



The Groom Junior Varsity played the only 8 man game in the history of the school to our knowledge last week at Booker.

Coach Mitchell Davis had no real trouble making the switch, with the Tigers winning handily, 26-13.

Toby Burgin ran 82 yards for the first touch down of the evening.

Booker came back and scored two TD's to put them in the lead at halftime, 13-6.

The key to the win came during the halftime break when according to Coach Davis, when the boys took it upon themselves to "...become more aggressive, grow up and show some character."

Whatever happened in the dressing room worked because fans could immediately see the difference.

Joe Britten drove the field to score a T.D. on a 4 yard pass from Brad Sustaire.

A 55 yard pass from Brad Sustaire to Toby Burgin brought home another T. D. and put the Tigers in the lead, 18-13. An exciting 65 yard run

cinched the victory. Jimmy Chavedo made the 2 point conversion.

"We had about 400 yards offensively and over came 9 fumbles." commented Coach Davis.

Burgin and Sustaire each rushed for at least 100 Jimmy Chavedo yards. carried the ball 8 times for 60 yards. Joe Britten was also an offensive stand-out.

Defensively, Scott McLaughlin, Adam Odor, Jason Prather, and Scott Weinheimer did a great job holding Booker's tough offense.






Teacher Cyndi Austin and students show their spirit for the Tigers in Friday's Pep Rally.






Jr. High running back Marcus Miller is stopped after a good gain by Booker last Thursday night in Booker.





Kenny Kotara Found Dead In His White Deer Home

Kenneth Kotara, a 36 check on the man. year old White Deer man

When Kotara did not respond to attempts to revive him, the neighbors authorities, Brand called He was apparently said. alone at the time of his death, Brand said.

Kotara's body was sent to Lubbock for an autopsy, Brand said.

Carson County Justice of the Peace Sharion Harper said she ruled Monday that the cause of Kotara's death was carbon monoxide intoxication.

But Harper said it does not appear Kotara committed suicide.

"Usually, a person that's suicidal is going to let somebody know somehow, and it just wasn't there," Harper said. "He was a devout Catholic. It just does not point to that (suicicle) at this time."

Brand said there was no suicide note nor other signs of suicide.

Harper said she expects to receive an autopsy report in five to seven days. Brand said the autopsy report could indicate whether Kotara's death was a suicide, a result of natural causes or a homicide.

snagged one pass for a TD. Junior Seth Brown had two punts blocked and missed one, but still managed to hit five out of eight PATs.


The varsity sat out the second half, as Coach Jerry Miller emptied the bench to let all the squad try their hand on the field.



Herbs, salads and such

Okay, you've decided to watch what you eat a little more carefully; haybe even cut down on those chicken fried steaks you like so

So here's some clarification on taxable and non-taxable food items. For example, herb and spice plants are exempt from sales tax if they are annuals and taxable if the plants are perennials. There's no sales tax on edible flower seeds and dried teas. There's no tax on burdock root sold dry from a bulk container or fresh in the produce de partment. Dried, it's a tea. Fresh, 's used in stir-fry dishes.

Herbal teas

When these products are sold as food products, they are not taxable. When they are sold as therapeutic, nutritional or medicinal, they are subject to sales tax. If the herbal product is not explicitly marketed is a food product, you can assume it is taxable.


Liquid extracts from herbal roots, beans and leaves, when used as a flavoring or a condiment, are not taxable.


