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#### Safety **Prescribed For Rural Roads**

You probably think you're snug and safe when you're driving the familiar back roads near your home. Traffic is sparse; it seems like you're the only one out there. Besides, you know every bump and dip of the road by heart.

Yet, the country roads

closest to your home are the most dangerous. Statistics show that of the 47,000 traffic deaths that occur each year in the United States, two-thirds take place in rural areas, with the majority of the deaths taking place within 25 miles of the victim's home.

What makes rural roads so much worse than city streets? Experts cite five major reasons.

1) Road characteristics and conditions. Too often, you can't see what's over the next hill or around the next bend. Country roads have steep hills, sharp curves, and blind intersections. They're apt to be narrower than town streets and highways, with loose gravel or no gravel at all.

2) Driving speeds. People drive faster on country roads than they do on city streets. According to studies, for every 10 miles an hour over 50 that you drive, your chances of being killed in a crash double. Traveling at higher speeds makes it harder to stop in an emergency. And when a high-speed crash does occur, odds of serious injury are greater.

3) A variety of vehicles. Rear-end collisions with slow moving vehicles, such as tractors and snowplows, are all too common on rural roads. Drive a safe speed so that you will have sufficient reaction should you suddenly come upon such a vehicle. Also, be sure to allow plenty of room when you overtake or pass these types of equipment, as often the roadway is narrow and the equipment wide.

4) Not wearing seat belts. You may ask, "I'm just going a few miles, what could happen?" The answer Crashes are is a lot! sudden and violent, often hurling victims through windshields, crushing them under vehicles, or dragging

Some feel seat belts are uncomfortable and inconvenient, but when you think about the discomfort and inconvenience a collision could cause, there's not much comparison.

5) It takes longer to get Sparser population and greater distance increase the odds of discovery of the accident. Someone with lifethreatening injuries, who may have been saved with immediate first-aid, may be permanently injured or may die instead.

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

#### First Veterans

**National Memorial** ANGEL FIRE, NM "In demanding justice from the government we served, we veterans simply have to become more vocal," said Gregory C. Reed.

On November 11, Reed will have a pulpit to lay that challenge on his fellow veterans, when he addresses a crowd expected to reach 400 at Veterans Day Observances November 11 at the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) Vietnam Veterans National Memorial in Angel Fire, New Mexico.

"Some powerful politicians in Washington are doing it again, talking out of both sides of their mouths about veterans," said Reed, a combatwounded Vietnam veteran and National 1st Junior Vice Commander of the

1.2-million-member DAV.
"When speaking publicly, they fill the air with praise our patriotism virtue and willingness to risk death in defense of liberty,' explained Reed. "Privately, however, in darkened rooms where deals are cut they compare us to welfare recipients and veterans' programs overzealous attempts to reduce federal spending."

Even as U.S. forces are put in harm's way in Haiti and other trouble spots around the globe, Reed said, powerful forces in Washington are attempting to dismantle programs that provide medical care and other benefits earned by

(number of feet to the nearest property lines) ie. distance to north or south property or section line. distance to east or west property or section line;

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

McCracken, Hospice Are Great Team

McLean knows Janet McCracken as the late Dr. Harold Fabian's medical assistant for the past seven years.

Those years with Dr. Fabian are ones that have significantly influenced McCracken in her newest career as a home health aide for Hospice of the Panhandle, a non-profit organization that provides care for the terminally ill, not only in McLean, but throughout the surrounding area.

Looking back on her time with Dr. Fabian, McCracken remembers the legacy this long-time McLean physician left her - humor, patience, compassion and honesty.

"If you ever wanted a good laugh, you should have seen Dr. Fabian riding a motorcycle. I always said I should have gotten a picture of that," McCracken remembers.

"A lot of people thought of him as being really gruff, but I've seen him with so many patients with children being compassionate and caring. I've seen him sit up all night with a patient holding the patient's hand while he was dying because the patient wanted him to," she says.

"I learned from Dr. Fabian. He was really honest. He always told the patient the truth. And if he couldn't handle a situation, he saw to it that his patients went where they could get help.

"He taught me to listen," McCracken adds. "It would

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look like he wasn't doing anything, but what he was doing was listening very hard to what they were saying."

These skills have helped McCracken immensely as a hospice home health aide, she says. She feels that coming to work for Hospice of the Panhandle is like finding her niche in life. "To me, it's a very rewarding profession."

"I love working with people," she explains. "I'm a people person. I get the best part of this job. I see (patients) at their worst. I see them at their best. They've got so much to give.

"I come from a large family with eight children. Caring and giving is second nature to me."

Caring and giving are foundation stones in the hospice concept of care for persons with limited life REMINDER!

persons with limited life expectancies, a concept that is celebrating its 20th anniversary in the United States during November National Hospice Month.

"I want people to be educated about hospice, to realize there are alternatives," she says. "I want them to know that hospice is not giving up. It's making the most of your last days. It's being able to tie up all the loose ends. It's support for you and your family during the time you're sick and for your family later on.

"I want people to know we can take care of so many things, the wonderful services we can provide as a non-profit organization," she says.

More and more people find hospice addresses basic human needs, physical, emotional and spiritual. This recognition of hospice's ability to meet these multiple needs allowed hospice to take root in the United States 20 years ago.

Hospice of the Panhandle was founded in August 1988 as Hospice of Pampa. However, as more and more referrals poured in from surrounding areas, the organization's services spread to nine counties adjacent to Pampa and the name was changed to Hospice of the Panhandle.



# **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.




