Community Schools (TACS) said. "Redrawing district maps is projected to save the state $\$ 225$ million in the Management Audit of Public Schools, but statistics indicate that savings would cost the state 10,892 jobs, including 4,092 teaching positions in the rural areas of Texas."
"Consolidation could spell the end of some communities where the school is the primary employer and the focus of civic activity. The traditional small school district in Texas is increasingly viewed as a primary source of community pride and identity, and the family-like environment found in mos small schools is unique and something to be cherished," said Bruceville-Eddy ISD superintendent, Jim Payne, who is president of the See Board, pg. 2

## PRCPOSITION NO. 1

ON THE BALLOT
Section 1 of Senate Join: Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legisiature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a chool district. The amendment would education districts with the taxable property of existing school dist riets in one or nore counties combined. County educa tion distriets may levy, ecllect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be a lowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may autho rize the board of trustees of each school distriet or county education district to set he rate, provided that the rate of county ducation district ad $\$ 109$ valuation of ot exceed $\$ 1.0$ per $\$$ a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the mount of ad valorem taxe: redistributed mong school districts by the legislature and effe tively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the um of the state revenue ap propriated for public schools and the reve nue from loca ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" oes not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free extbooks, or contributions to a retire ment system. Finally, the amendmen provides that it does not af ect the distri ution of the available school fund under rticle Vil, section

The proposed amendment will appear the ballot as follows:
The constitutional amendment allow ing limited redistribution of ad val orem taxes for schools, authorizing
a minimum tax rate in county educa tion districts, and placing a cap on th ad valorem tax levied by county edu ation districts.

## PROPOSITION NO. 2

 ON THE BALLOTSection 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state pliance with the Texas Cosed in comPederal law, the Texas Constitution or at least two or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members eleced to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district is fully funded amend the obligation is fully funded. The amend vide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school distriet's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

## PROPOSITION NO.

## ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VH, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment
the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obliga-
tion bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of $\$ 150$ milissued under article VII, section 5(b), as issued under article VII, section 5 (b), as ment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of $\$ 750$ million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each iscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the count sufficient to principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.
