

## 2nd Snow Storm Slows Thanksgiving Holiday Travelers

On Tuesday, November 24th, the blizzard of 92 struck. With the outstanding assistance of the Groom Volunteer Fire Department, Bivens Automotive, Keith and Lee Barkley, Ronnie Gray and many others all stranded motorists from the KOA to Conway were placed safely in a warm shelter. Four accidents were worked that

day all involving truck tractors. A man was heard to have said, "I don't know if they can put out fires, but Tony and his guys sure can work during a storm."

On Wednesday, November 25th the roads were reopened at approximately 12 noon. That resulted in 5 accidents on IH-40 all east of Conway. All drivers were issued a citation for Unsafe

On Thursday, November 26th several accidents were reported on IH-40 west of Conway. All accidents were worked by Trooper Ray of Panhandle and assisted by Trooper Davis.

On Saturday, November 28th the last vehicle was retrieved from the snow bank on IH-40. It took 4 ½ hours to remove hay from the trailer and pull the

truck out resulting in diverting traffic off the interstate near FM 295.

It's nice to know I live in a community where the people can come together in times of crisis and help those in need. Some gave up time. Some gave up food and gas. Everyone should be extremely proud of themselves. I'm sure your help to those stranded motorists will not be soon



#### County Sheriff's Report

The major focus of the Sheriff's Department during the past week has been dealing with the many

storm-related assignments and emergencies which occurred.

Sheriff's deputies assisted the Texas Highway Patrol at the scene of numerous traffic accidents and provided traffic direction where semi-tractors had jackknifed on the interstate.

Deputies transported stranded motorists to shelter and assisted area farmers and ranchers in searching for and securing strayed cattle. The sheriff's department, Texas Highway Patrol, Panhandle EMS and Pantex EMS responded to a report of a woman who had been bit in the face by a dog. The call came during the most severe part of the blizzard and the injured party was transported from her home by four-wheel drive vehicle to the awaiting ambulance for transport to Amarillo.

The Carson County
Sheriff's Department worked
with area law enforcement
agencies in coordinating
missing person reports and
keeping family members of
stranded persons informed
of their location.

The sheriff's department was caused on two occasions when a restaural along Interstate 40 attempted to evict nearly fifty persons from the building so the restaurant could be closed. With the assistance of the County Judge, the restaurant owner was

advised of the legal consequences of not complying with the current state of emergency and the necessity to protect stranded motorists from the blizzard conditions.

In another case, the Carson County Sheriff and deputies met with an Interstate 40 motel owner when attempts were made to raise the motel rates for persons who were stranded at the motel. The Carson County Attorney assisted our department in explaining the laws regarding such activities to the motel

The sheriff's department is continuing to work with the South Carolina Bureau of Investigation and a South Carolina Sheriff's Department in an investigation dealing with the disappearance of a South Carolina man. Foul play is suspected in his disappearance.

A subject wanted for Forgery in Carson County has been located and arrested in Broken Bow, Nebraska. The subject has waived extradition and will be brought back to Panhandle to face trial on the charges.

## **DECIPHERS**

The county unit plan was conceived by Steve Ogden, Republican state representative from Bryan. Steve is an oilman and an ex-naval officer who in his words "roamed around the bottom of the oceans in submarines doing nuclear physics." As you might guess, he is an extremely bright fellow.

The Ogden Plan, which I have filed in the Texas Senate, is the result of Steve's best efforts to respond to the latest Texas Supreme Court decision in Edgewood v. Kirby. The court found Senate Bill 351, which created county education districts, to be unconstitutional for basically two reasons. First, it created a taxing district, the CED, without allowing for a vote of the people. Secondly, the court said that imposing a tax on each CED was really the creation of a statewide property tax, which directly violates the state Constitution.

The Ogden county unit system would address these two issues by creating 254 county units. These units could levy a tax up to \$1 that would be applied to all of the property within the county and used for education. The proceeds of the tax would be used only within the county. Instead of the Legislature mandating a tax vote as it enrichment tax of 40 cents did in Senate Bill 351, the Ogden plan allows residents of the county to vote on a tax rate. If they voted to adopt the maximum tax rate of \$1 then the students in that county would be entitled to the maximum amount of state matching aid. They could, however, adopt a lower tax rate and be entitled to a proportionately reduced amount of state aid. So if they adopted an 80 cent tax rate, for example, they would be entitled to 80 percent of maximum state

system avoids both problems the court found with our prior attempt. It allows the people of the county to vote to create the district and to choose a tax rate they are willing to subject themselves

In the second part, the county unit system would allow each school district within a county unit to levy its own "enrichment tax" above the tax rate adopted at the county level. This enrichment tax would be limited to no more than 40 percent of the tax rate adopted at the county level. Thus if the people in a county unit voted to adopt a dollar tax rate, then each individual school district could, if it chose, impose an

above that dollar. The county unit system accomplishes a great deal of equalization by consolidating the tax bases of school districts within counties. CEDs did the same thing. However, the refreshing aspect of the county unit system plan is that in West Texas, there would no longer be multi-county CEDs rather each county would have its own county unit. Even more refreshing from my point of view is the taxpayers within the county would be allowed to select a tax rate as opposed This approach to the to having one crammed creation of the county unit down their throats by the Legislature in Austin.

A question that always comes up is, how would this plan handle school districts like Dalhart ISD that exist in two counties? if the two counties have adopted different tax rates. My bill on the other hand would simply attach a multicounty school district to the county in which the administration building of the school district exists. So that if the administration building of the Dalhart ISD is in Dalhart the people who live within DISD and also Hartley County would vote in the Dallam County election. My approach would avoid the problem of a school district having revenues per student from one county that were more than from the other county.

There are a whole host of other issues that must be addressed before we can adopt a county unit system. I believe these issues can be resolved. More importantly, I believe that the politics within the Texas Legislature very positive. That is to say I believe that we are closer than ever to adopting a constitutional school funding That assumes, of course, that my plan doesn't die over the holidays.





DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Vire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA CS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop. DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

#### **DS1 Local Loop**
