





Groom's water comes from wells that tap into the Ogallala Aquifer.

When drinking water meets federal standards there may not be any health based benefits to purchasing bottled water or point of use devices.

Drinking water, including bottled water

including bottled water may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water posed risk. More risk. Montand information contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotlin (800-426-4791).

Of the contaminates, none came the listed the levels. above the listed acceptable levels.




