25° Stamp?

Postal officials are in the process of raising rates to avoid a deficit in 1989. A request has been made to raise the cost of a first class letter to 25 cents from 22 cents, the current price set in 1985.

Overall the complicated series of rate increases is 17.5 percent and will not only effect first class mail but rates on advertising mail and other classes as well.

An overview of first class postage rate increases is as follows: 1885, 2 cents; 1932, 6 cents; 1958, 4 cents; 1963, 5 cents; 1968, 6 cents; 1971, 8 cents; 1974, 10 cents; 1975, 13 cents; 1978, 15 cents; March 1981, 18 cents; November 1981, 20 cents; 1985, 22 cents.

DPS Officers Worked 11 Accidents In Storm

Groom DPS officers were kept busy during last week's sudden return of winter weather Wednesday night and Thursday. The three patrolmen worked 11 accidents on I-40 and reported patrolmen in Panhandle handled another seven accidents on Highway 60.

Patrolman Gary Davis said conditions were the worst for this winter with heavy ice building up on I-40 before the snow fell. The access roads remained in better condition than I-40.

Estate Seminar Scheduled For

Farmers.

Farmers and ranchers have been concerned for years about high taxes that erode their estates. To help take the bite out of their high estate taxes, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is planning several educational programs.

A two-day seminar is planned for Amarillo, March 28-29, 1988, which will help farmers and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operations the next generation without tax and administrative burdens.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer and Extension Economist. "The best tax planning of the past may be the worst under the new

The seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes, including deductions,

expenses and tax rates.

Basic estate planning devices will be explained in depth. Among these are wills, by-pass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

Relating estate plans to income tax savings can be of even greater benefit than just thinking about an estate plan. In fact, sometimes income tax savings can even be greater than estate tax savings for people with commercial farm and ranch busi-

There will also be a separate segment of the program devoted to treating beneficiaries fairly. This is a most important subject when there is a farm or ranch in the family and only part of the heirs want to run

Another discussion will center on estate planning tools for agriculture and will deal with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs

The second day of the program will be devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture. These include special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance, "flower" bonds and other property.

"Estate planning is a step toward reduced taxes, points out Hayenga. "This process should start when you plan to inherit substantial property, when you have an active and growing business, when you still have time to take tax-saving actions, when you have minor children and when your children marry or divorce."





Ccronado Hospital Has Screening Program

Coronado Hospital will again participate in the Texas Breast Screening Project sponsored by the American Cancer Society, according to Norman Knox, administrator of the hospital. Because of the tremendous response in 1987 of over 100,000 Texas women, the ACS decided to promote the project again.

The 1988 Texas Breast Screening Project will once provide low-cost screening mammograms to sympton-free women for a limited period. Coronado Hospital is offering the screens for \$50 from April 1 through April 30. Anyone wishing to have the low-dose mammogram should call the hospital at 665-3721 to make an appointment. The \$50 fee includes all charges, the hospital said. Reports from the mammogram will be mailed to the woman's physician who will share the results with her.

The project's long-term goal is to increase awareness of the need for routine mammography for the early detection of breast cancer.

In conjunction with the project the hospital will sponsor a free seminar on breast cancer March 24 at 7 p.m. until 8:30 at the hospital. Dr. Moss Hampton will

Page 8-THE GROOM NEWS discuss breast self examination (BSE) and Dr. Fred Juan will explain the surgical procedures used to cure breast cancer. A film explaining BSE will be shown and the participants at the seminar will be taken on a tour of the mammography room.

Insurance companies in the state have been mandated by Texas law to begin coverage of screening mammograms, as of this year. Women who have insurance should check with their insurance carrier to see when during the year this coverage will take effect for them. Those who have the screening procedure done at Coronado Hospital will be asked to pay cash, but will beprovided with appropriate forms with which to bill their insurance.

The American Cancer Society encourages women over the age of 35 who are symptom free-that is, without a single, abnormal breast lump- to routinely have a screening mammographic examination. One in every ten American women will develop breast cancer at some time during her life. Since physicians do not yet know how to prevent breast cancer, the best protection is early detection. Chances of cure are excellent when tumors are detected early. while they are still small and confined to the breast.

A baseline mammogram performed should be between ages 35 and 40. Then, women age 40 and older should have a mammogram every one to two years, depending on the advice of their physician. And after age 50, women should have a mammogram every year, ACS according to guidelines

Dr. George Peters, volunteer chairman of the state screening project said that the American Cancer Society waged an campaign to promote the routine use of the Pap test. By convincing American women of the lifesaving importance of that test, the incidence of death from cervical cancer has declined significantly.

Medicare Sign-up

March is the last month of the 1988 general enrollment period for people who failed to sign up for Medicare medical insurance at their first chance.

There is a general enrollment period during the first three months of the year. Also eligible to enroll at this time are people who once had medical insurance but who dropped this protection.

Medical protection will start July 1, 1988, for people who sign up during the general enrollment period. The basic monthly premium for medical insurance is \$24.80 for the period ending December 1988. The basic premium is increased by 10 percent for each year a person could have had this protection but did not.

The premium paid by those with medical insurance represents about one-fourth of the costs. The remaining amount is paid by the Federal Government from general revenues.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services, out-patient hospital services and many other items and services not covered by the hospital insurance part of Medicare.

In general, after a person has had \$75 in approved charges for covered medical expenses in a year—the annual deductible medical insurance will pay 80 percent of the approved charges for any additional covered services a person has during the rest of the

The purpose of mantaining crop residues, protects cultivated fields during critical erosion periods. Crop residues conserve moisture, increases infiltration, reduces soil loss and improves

Mulch tillage is one method of managing crop residues for row crop protec-Modern mulch tion. machines can prepare a seedbed, apply fertilizer, plant the crop see and apply all in one operation. Even though this can be done, not all farmers choose to complete all jobs in the one operation. It costs about \$2 a mile to pull a tillage implement with a tractor, so it pays to hold trips across a field to the minimum.

Researchers have found that soils in mulch-tilled plots are higher in moisture than those in conventionally tilled plots during the growing season. Many farmers report that mulch tilled fields generally do not show moisture stress as soon conventionally tilled fields during dry periods.

Large quantities of crop residue on the soil surface usually require some weed Farmers using mulch tillage rely entirely on chemicals for weed control may find it necessary to use some mechanical cultivation. But remember that cultivation buries the residue and increase

One method of handling the planting of crops in double cropping systems may be answered by minitillage. machinery available, a crop
