





Ricky Hamilton kept in contact with the Potter County Emergency Operations Center. Lovell Kennard coordinated law enforcement activities in the field from the emergency operations center. Jody Bradford kept the events board in the emergency operations center. Tommy Stotts, Amarillo Area Office, D.O.E. kept constant communications with the Pantex E.O.C. Steve Hardin, Becky Reynolds and Maurine Russ worked with communications during the exercise. Wanda Hood, Emergency Management Coordinator, helped plan and coordinate the exercise during the year with D.O.E., Pantex/Mason and Hanger and Potter County Emergency Management.

The scenario involved a tank truck accident at the west gate of the plant. The tanker was leaking chlorine. The fumes were traveling in a north-east direction for approximately one to one half miles. The exercise lasted approximately four hours and involved local, state and federal agencies and officials.
