

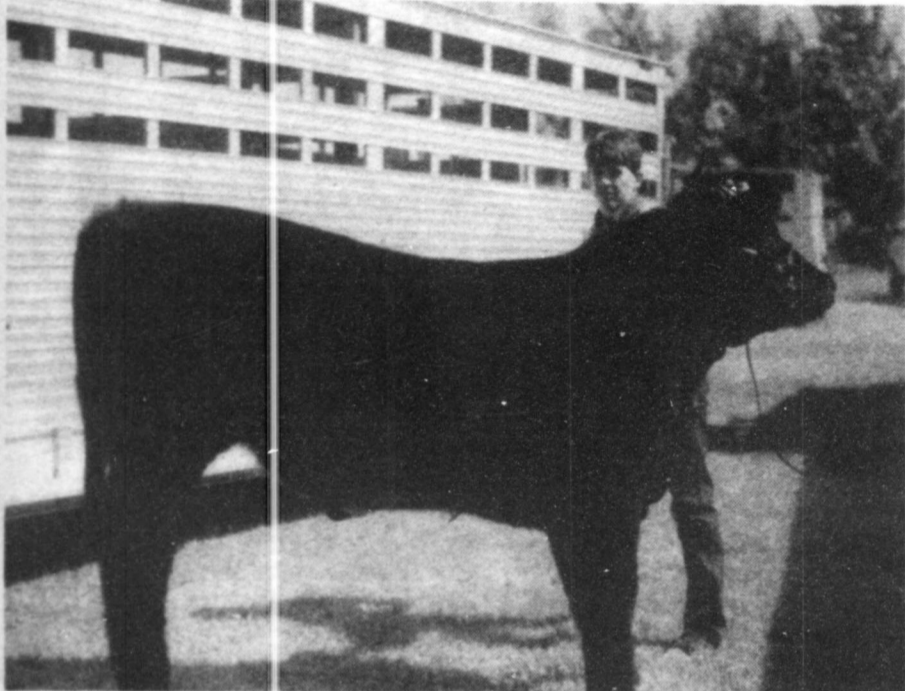

City Council Moves Forward On Public Hazard Legalities

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week with all members in attendance. Bill Wright of BFI also attended.

The Council unanimously agreed to continue the next step in the condemnation of four houses in dis-repair in Groom. Suit will now be

filed in the court to declare them a public hazard.

The Council decided that when the oil recycling bin comes it will be placed in the fenced area behind City Hall.

BFI representative Bill Wright presented a 3% increase for city trash pick-up. The increase is due to regulation changes on landfills. The increase was unanimously approved.

Leo Edmondson had asked to be on the agenda to discuss his property at 91 Collier Street. Edmondson failed to appear at the council meeting.

The aldermen will proceed with setting a court hearing date to foreclose on the property.

In other business the council unanimously agreed to:

- Take donations for two sets of flashing lights for the school zone. Cost with installation is expected to be approximately \$1,700.00

- Ask Sybil Harrell to chair a drive to expand local (toll-free) telephone service to the Pampa and Panhandle areas.

- Table purchasing a new computer and software until a later date.

- The last item on the agenda was to consider applications for the position of Water Superintendent. The Council will begin interviewing applicants at a special called meeting on October 12th.

Tigers Beat Coyotes By 51 Points

The Groom Tigers made it short and sweet against the Higgin's Coyotes in Friday nights game, taking only two quarters to stretch the point spread to 51 points.

Bart Britten had an outstanding game picking off not one but two interceptions at the beginning of each quarter.

Bo Burgin passed to Seth Ritter for the first of several touchdowns. Brothers Ty and Tom Lambert pulled in the next touchdown with Tom setting up the pass reception and Ty running 15

yards for the touchdown. Tom also made the PAT.

Bo Burgin fired a pass to Wes Hall who made the score and Lambert again connected for the PAT.

Harold Cave ran for a 12 yard goal late in the first quarter. Collin Downs scored the PAT.

Bart Britten snapped up his second interception early in the second quarter and on the very next play Tom Lambert scored on a pass from Burgin. Downs made the point after bringing the score up to 38 - 0.

Seth Ritter made the next two touchdowns. The first, he sprinted in a 14 yard run and the second he caught a 61 yard pass from Bo Burgin.

The Tigers gave up a touchdown when the Coyotes got a man past our defensive line and he made it to the goal.

Harold Cave made the last score on a 65 yard run with .26 seconds left in the (half) game. Justin Ritter made the PAT for a final score of 57 - 6.

Armstrong County Commissioners Appoint Carmella Jones

In a town where girls basketball is more popular than Monday night football it's not surprising that Armstrong County Commissioners appointed a woman as sheriff.

Carmella Jones, a ten year resident of Claude, was named Sheriff after the resignation of Kenneth Dye, due to a conflict with the Commissioner's Court. She joined the Sheriff's Department in January,

when Dye took office. She had also worked as a jailer during Bud Strange's tenure as Sheriff. She graduated from Amarillo College's Panhandle Regional Law

Enforcement Academy in May.

Jones was preceded by at least one other female sheriff in the Texas Panhandle. Mrs. J.C. Moseley was named Sheriff of Swisher County in 1933 after her husband was killed in a gun battle.

"You don't need muscle and a strong arm to be a sheriff," said Jones. "I think it (her gender) has been an asset, especially in domestic violence cases," she went on to say.

If she is elected in the '94 general election she will be the first woman in the Panhandle to be elected Sheriff.

The kids' safety is a number one priority to the city and school. These kids are not always looking where they are located in the road whether it be walking or riding a bicycle.

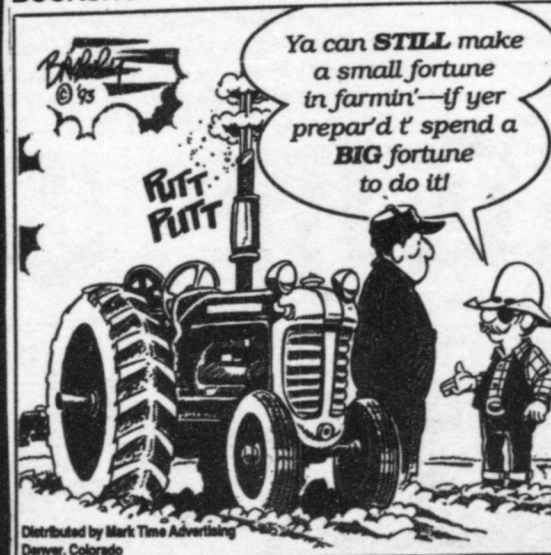

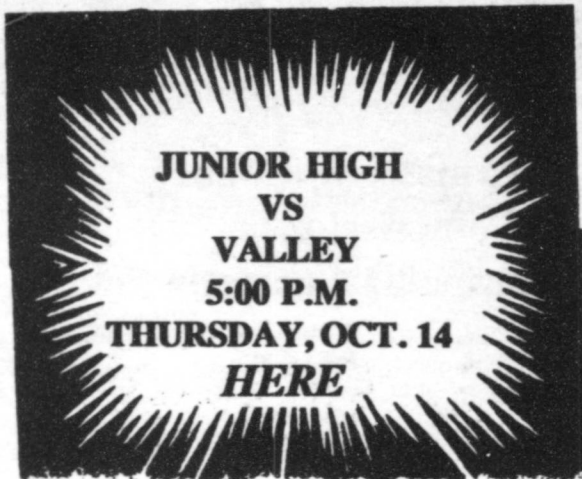

Carson County Sheriff's Report

The Carson County Jail is currently holding twelve persons. Offenses charged include: 1 - DWI, Resisting Arrest, Escape; 1 - Traffic Charges; 1 - Driving While License Is Suspended; 2 - Misdemeanor Theft; 2 - Possession Of Controlled

Substance; 1 - Parole Violation-Theft; 1 - Burglary Of A Building; 1 - Falsification Of Government Records; 1 - Parole Violation-Criminal Trespass; 1 - Criminal Mischief-Felony.

Eighteen persons have been booked into the

Carson County Jail since the beginning of October. Once again, the felony arrests outnumber the misdemeanor offenses.

Our department is investigating a reported theft from a motor vehicle in Fritch and we have been contacted by the

Department of Human Services to assist in the investigation of an alleged case of sexual abuse of children.

A Carson County man was jailed for DWI, escape and resisting arrest in White Deer. Several persons were arrested after an alleged

altercation in Groom and the matter is currently being investigated to see if any other persons should be charged.

The Sheriff's Department assisted the Panhandle Police and Texas Highway Patrol at the scene of a multiple injury accident on Highway 60 in Panhandle. Ambulances from Panhandle, White Deer and Pantex were used to transport injured persons and one person was transported by air ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital. The jaws of life had to be used to extricate victims from the vehicle.

The Skellytown Fire Department used their newly-acquired jaws of life at the scene of a traffic accident six miles west of Skellytown on Highway 152. The Carson County Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol were called to the accident where one person had been seriously injured and was trapped in the vehicle. Mike Tice of the Skellytown Fire Department credited the use of their new jaws of life for the successful extrication of the person from the vehicle.

Carson County has had a busy year of traffic accidents and other emergency situations. While I am extremely proud of the Deputy Sheriffs and Dispatch/Jail Personnel for their handling of these emergencies, I think we all owe a great deal of gratitude to the volunteers of the Skellytown,

Panhandle, Groom and White Deer Fire and Ambulance Services. They do for free what many people wouldn't do for any amount of money in the world.

Sunday, October 3rd, Trooper Davis investigated a one car roll over accident involving a Skellytown youth between Panhandle and White Deer. The youth was uninjured, however, the car sustained severe damage. The youth was issued a ticket for driving on the wrong side of the road and speeding.

Monday, October 4th, Trooper Don Johnson of Borger investigated an injury accident on TX 152 west of Skellytown involving a Pampa woman and a Santa Fe truck. The passenger in the woman's truck was rushed to Pampa Coronado Hospital after the jaws of life were used to free him from the wreckage. The Pampa woman was issued a ticket for Failing to Pass to the Left Safely.

Trooper Gary Davis assisted with the investigation.

Wednesday, October 6th, Trooper Chris Ray arrested a man on US 60 west of Panhandle for unpaid Amarillo P.D. tickets. The man was placed in Carson County Jail until arrival of Amarillo P.D. Later that day a Maryland man was arrested for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. The subject was arraigned and placed in the Carson County Jail until he could post a \$200.00 bond. Later that evening a Oklahoma man was arrested for DWI after attempting to cause an accident with an 18 wheeler and attempting to kick a highway patrolman. Deputy Ray Davis assisted with the

arrest. Less than thirty minutes later Deputy Joe Leatherwood observed a car weaving on the interstate. Leatherwood and Davis stopped the vehicle and found the driver highly intoxicated and had been involved in an accident. Further investigation revealed the Oklahoma man had the accident somewhere in Oklahoma. Both men were booked in the Carson County Jail for DWI -1st.

On Thursday, October 7th, two Michigan youth were arrested for stealing a Chevrolet pickup and theft of a Nebraska license plate. Both men were placed in the Carson County Jail until they could post bond. Both the 17 year olds were laughing on the way there but may not be laughing now. As of Tuesday, October 12th, they were still sitting in jail, with a real unhappy parent waiting to get his hands on them.

On Saturday, October 9th, Trooper Don Johnson of Borger arrested a Texan for Driving While License Suspended. The man was placed in the Carson County Jail until he could post bond. Later that evening Trooper Davis arrested four Groom men for assault and Public Intoxication. All four were transported to the Carson County Sheriff's Office. All four had to post bond prior to release on Sunday.

On Friday, October 15th, the Texas Highway Patrol will be hosting a bicycle safety seminar at the Groom Elementary from 2 pm until 3 pm.

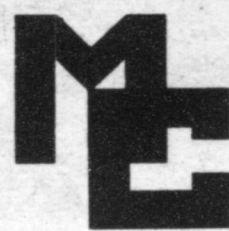

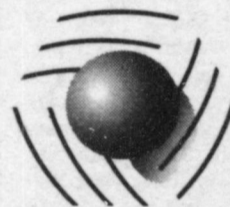

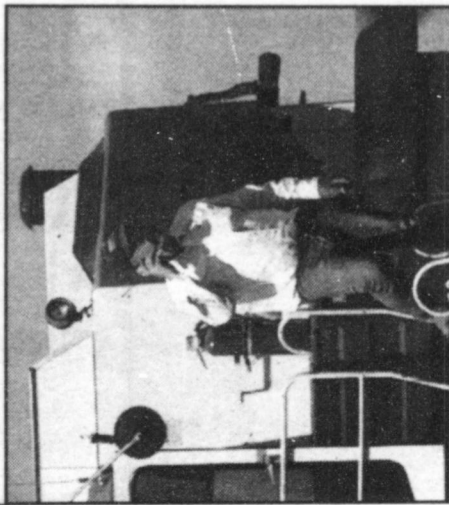

Hunter Education Course Planned

A course in hunter education has been scheduled for October 18, 19 and 21 from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m. in McLean, according to Bill Layman, Hunter Education Instructor. The meeting will be held at the McLean High School Ag. Building.

By September 1, 1993, all hunters born on or after September 2, 1971, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas. However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements,

according to Bill Layman.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in rifle, shotgun and bowhunting, handling and safety; outdoor responsibility and ethics; laws and regulations; conservation; hunting traditions; wildlife identification; field care of game; wilderness first aid and survival," Bill Layman added.

Students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the Texas Parks & Wildlife

Department. Those less than 12 years of age will receive a certificate of attendance, but must take the course again for proper certification.

More than 160,000 Texans have already completed the hunter education course which is mandatory in 39 states.



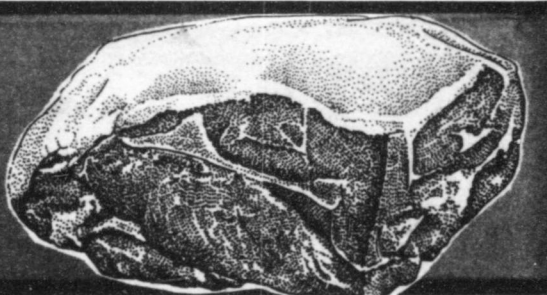
