Commissioners Impose \$5.00 **Road Fee**

Carson County Commissioners Court at a regular meeting, July 27, 1987, voted to impose the optional five dollar County Road and Bridge fee for the year 1988. In accordance with the Attorney General, counties, when implementing the first year's collection of the \$5.00 fee, are not authorized to collect the additional fee on January renewals until after January 31. However, on and after January 1, 1988, the \$5.00 fee is due in all other situations, including February renewals, new and out-of-state vehicles, etc. The \$5.00 fee will not be collected on machinery, farm trailer, disaster relief, permit license plates or temporary registration permits. Tax Assessor/Collector C.L. Sterling stated that on January renewals processed in January, the \$5.00 fee will not be collected in Carson County. If the January renewal is processed after January 31, the \$5.00 fee will be collected. The entire

renewal form must be presented to the county tax office at the time of registration, stated Sterling.

Bill Bomars' Works Displayed

Contemporary Mexico Artist Bill Bomars' "Winged Creature Collages", as well as other selected works, will be on exhibit at the Carson County Square House Museum in Panhandle January 2, 1988 until February 7, 1988. The exhibit primarily features the present involvment of Bomar --25 winged creature collages-completed on Chi-nese stenciled paper. Color and material are artistically joined to make this collection one of the best contemporary exhibits ever shown at the Square House. The Bomar exhibit contains 41 works ranging from small collages to large oils on convas.

Bomar (1919-), a native of Fort Worth, Texas, first exhibited in a group show, "Six Texas Painters," at the Weyhe Gallery in New York in 1944. This show was follow-

followed by six one-man shows and his participation in two Whitney Biennials. After moving to Ranchos de Taos in 1974, Bomar had two one-man shows at the Stables Gallery of Taos Art Association. Bomars' paintings are in the permanent collections of the Guggenheim Museum, New York; Dallas Museum of Fine Art; Houston Museum of Fine ARt; Ft. Worth Art Musuem; Brooklyn Museum, New York; Museum of Fine Art, Santa Fe; and Harwood Foundation of the University of New Mexico, Taos. Bill Bomar began painting in oils at the age of six. He studied at the Cranbrook Art Academy in 1940-41. Additionally, Bomar studied with John Slaon and Joe Bakos. He received criticism from Azenfant, and then studied with Hans Hoffman, a counter-balance to Ozenfant. Admission to the Bill Bomar "Winged Creature Collages" is free, the public is encouraged to attend. The Square House Museum is open Monday through Friday 8:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. and Sunday 1 p.m. until 5 p.m.

Officers Report No Accidents

DPS officers announced this week that during 1987, a total of 3,912 tickets were filed for motor vehicle violations. Of those citations, 1,614 were issued to drivers of trucks. Another 1,562 warning tickets were issued to drivers for traffic violations.

The troopers also investigated 85 accidents with only one fatality reported occuring in July.

Warrants were served on 53 persons after being stopped on routine traffic violations driver's license checks indicated they were wanted in connection with other warrants. Officers also made 12 arrests stemming on felony charges.

There were 14 persons arrested on driving while intocicated (DWI) charges.





Winter Storms Cause **Second Fatality In Area**

For the second time during the month of December. icy roads claimed the life of a traveler on 1-40 near Mc-Lean. The accident occured at about 12:30 in the afternoon of Christmas Day. About 5 miles west of Mc-Lean, a Nissan van being driven by Jerry Steed of Sierra Vista, Ariz. was traveling east on the highway. The driver apparently lost control of the vehicle on the ice-packed road and slid into an overpass pillar. Mr. . Steed was taken to Shamrock Hospital by the McLean Ambulance Service. He died at 12:45 a.m. on Saturday,

Dec. 26. Passengers in the vehicle included Steed's wife, nineyear-old son and two-monthold daughter. The boy suffered a slight concussion. Other than that, no one else was injured.

This accident was only one of 16 that occured between Dec. 25 and Dec. 27 along the interstate. DPS Officer Ronnie Shank, who helped investigate these incidents, injuries and some of those hurt had to be transported to Shamrock and Coronado Hospitals. However, it appears that most of the iniuries were not serious.

Earlier in the month, on Dec. 13, Lawrence Alexander Smith, Sr., of Visalia, Ca., was killed when the semi he was driving skidded on the ice and snow-packed roads, slammed into a dirt embankment and burst into flames.

Drunk Driving Fatalities Decline

Drunk driver fatalities in Texas are decreasing.

Findings of a study made for the highway department based on post mortem examinations indicate the percentage of intoxicated drivers fatally injured in traffic accidents dropped from 51 percent in 1983 to 46 percent in 1986.

The Texas Transportation Institute of Texas A&M University studied medical blood-alcohol examiners' concentration tests from 2,300 driver fatalities during the 1983-1986 period.

The figures were released in conjunction with National

Drunk and Drugged Drivers Awareness December 13-19.

While driving while intoxicated fatalities in Texas decreased, they still were above the national average. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates fatally inju ed drivers who were legally nationw de intoxicated declined from 42 percent in 1983 to 39 percent in 1986.

Week,

Other findings suggest many fatally injured drivers were more than just social drinkers. The average bloodalcohol concentration of drivers killed in 1986 who were above the 0.10 legal intoxication limit was over twice that limit at 0.209.

Legally intoxicated driver were highest fatalities among males and driver; in their 20s. A high proportion resulted from single accidents and vehicle accidents occurring late at night and early in the morn-

The study stressed the need for complete bloodalcohol concentration testing and reporting for all driver fatalities.

"Furthermore, until data are available for all drivers involved in fatal accidents, not just those who


were fatally injured themselves, the full extent of the drunk driving problem will never be known," Hatfield said.

Gary Trietsch, state safety and traffic operations engi-neer, said, "We're pleased to see reduction in drunk driving fatalities in Texas and commend law enforcement agencies for improvement in reporting alcohol involvement- in traffic accident reports. However, much remains to be done to continue reducing the drinking problem on our highways."



The meeting will start at 9:30 a.m. at the Holiday Inn Civic Center in Lubbock. Registration will start at 8:00

Ed Blackwell, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Panhandle, said farmers, conservationists, and others interested in the use of wind strips are invited to attend.

'In cooperation with SCS, Texas Tech University scientists have completed a three-year study to analyze the feasibility of using perennial grass wind strips to reduce erosion," Black-well said. "The study indicates that wind strips are an efficient way to reduce erosion on cropland in West Texas, especially in the lighter soils."


