

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

Mr. Dwyer gave the results of the TEAMS test for McLean students. The test is administered every other year. Several months ago, Mr. Dwyer discussed the results for the 11th grade students. At that time, four students did not meet the minimum standards for graduation. All have since taken the test again and have successfully complied with the minimum requirements.

In the 9th grade class, 25 students were tested. Nine of them failed to master one or more areas including 4 in writing. Four students failed to master 2 or more of the areas, Although Mr. Dwyer.

to master 2 or more of the areas. Although Mr. Dwyer said these are areas of con-cern that need to be addressed by teachers, he added that students throughout the state have also had difficulty, particularly with the writing skills test. Mr. Dwyer said that this test is very subjec-tive and that the person who grades the test can influence a student's score.

In the 7th grade, sixteen students took the test. Four-teen mastered the math, 15 mastered the vriting.

In the 5th grade, of the 15 who were tested, 12 mastered the math, 15 mastered the reading and 9 mastered the writing.

In the 3rd grade, 17 students took the test. All mastered the math and reading and 15 mastered the

ing and 15 mastered the writing.
Overall, Mr. Dwyer said, McLean students were better than average in math, average in reading and a little below average in writing skills. He suggested that teachers be made aware of students with problems so they can receive extra attention.

He also expressed his concern that the state might eventually use test results in allocating money to schools. He said it could happen that schools with better scores might eventually receive more state money. more state money.



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

Four in ten Texas teachers are sleaving to seriously considering ying the profession; professio severe shortage, three-fourths balk at recommending teaching as a career; and almost one-fourth of the teachers one-fourth of the teachers moonlight to supplement their salaries, according to a teacher survey released this week by the Texas State

The survey, "Moonlighting, Salary and Morale: The Texas Teachers' Story," has been conducted every two years since 1980 to track the

The survey was conducted for TSTA by Dr. David L. and Karen L. Henderson, Dr. Henderson is a professor of education at Sam Houston

ville. He teaches educational research, computer literacy and teaching methods. Karen Henderson is the mathematics coordinator for Huntsville

Eighty-three percent are dissatisfied with the career ladder and the most common reason for leaving is now working conditions rather than salary as found in the three previous studies.

In previous surveys, "money" was listed as the main reason for leaving by 50 percent in 1982. That number dropped to 17 percent in 1986. At the same time, stress, burnout, paperwork and administrative hassles has risen steadily, from 24 percent in 1982 to 68 per-

cent in 1986.

Two-thirds of the teachers support mandated negotia-tions with the local school board.

The profile of the Texas Teacher in this survey is 41 year old, earns \$24,601 after teaching 14 years and is married to a spouse who also works.

A little over half of the

A little over hair of the teachers surveyed support the "no pass, no play." The 1986 survey is the first to reflect teaching conditions since House Bills 72 and 246

were implemented.
