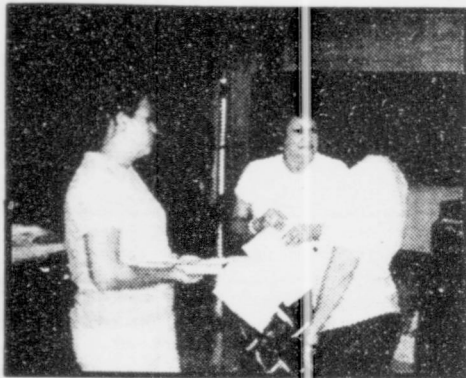

Camp Don Harrington hosted two groups from McLean ISD this month. On August 9th, The McLean Tigers developed even more team building and leadership skills by attending the camp.

The McLean ISD superintendent, principals, faculty, and staff accepted the challenge of attending the Challenge Outdoor personal Experience, or C.O.P.E. Course at Camp

Don Harrington on Friday, August 11. C.O.P.E. is a series of physical, mental and emotional challenges facilitated by a trained staff directed at enhancing personal growth. The MISD employees were divided into two teams and were taken through a variety of outdoor courses which challenged each team to use problem solving and physical skills.

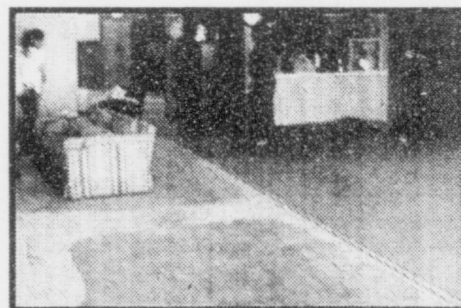
Rhonda Patterson, High

At the end of the training, the facilitator of the C.O.P.E. Course told the MISD employees that he had worked with many school districts at Camp Don Harrington, but the McLean ISD employees were by far more supportive of each other and cooperative during the activities.

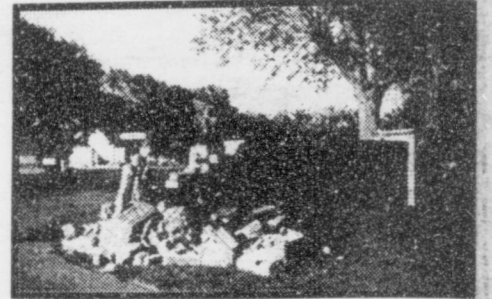
Mayor Martin administered the oath of office to James Troy.

DPS on Look-Out For Texans Driving Drunk

Texans who drive while intoxicated should expect extra attention during the Labor Day weekend. All available Texas Department of Public Safety troopers will be on the lookout for speeders, seat belt violators and drunk drivers from Friday, September 1 through Monday, September 4.

"It's against the law to drive when your blood alcohol content is 0.08 or above, and you should

know the Texas Highway Patrol troopers will be looking for you," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS. "In addition to the criminal penalties, it's important to remember that there is a \$1,000 per year surcharge for three years that is assessed on drivers who are convicted of driving while intoxicated."

DPS supports the "Over the Limit Under Arrest" campaign, a nation wide

anti-DWI effort aimed at reducing alcohol-related deaths and injuries during the Labor Day holiday period. DPS also is a participant in Operation CARE-Combined Accident Reduction Effort-a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities on major interstate highways during holiday weekends.

The punishment for a DWI conviction: First Offense-a fine not to

exceed \$2,000 and/or a jail term of 72 hours to 180 days; participation in an alcohol education and treatment program even if probation is granted; license suspension from 3 months to 1 year. Second Offense: Fine up to \$4,000 and/or jail term of 30 days to one year; mandatory 72 hours in jail even if probation is granted; license suspension from six months to two years. Third Offense: Fine not to exceed

\$10,000; prison term of two years to 10 years; mandatory jail term of 10 days even if probation is granted; license suspension of six months to two years.

Intoxication manslaughter: fine up to \$10,000, prison term of two to 20 years, license suspension of six months to two years. Last year, DPS troopers arrested 751 people for driving while intoxicated during the LABOR Day weekend.

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Applications can be requested at **500 South Main, Panhandle, Texas.** Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact **BRENDA VERMILLION** for assistance.

CARSON COUNTY will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Health. In summary, these rules are:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of income, residence, household composition and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Maximum countable income cannot exceed limits as determined by the Texas Department of Health
4. Total countable resources and assets cannot exceed \$2,000 or \$3,000 if the household contains a relative who is aged or disabled. The value of a car greater than \$4,650 is counted against the \$2,000 limit. Personal possession and homestead are exempt assets.
5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Carson County.
6. Applications must provide all information and documentation that is required.
7. Applications must apply for any other program for which they are potentially eligible. The County program is payer of last resort.
8. Applicants have the right to appeal denials.
