They will all soon have new doors and windows.

There are 8 of the rural units. All are 2 bedroom units. The Housing Authority board voted June 5th to apply for a USDA loan to completely refurbish these units.

To apply for housing, a person needs to provide a Social Security number, a driver's license, proof of income and their job information if they are working. There is a \$10 application fee. information is verified The computer based program TENANT TRACKERS is used to verify criminal and credit history. Any person convicted of a felony cannot qualify.

Rent is based on income. If a tenant wishes to have an animal there is a \$150 pet deposit. All tenants are required to renew their lease each year.

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

While there are many details yet to be worked out, this will allow the volunteer service to take advantage of the money set aside by the County to hire a qualified person to handle daytime calls when volunteers are away at work when matched by the

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, the Texas Forest Service has determined that drought conditions exist within the county:

AND WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court has determined that circumstance present in all or part of the county create a public safety hazard the would be exacerbated by outdoor

IT IS HERERY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Carson County that all outdoor burning in the unincorporated area of the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code §352.081, or other applicable statues. This Order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on

Environmental Quality for (1) fire training: (2) public utility. natural gas pipeline or mining operations: (3) planting or harvesting of agriculture crops; (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048. Natural Resources Code, and meet the s of Section 153 047 Natural Resources Code or (5) have been granted exemptions since Jan. 3rd,2006 by action of Commissioners Court. Any person is entitled to injunctive relief to prevent the violation of a prohibition or restriction established by an order adopted under this section (g) of the Local Government Code §352.081.

This burn ban does not prohibit the use of outdoor grills or welding activities but will be restricted based on guidelines adopted by the Commissioners Court in accordance with this burn ban

In accordance with Local Government Code §352.081(h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.

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





Cause No. 3587 Eric Cause No. 3387 Enc Charles Collier pled guilty to a 2nd degree felony charge of Possession of Marijuana on May 28, 6. Judge Bryan Poff, Orded him to serve 5 2006 vears deferred adjudication and pay a \$4,000 fine well as court costs and DPS restitution

Cause No. 3034 Craig Thomas plead guilty to a 3rd degree felony possession of marijuana on October 25, 2002, and ordered to served 7 years in the Texas Department of Corrections was also ordered to pay a \$500 fine, court costs and restitution. 165 days of time alsready served were credited to his sentence. This case was heard by Judge Bryan Poff, Jr.
Cause No. 3402 Marco

Antonio Pantoja plead guilty to a 1st degree felony charge of possession of a Controlled Substance (a lesser offense than what was charged in the indictment) for cri committed on Oct crimes 2004. He was ordered to serve 10 years deferred adjudication and to pay a fine of \$15,000 on Ju by Judge David

McCoy. Cause No. 3127 - Gary Don Salazar was ordered to serve 2 years in the Texas Department of corrections for violating the terms of his deferred adjudication orders on March 20, 2003 and to pay a \$9,000 fine He was credit 74 days of time already served to his sentence by Judge Bryan Poll, Jr. This sentence will run concurrent with Carson County Cause # 3128 in which he was ordered to 10 years confinement on a 1" degree felony for possession of a Controlled Substance. The defendent plead guilty and will also pay a \$9,000 fine..

3563: Cause No. Matthew Gilpatrick plead guilty to a second degree felony of Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon on February 15, 2006 Judge Bayer, Bull 2006. Judge Bryan Poll, Jr. sentenced him to 5 years in the Texas Department of Correction and a \$1,000 fine and court costa. 140 days of time served were credited to his sentence. The defendant was also convicted of a State Jail Felony for Possession of Manijuana (a lesser charge than in the indictment) and sentenced to 2 years in a TDC State Jail Facility. This sentence is ordered to run concurrently with Carson County Cause No. #3563. 140 days of time

FOIFT Hold Seminar For Open Meetings, Open Records

Freedom The Information Foundation of Texas (FOIFT) was in Amarillo last Friday, June 9, 2006, in collaboration with the Texas Attorney General's representatives to sponsor their third Open vernment Seminar 2006.

The symposium on Access to Public Information and Open Meetings' laws was open to all public officials whether it be city council, school board. or county commission members as well as all elected officials, government employees, the general public, and representatives of the news media. The seminar was set up to develop and enhance understanding of the changing landscape of open government.

Other than that there was nobody else from our area and public entities in attendance. Public officials attending the seminar were awarded mandatory hours required of all public officials and employees as of January 2006 by the state's attorney general and the legislature. The seminar was located at the western campus of Amarillo College.

The seminar kicked off

by attendees picking up the necessary materials of the Texas Public Information Act in Texas in the morning session.

Joseph Larsen,

attorney from the Attorney General's office, spoke of the Public Information Act in Texas

Also in the morning session was a section on the cost rules presented by Attorney Hadassah Schloss. She is presently cost rules administrator for the Attorney General. Her responsibilities include developing rules for determining charges for copies of public records, reviewing and handling governmental bodies' requests for exemption from the rules, reviewing and resolving complaints of overcharges for copies of public information, and conducting and publishing results of the Biennial Open Records Report. She also co-chairs the Open Records Steering Committee. Ms. Schloss

stated cost provisions on public information are "not made up" but rather set forth by the legislature. A cost of \$40 should be the maximum charge prior to notifying the requestor.

The Freedom of Information of Texas, a non-profit 501(C)(3) organization, works to encourage, sponsor, and facilitate a greater appreciation, knowledge and understanding of the First Amendment. The FOIFT strives to preserve the freedom necessary in a democratic republic by educating the media and educating the media and legal professionals, educators, students, public and government officials, and individual citizens about their rights and responsibilities as citizens

Mr. Larsen advised to make public information

requests in writing, due to timelines. No special forms are necessary to request information officer. He said, "One cannot ignore a request." Also, a public official "cannot ask what a person wants the information for Communication is for important tool for clarification of the information being being requested because it can save everyone time and ability to get the right information being requested. Information must be released promptly. Example: arrests reports.

The afternoon session was designated by the Open Meetings laws. The Open Meetings Act was adopted to help make governmental decisionmaking accessible to the public. It requires meetings of governmental bodies to be open to the public, except for expressly authorized executive sessions and to be preceded by public notice of the

time, place and subject matter of the meeting. The Act was adopted in 1967 as article 6252-17 of the Revised Civil Statues. It has been amended many times since its enactment. The policy states, "the people in delegating authority do not give their public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know. The people insist on remaining informed so they may retain control over the instruments they have created."

Emergency meetings can be held if it is a 1) imminent threat to public safety or 2) reasonable

unforseen circumstances.
Specifically, it was explained that an agenda that posts 1) personal matters and 2) to visit with attorney, is not completely acceptable, according to the Attorney General's lawyer. A rule of thumb is 'how important is the person and would people want to hear about this matter.' "By making the agenda more specific, it would solve considerable problems," Larsen added.

Another point that Larsen explained was that on any emergency meeting where there is not enough where there is not enough time to post the required agenda, anybody, especially the news media, in the area of interest involved, should be notified by telephone or fax to meet the requirements of the Open Meeting law's the Open Meeting. The emergency meeting. The annually requests by means of a formal letter to be notified of any such emergency meetings. This was said by Attorney Larsen to be a good means of being notified by such entities

Another point by Larsen and the Attorney General's law is public officials cannot meet (by phone, etc.) of less than a quorum just for purpose to discuss public information or to take a straw vote prior to the open meeting. This is called a "Walking Quorum," just to circumvent the Open Meetings Act.
This was the final Open

Government 2006 seminar for the year. The next meeting will be held in Tyler in October.






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
