





The Panhandle winter wheat crop is in serious trouble.

"If we don't get some moisture soon," stated Tony Treadwell of Tony Treadwell of Attebury Grain, "many of our dry land winter wheat crops are not going to produce."

The last significant

moisture was received in September when the area got about two and one half inches of moisture. In October .35 was received. November was completely dry. December, January and so far in February has only seen a trace of moisture in a few very

dry snow flurries.

If that was not enough of a problem for area farmers, greenbugs have invaded the Pampa area. Some farmers are choosing to graze their wheat down rather than add the cost of spraying again to the cost of a crop that may not produce.

Knowledgeable sources commented that winter wheat can be safely grazed until March and still produce if conditions are right.






