

Since the first part of June, Groom has had approximately 7 inches of rain.

On Sunday an-almost silent tornado smashed into the Howardwick community near Lake Greenbelt, only a flash from an electric transformer herald its arrival!


Liz Thompson, wife of Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson, said the sheriff's office was watching the weather after a tornado had been sighted near Groom.

"Rut the rain was so

heavy, if it hadn't been for the transformer we would have never seen it," she said. The tornado struck about 11:30 p.m. and lasted several minutes, she said.

"We belive it was the same one they sighted at Groom," she added.

The tornado cleared a half mile swath about four or five blocks long through almost the center of Howardwick, traveling from northwest to southeast. Shyness can be cured. For some people whose social phobia made people whose social pricinal made them unable to function in ordinary situations, researchers at the National Institute of Mental Health offered drug and/or psychological therapy for 12 weeks. Scientists measuring the blood cholesterol levels of youngsters not only spotted those at risk for coronary problems, they also found that many of their parents had unrecognized coronary artery disease, the Southern Medical Journal reported.

New drug, Eminase, injected right after a heart attack, halved the number of deaths in the first 30 days following, British researchers reported. Drug manufacturers are awaiting FDA approval.
