Groom BB Teams Battle White Deer

Groom Junior Varsity girls battled with White Deer in a very physical contest, Tuesday before the Thanksgiving break. Very little was called by the referees including many fouls by both teams that would have been called flagrant in a better called match.

Martie Phillips and Christy Galvan were top scorers with 4 points each. Tami Ashford and April Burton each had 2 points while Maggie Thomas had 1 point. The final score was White Deer 54, Groom 13.

The Junior Varsity boy's game was equally as one sided. Groom was cited with 22 fouls, while White Deer was given 9.

Justin Ritter led the scoring with a tally of 12 points. Toby Burgin had 8, Terry Eatmon scored 6, Ray Lott 5, and Sean Crowell 3. The Tiger's netted 60% of their free shots. The final score was 36-53.

The Tigers and Tigerettes both brought home victories

before the Thanksgiving holiday.

The Ettes won handily over the Lady Bucks 64-54. Sandie Conrad took high point honors with 14 points, Misty Homen had 12, Melanie Friemel and Kay Case each had 11, Angie Conrad had 7, Jessica Friemel 3, and Stacy Fields 2.

The Tigers also won with a healthy margin 56-47.

Bo Burgin claimed top scoring honors with 26 points, 15 of which were made from the 3-point line. Stanley Homer had 8, Seth Ritter and Nick Ashford each had 6, Brad Sustaire had 4 and Bryan Crowell and Jeremy Chavedo each had 3. They pulled in 64% of their free throws.

Bivens Family Named "Panhandle Family Of The Year" Finalist

Magan Bivens recently wrote an essay at school that has subsequently resulted in her family being named a finalist in the Panhandle Family of the Year contest.

Second grade teacher Renee Weinheimer assigned the class to write the theme on why their family was the best, after receiving information on the contest from the Potter County Extension Office.

"We get information on essay contests all the time," she stated. "When we can, we enter them."

The story that Magan wrote was very well put together for a second grader. Weinheimer attributes that to the "Writing to Read" programs that have been used for several years at Groom ISD.

The "Writing to Write" computer program teaches the children how to construct a paragraph. It helps them realize that each paragraph must have a topic sentence, sentences to support the topic and a closing sentence.

She went on to say that most of the time the children are allowed to write stories based strictly on their imagination. This particular assignment was unique in that it asked the children to write a story based on reality.

The assignment was done in class so most of the parents are probably unaware that their child entered a contest.

Office stated that several letters from Groom were considered out of that second grade class.

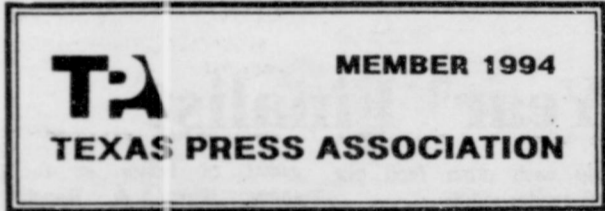

West Texas A&M University Texas Zeta Chapter of Alpha Chi National College Honor Society inducted 100 student members in a formal ceremony October 30. Membership to Alpha Chi is by invitation and is limited to juniors and seniors with an overall grade point average of 3.5 or higher and rank in the top ten percent of their class.

The purpose of Alpha Chi is to recognize students who have maintained a high level of scholarship, according to Dr. Duane Rosa, associate professor of economics, director of the Office of Planning and Institutional Effectiveness and Alpha Chi faculty sponsor.

"It is a significant accomplishment for students to have obtained this honor at this point in their academic careers," Rosa said.

Other faculty sponsors of Alpha Chi are Dr. Peter Peterson professor of history, and Dr. Lana White, professor of English.

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Fewest Farms Since Before Civil War

The 1992 Census of Agriculture shows that the United States had 1,925,300 farms, making it the first census since 1850 with fewer than 2 million farms. The census counted the highest number of farms, 6.8 million, in 1935. The value of U.S. agricultural products sold in 1992 reached \$163 billion. Even though the number of farms declined, overall farm production increased, thus continuing the trend towards more efficient agricultural productivity. The 333,865 farms with sales of \$100,000 or more accounted for only 17 percent of all farms, but 83 percent of total sales. There were 46,914 farms with sales of \$500,000 or more in 1992, compared to 32,023 farms of that size in 1987.

The increase in value of sales was largely due to increased crop production in 1992. Although total land in farms dropped from 965 to 946 million acres between 1987 and 1992, harvested

cropland rose from 282 to 296 million acres, and crop sales rose by 28 percent in the same period. Farmer participation in Federal annual commodity programs has declined since 1987. Acres idled by those programs fell from 43 million in 1987 to 7 million acres in 1992.

Notable regional shifts in milk cows and hogs have been taking place in recent censuses and have accelerated between 1987 and 1992. Since 1987, milk cow inventories decreased in 29 of the 50 states. Five Great Lakes states, Wisconsin, Minnesota, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania had large declines. Collectively they lost 514,948 head, or 12 percent of their combined 1987 inventories. Five western and southwestern states, California, Texas, Washington, Idaho and New Mexico added a total of 314,595 head. California and New Mexico accounted for 73 percent of that increase. Despite a nationwide decrease in the number of milk cows, the value of dairy products sold registered an 11 percent gain between 1987 and 1992 to a value of \$18 billion.

There has also been a shift in hog production. It has remained strong in traditional midwestern states such as Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, Indiana and Nebraska. However, North Carolina registered a 108 percent growth in number of hogs sold in 1992; up from sixth in 1987.

Sales of poultry and poultry products continued on an upward trend, registering a 21 percent increase between 1987 and 1992. Poultry and poultry products sales were \$15.4 billion in 1992, up \$2.7 billion from 1987. Alabama, Arkansas,

California, Georgia and North Carolina accounted for 46 percent of all poultry and poultry products sold. The number of broilers sold was 5.4 billion.

The 1992 Census of Agriculture indicates a regional shift in cotton acreage from the southwest back to the historical Mississippi delta and southeastern states. Although total cotton acreage increased by more than a million acres in the United States between 1982 and 1992, California and the

southwestern states of Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas show a 1.4 million acre decrease during that period. Over those same 10 years, cotton acreage grew by 2.1 million acres in Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina and Tennessee.

Average age of operators rose to 53.3 in 1992 from 52.0 years of age in 1987. There were 145,156 female operators in 1992, which represents 7.5 percent of the total U.S. farm operators. The total

number of female operators increased about 11 percent from 1987. The average age of female operators in 1992 was 57.6 years compared to 52.9 for male operators.

Between 1987 and 1992, average farm size increased from 462 to 491 acres, average sales from \$65,165 to \$84,459, and average expenses per farm from \$51,797 to \$67,928. For the 1992 Census of Agriculture, a farm is any place which sold or normally would have sold \$1,000 or more of agricultural products during the census year.



- Re-codification of Chapter 52 water districts into a new chapter of the Texas Water Code; Title 2, State Water Administration, Subtitle E, Groundwater Management;
- to create a plugging fund for the proper closure of abandoned water wells;

- to increase the funding for groundwater data acquisition and management;
- to provide additional funding for the Wellhead Protection Program;
- that TNRCC Commissioners be increased from 3 to 6 and that their appointments come from different geographical areas of the State.

They are also preparing a resolution to:

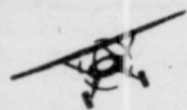
- Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. opposing the Red Fox and the Arkansas River Shiner being listed on the USFWS Endangered Species Listing.

Coach Hughes said "The boys hit 71% from the free throw line. I am very pleased with their performance."

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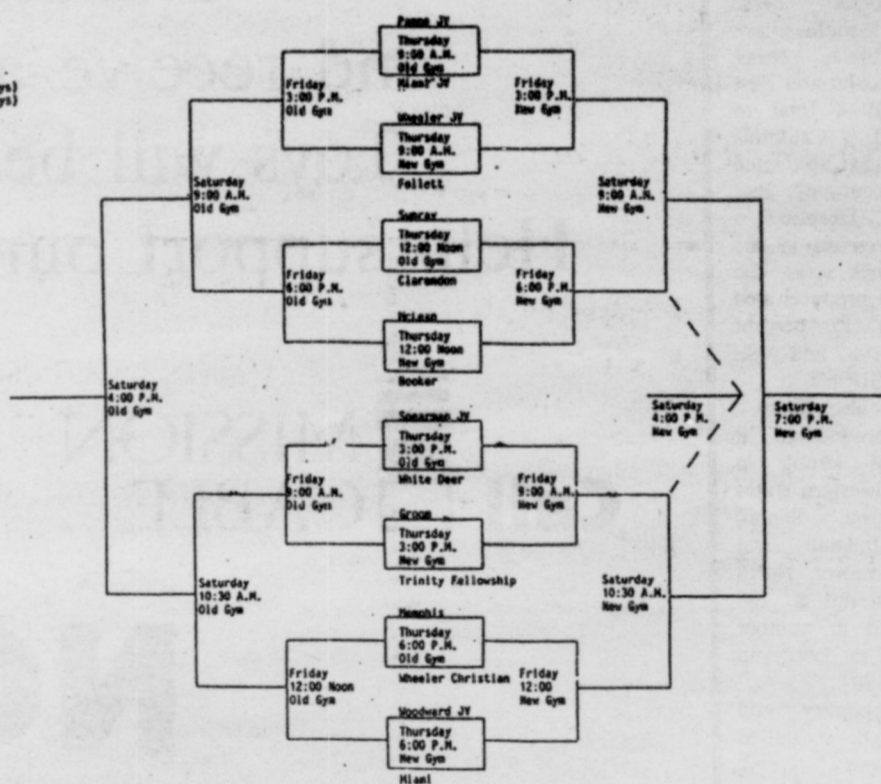

Carson County Sheriff's Report

There are currently nine persons incarcerated in the Carson County Jail. Charges include: 1 -Escapee (Oregon), 2 -Domestic Violence, 1 -Fugitive Warrant (North Carolina), 1 -Felony Theft, 1 -Felony DWI, 2 -Aggravated Assault on Public Servant and 1 -Parole Violation.

Sgt. Ray "Columbo" Davis took a suspicious person into custody in Groom after the subject was found in possession of drug paraphernalia. The subject initially refused to give our officers his true identity, but he later admitted to being an escapee from a criminal psychiatric unit in Oregon. This subject is currently incarcerated in Carson County pending his extradition back to Oregon.

Our officers are investigating two separate reports of criminal mischief in the White Deer area. Deputies also responded to reports of suspicious persons and prowlers in the Fritch

area and in Groom.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department assisted the Borger Police Department in the investigation of an armed robbery which occurred at a Borger convenience store. The clerk on duty at the time was beaten with a pipe by the suspects.

The Sheriff's Department, Texas Highway Patrol, Borger Police Department and Hutchinson County Sheriff's Department all responded to reports of an explosion in the northern part of Carson County. The explosion had been caused by persons representing a Borger auto dealer. The involved parties had used explosives to destroy some cars and the proceedings were being filmed for use as a television commercial. The persons causing the explosion did not notify the Sheriff's Department or the property owners and all responding agencies were unaware of what had

actually taken place. Due to the amount of explosives used and the unnecessary activation of so many emergency units, the matter is being investigated by the Carson County Sheriff and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

The White Deer City Marshal and Carson County deputies arrested a husband and wife from White Deer after being called to the scene of a domestic dispute. Because both subjects were combatants, both were arrested. The consumption of alcoholic beverages and the use of firearms increased the officers' concerns about the situation.

Carson County deputies assisted the Texas Highway Patrol at the scene of a motor vehicle accident on Interstate 40 Saturday night. Two persons were taken to an Amarillo hospital for treatment of injuries.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department hosted a law enforcement training class on Report Writing and Interview/Interrogation Techniques on Saturday. Officers from the Panhandle Police Department, Carson County Sheriff's Department, Gray County Sheriff's Department and Gray County Constable's Office attended the training.

Carson County Ranks 8th In State

Carson County ranked 8th among Texas Counties in wheat production in 1993. Carson County produced 2.8% of the state's wheat production. Number one in 1993 wheat production was Hansford County, producing 5.7% of the state's wheat.

In sorghum production, Carson County again ranked 8th in the state with 2.8%. Nueces County was the top sorghum producer in 1993 with 6.8% production.

Texas Education Agency Study Shows Ethnicity Make-Up Of Carson County

According to the U.S. Bureau of Census, Carson County has shown a 11% decline of white, non-hispanic high school and elementary students in the county's school systems in 1993, from 1973. In 1993, 68% of all students in Panhandle, Groom and White Deer-Skellytown Schools were of white-non-hispanic origin. Blacks made up 15%, up from 1973 of 14%. Hispanic origin students doubled from 6% in 1973 to 12% in 1993. All other races were up 5% in 1993 from 1% in 1973.

A huge six foot potted plant was delivered by the Ferguson family of Ferguson's Flower Shop in McLean along with a warm welcome.

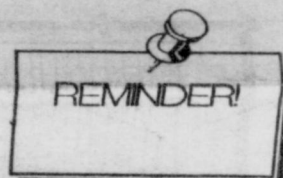
Later in the day Don Bode and Ronnie Tidwell played and sang for the folks who were there from 3 to 5 o'clock in the

Rural Housing Loans Available With FmHA

Rural Housing Loans for very-low and low income applicants are available through County Offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), August H. Hesse, III, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build,

improve, or repair rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes - add improvements such as bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other

improvements. Borrowers may be an existing house and lot or buy a site on which to build a home. Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and the new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 8.00 percent See Housing, pg. 10

Seniors Score Higher Than National Average

According to results received recently at McLean High School, local seniors averaged higher on their ACT tests than the national average. Rick Reeser, MHS principal, said that the students averaged 24 (in the 78th percentile) on the pre-college exam. "The national average is 20.6, so this is a
