When Kotara did not respond to attempts to revive him, the neighbors called authorities, Brand said. He was apparently alone at the time of his death, Brand said.
Kotara's body was sent to Lubbock for an autopsy, Brand said.

Carson County Justice of the Peace Sharion Harper said she ruled Monday that the cause of Kotara's death was carbon monoxide intoxication.

But Harper said it does not appear Kotara committed suicide.
"Usually, a person that's suicidal is going to let sometody know somehow, and it just wasn't there," Harper said. "He was a devout Catholic. It jus does not point to that (suicicie) at this time."

Brand said there was no suicide note nor other sign of suicide.

Harper said she expects to receive an autopsy report in five to seven days. Brand said the autopsy report could indicate whether Kotara's death was a suicide, a result of natural causes or a homicide.

plants are exempt from sales tax plants are exempt from saies cax annuals and taxable if the plants are perennials. There's no sales tax on edible flower seeds and dried teas. There's no tax on burdock root sold dry from a bulk container or fresh in the produce department. Dried, it's a tea. Fresh, 's used in stir-fry dishe.

Herbal teas
When these products are sold as food products, they are not taxable. When they are sold as therapeutic, subject to sales tax. If the herbal product is not explicitly marketed as a food product, you can assume it is taxable.
Liquid extracts from herbal roots. beans and leaves, when used as a lavoring or a condiment, are not taxable.

Ruby took out a blue spatter, round-bottomed bowl, and walked from one side of her kitchen to the other, pinching ingredients into the bowl from each cabinet or tin scattered about the kitchen. She
stirred and made up a pan of biscuits, dabbed them with lard, and placed them into the oven on the old wood cookstove. The embarrassing part came as Ruth ate seven biscuits and as I ducked away from the table, she was asking Ruby to pass the plate of biscuits again.
With the canned biscuits available today, and I might add that they are mighty good, I was afraid the art of biscuit making might be lost to the world. But, with the revival of chuck wagons and the competition cook-outs, sour-dough, yeast and flour covered hands, ar again being observed. Hooray! for biscuits. I doubt the West would ever have been settled without them.
