STATE FUEL TAX
Texas farmers and ranchers are alarmed by what they understand are alternatives being considered in the Texas House of Representatives regarding taxes, according to S. M. True, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.
"Proposals to increase the state fuel tax by 13 cents to a total of 28 cents a gallon is bad enough for all Texans," True said. "But, changing the off-road exemption for tractors and other production equipment to a once-a-year refund -- as proposed -- substantially increases producers' upfront production costs."
The president of the state's largest general farm organization said the damage becomes even more severe with the concept o allowing the refund to
equate to only 75 percent of the charge.
"That would result in 8 new 7 -cents-per-gallon tas on fuel used for food anc fiber production," True said "That is unacceptable and intolerable. We strongly urge that this entire concep be dropped."
The farm leader sail another proposal floating is the Texas House of extending the state franchis: tax to farm and rancl enterprises is no more tha an "income tax in disguise."
Texas Farm Bureau has expressed support for streamlining government, increasing the state sales tax by one percent, and a voterby one percent, antery. True approved state lottery, True said. All of these actions would affect farmers and ranchers the same way as all citizens of the state, be explained.
"The fuel tax proposil and the franchise tex extension are grossly unfair, as agriculture is the ony as agriculture cannot pas industry that cannot pas along taxes to consumers, True said. "The proposa s are not the proper means to address the budget dilemma."

## NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides $\$ 5,356$ per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides $\mathbf{\$ 5 , 8 7 7}$ per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of $\$ .755$ for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.
