

PGWCD Directors Approve Budget

Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District #3 directors (John R. Spearman, president; Frank Simms, vice president; Raymond Blodgett, secretary; Charles Bowers and Phillip Smith, members; and C.E. Williams, manager) held a public hearing on the proposed budget for 1991-92 on August 28 at the District Office in White Deer. Don Zumstein was also present.

No one voiced opposition to the proposed budget; therefore, it was approved by a unanimous vote in the regular session following the hearing.

In other action, the directors agreed through a motion that Armstrong County be assessed for 1991 taxes; that Ronald Patterson be designated to collect taxes in Armstrong County; and that Debbie Stribling be designated to collect taxes in Roberts County.

Approval was also given a Well Permit for David Randall in Donley County.

The 1991 tax rate for the PGWCD will be .0085 per \$100. valuation.

Burk Judges Kentucky Fair

Buck Burk, Groom ISD's agriculture teacher, recently returned from judging the Kentucky State Fair in Louisville. Judging large state wide shows are not new to Mr. Burk. He has also judged the Iowa State Fair, Ohio State Fair, Colorado State Fair and the New Mexico State Fair.

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Public Notice

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket

Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$445 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line terminations, plus \$3 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.

As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the



STATE FUEL TAX

Texas farmers and ranchers are alarmed by what they understand are alternatives being considered in the Texas House of Representatives regarding taxes, according to S. M. True, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

"Proposals to increase the state fuel tax by 13 cents to a total of 28 cents a gallon is bad enough for all Texans," True said. "But, changing the off-road exemption for tractors and other production equipment to a once-a-year refund -- as proposed -- substantially increases producers' upfront production costs."

The president of the state's largest general farm organization said the damage becomes even more severe with the concept of allowing the refund to

equate to only 75 percent of

"That would result in a new 7-cents-per-gallon tax on fuel used for food and fiber production," True said "That is unacceptable and We strongly intolerable. urge that this entire concept be dropped."

The farm leader said another proposal floating in the Texas House of extending the state franchise tax to farm and ranch enterprises is no more than an "income tax in disguise."

Texas Farm Bureau has expressed support for streamlining government, increasing the state sales tax by one percent, and a voterapproved state lottery, True said. All of these actions would affect farmers and ranchers the same way as all citizens of the state, he explained.

"The fuel tax proposal and the franchise tax extension are grossly unfair, as agriculture is the only industry that cannot pass ces to consumers," True said. "The proposa's are not the proper means to address the budget dilemma."







For the second year, a mule and donkey show will begin at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 19th in the Cody Arena. This





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NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$5,356 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$5,877 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.755 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the McLean Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering adoption of a tax rate of \$.48 that will provide \$5,714 per student in state and local revenues.

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




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
