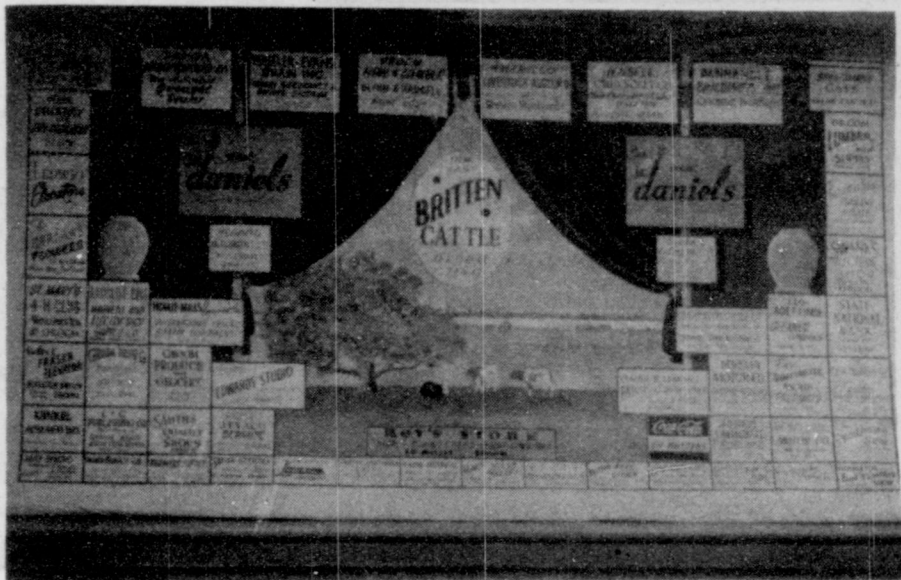

Telephone Directories To Expand Including Carson County

Responding to numerous requests for copies of the Southwestern Bell directory serving Amarillo, Southwestern Bell Yellow Pages, Inc. today announced it will expand distribution of the book to include 16 Texas Panhandle counties.

Lew Bradshaw, the company's sales manager in Amarillo, said the next edition of the directory, to be published in February 1995, will be distributed free to households and businesses in the counties of Armstrong, Carson, Dallas, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hansford, Hartley, Hutchinson, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts and Sherman.

"We're making this change because of the many requests we've received from those wanting a copy of our Amarillo directory," Bradshaw said. "This will benefit those who need the directory as an informational and shopping resource, and will provide an expanded customer base for directory advertisers."

Bradshaw said surveys of consumers in the expanded

area indicate that, while they do most of their shopping locally, they often make major purchases in the Amarillo area.

"We're just delighted with the decision by Southwestern Bell Yellow Pages to expand the directory's distribution," said Sharon Patrick, membership development coordinator for the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce.

"We've received at least 5,000 calls a year from folks wanting us to look up information. What Southwestern Bell is doing is a fine community-service effort."

Meanwhile, chambers of commerce in the expanded area have been supplied additional copies of the current Southwestern Bell Amarillo directory. Those who would like to order a copy by phone can call a toll-free number, 1-800-261-8269.

Bradshaw stressed that the expanded distribution of the Amarillo directory will not affect the publication and distribution of other Southwestern Bell directories in the area.

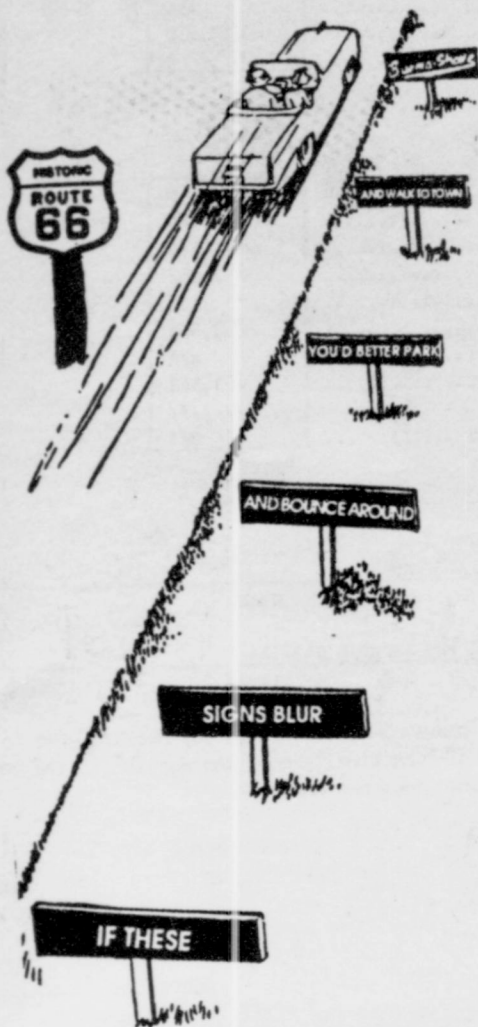

Mr. Helton was born in Jack County, Texas, and later moved with his family to Brice, Texas. During World War II, he worked for Phillips Petroleum Co. in South America. After the war, he returned home and started a propane business with his brother in Farwell, Texas.

Carson Co. Sheriff's Report

Ten persons are currently incarcerated in the Carson County Jail. All but one prisoner is being held on felony charges.

Our department completed a three-month investigation with the arrest of one subject on two counts of Sexual Indecency with a Child (a second degree felony) and one count of Aggravated Sexual Assault of a Child (a first degree felony). The investigation was made with the cooperative efforts of Children's Protective Services and the Sheriff's Department.

Cattle on the highway resulted in a one vehicle traffic accident on U.S. 60. A semi-tractor and trailer struck the animals in the early morning hours. The accident resulted in physical damage to the vehicle and destruction of several head of cattle.

The Skellytown City Marshal has requested the assistance of our department in determining the cause of a fire in an unoccupied structure in Skellytown and other circumstances surrounding

the destruction of the building. The matter is currently under investigation.

Sheriff's deputies responded to calls of a prowler armed with a weapon in Fritch. Also, in the Fritch area, our officers responded to several domestic violence reports. The Sheriff's Department is currently investigating several unrelated reports dealing with children being kept in unsafe or unhealthy dwellings or circumstances. The investigative reports on these cases are forwarded to Children's Protective Services in Pampa to determine if emergency intervention is warranted.

An Amarillo man previously indicted by a Carson County Grand Jury was featured on an Amarillo television stations consumer complaint segment affording us a better opportunity to locate and arrest the individual. The Amarillo Police Department was contacted the next day and given all information necessary to locate and arrest the subject for our department.

City Applies For Grant For Sewer Improvements

The City of McLean is facing some potentially costly problems in the future with its sewer lines and is needing to begin the process of finding a way to replace the lines so the City can comply with state regulations and provide for the needs of its citizens for many years to come. In an effort to buy down on the cost of the sewer line replacements for the residents of the City of McLean, city staff members are now in the process of developing an application for state grant funds, which, if funded, will pay a substantial portion of those development costs, decreasing the need to obligate future revenues or increase user fees.

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) annually receives funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Part of this money is allocated regionally through the Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) to help cities and counties like McLean to address key community development needs. Unfortunately, the Panhandle's TCDP allocation is never large enough to fund the many grant requests made each year by local governments in the Panhandle, so the process has become very

competitive. Successful applicants are determined by a point system set up by a two-tiered scoring procedure. Half of the score is determined by TDHCA staff. All of the factors used in the scoring process are based on a predetermined set of criteria, and the applicants vying for the funds will have been made aware of which factors will be used in advance of the preparation of their applications. To the extent possible, the applicants will take advantage of every scoring opportunity possible in order to improve their chances of being selected as one of the fortunate few which will receive the grant funding.

One of the primary objectives of this program is to improve public facilities to meet basic human needs, principally for persons of low and moderate income. To that end, the City must show that at least 60 percent of the persons which benefit from the proposed project will be persons whose income is 80 percent or less of the median income in Gray County. Since the sewer project will benefit the entire McLean Community, that threshold percentage of 60 percent must be determined for the whole community in order to meet eligibility requirements.

There are two methods involved in determining the threshold percentage. The first is to analyze census data using a methodology prescribed by TDHCA. If this analysis shows that at least 60 percent of the City's residents are of low to moderate income, the City does not need to pursue the second stage, but the analysis of census data for the City of McLean shows the low/mod income percentage as 56.35%. Though the census-based method is a valid means of deriving this income percentage, it tends to underestimate the actual numbers, and so TDHCA offers another method.

The other method is much more entailed but is much more accurate. This method involves a brief survey, taken door-to-door, of all the households in McLean. The survey includes seven questions and takes about one or two minutes to complete.

Given the pressing situation involved with the sewer system, the City of McLean has decided to apply for TCDP funding this year. In order to be eligible, the City must conduct this City-wide survey. City staff will survey from 5:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Monday, August 1. Since this is such a large task, the City will welcome

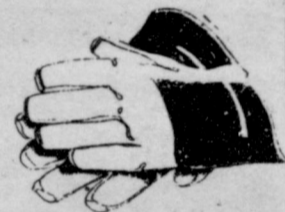

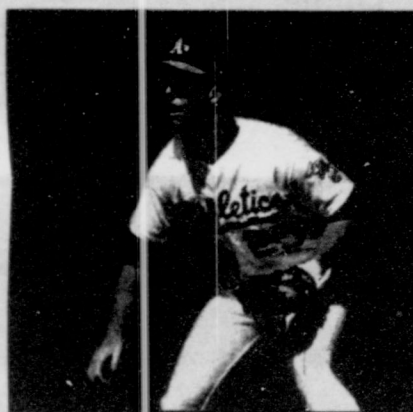
