I have recently completed an Alcohol and Drug Awareness and Prevention Course sponsored by Sam Houston State University. I believe that all of the citizenry should be aware of how acute this problem is becoming. Alcohol is the most widely available and used drug in our county. The most recent estimates are that, for persons age fourteen and older, the per capita consumption is 2.65 gallons of pure alcohol per person. This translates into 50 gallons of beer or wine coolers or 20 gallons of wine or four gallons of distilled. If you remove the nondrinkers from the above, it translates into 80 gallons of beer/wine coolers or 33 gallons of whisky. For people over 18 years of age,
light drinkers, $1 / 3$ are
moderate heavy drinkers. For these statistics, abstal ners are persons who hav not consumed alcohol in the last year; light drinkers are those who consume an average of less than three drinks per week; and heavy drinkers are those who consume more than fourteen drinks per week. Also, ten percent of the drinkers account for about one-half of the alcohol consumed.
