UNWELCOME VISITORS INVADE GROOM AS TEMPERATURES DROP With winter setting in esidents of Groom need be aware of an invasion that is taking place.
Skunks, porcupines, raccoons and other wildlife are seeking warmer habitats as the temperature drops. There are several ways to prevent unwanted guests from taking up residence where they are not wanted Never leave cat food, dog
Never leave cat food, dog food or scraps setting out. The smell of food attracts these varmints. Feed dogs and cats in the daytime hours as most wildlife tends to prowl during nocturnal hours. Garbage should be tied up in a plastic garbage bag so that these odors do not entice them.
Keep outbuildings and crawl spaces closed tight especially at night. Skunks, especially, love to find a dark secluded corner, out of the weather, to spend the cold winter.
If you see an unwelcome visitor, don't approach it. Try to close up where its taying Remove all food and most wildife will move and most wildile will move on to easier pickings. Only as a last resort should you attempt to trap or kill it. Notify the proper authorities before attempting either.

## UIL Rulings Examined

As schools move forward into the basketball season, many questions arise as to what is and what isn't allowed by the University Interscholastic League.

The following section is taken directly fron the UIL rule book. (Constitution \& Contest Rules 1991-1992. Eighty-Second Edition).
10. Section 441 Amateur Rule: following are The following are long-standing
interpretations of the Amateur Rule:
(a) Valuable consideration schooi teams and athletes may accept:

1. Pre-Season. Athletic teams may be given no more than one pre-season meal, per sport, per school year, such as a fish fry, ice cream supper, etc., provided it is approved by the school and given by a non-profit organization (usually the booster club) before the team plays in its first contest. It may be given after a scrimmage.
2. Post-Season. Athletic teams are limited to no more than one post-season meal or banquet, per sport, per school year, and it must be given by a non-profit organization and approved by the school. Banquet favors or gifts are considered valuable consideration and are a violation if they are given to a student athlete at any
3. Other. At any time athletic teams and athletes may be invited to and may attend functions where free admission is of fered, or where refreshmerts and/or meals are served, provided all students from that high school are invited to attend for the same fee and on the same basis as the athletes or the athletic team. Athletes the athletic team. Athletes or athletic teams may be recognized a these functions, but may not
accept anything that is not given to all other students. Consideration allabie and Aerans and Athietes may not accept: Examples of items deemed to be valuable consideration, and thus a violation of this rule, include, but are not limited to:
4. cookies, candy, and other gifts from other students, often referred to as goodie bags;
5. meals, snacks, or snack foods during or after practices;
6. parties given by parents or other students that are strictly for an athletic team;
7. anything that is not given, or offered, to the entire student body on the same basis that it is given to or offered to an athlete.
8. Section 441

Athletic Amateur Rule:
Athletes may assist with youth programs by coaching or serving as clinicians and remain in compliance with emain in compliance with Section 441 provided: they are not paid for their services and they do not participate in an organized workout themselves. Athletes may be paid for officiating according to Section 441, provided the fees do not exceed the
maximum University Interscholastic League rates. 12. Section 441 (a) Athletic Amateur Rule: section 441 (a) prohibits a student from soliciting or accepting private donations or funds from individuals or businesses to pay for travel expenses related to athletic events.
13. Section 441 (b) (3) Meals for Athletes:
Schools may purchase meals for student athletes in the local community provided the meal is in conjunction with competition scheduled away from the home school.
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14. Section 441

Attorney's Fees:
It is a violation if student athletes and/or their attorneys accept money or other valuable consideration for payment of legal expenses incurred to file suit or take other legal action against a school, school district, or the League.

16. Section 442 Guardianship:

17. Section 442 (b) and (e) - Boarding Facilities: Section 442 (b) applies if at least one of a student's parents is alive. Students who are placed by their parent(s) or guardian(s) in a home licensed by the state as a child care boarding facility are eligible for
athletic competition after one calendar year, even though they are transferred from one boarding facility campus to another boarding facility campus, provided the home licensed by the state was appointed is their guardian by appropriate authority more than one year ago.

## Gray County Voters <br> Turn Down Lottery <br> Gray County had better

than $40 \%$ of its voters turn out to vote last Tuesday, far more than expected on the state level. Wanda Carter believes the reason Gray County had a better turn out was due to the election in McLean, Alanreed and issue. This issue was defeated due to Alanreed and Lefors voting against consolidation.
Another reason for the higher than usual voter turnout on an amendment election Carter believes was the vote on beer sales on Sunday in Pampa. This too, was turned down.
Gray County was one of a very few counties statewide that Proposition 11 was defeated. The well known lottery issue was defeated by 292 votes. Statewide the lottery passed with 64 per cent of Texas voters in favor and 36 per cent against.
In Gray County 2,390 people voted for the lottery while 2,682 voted against

## which equals 47.1 per cent voting for the lottery and

 52.9 voting against the lottery.County Clerk Wanda Carter said Precincts $1,2,3,4,5,7,10,12$ and 13 in Gray County all voted in favor of the lottery with voting against the measure.
