A group of concerned farmers met Monday afternoon to discuss the cost of natural gas to their farming operation. The meeting, held at the Groom Com-Center, munity was organized Roman by

Friemel, Denny Babcock, Paul Fields and Breeze Kuehler. Approximately 30 farmers attended. Most of the men are currently doing business with mainly two companies, West Texas Gas and Trans Texas, a

subsidiary of Producers Utilities, who supplies the City of Groom with gas service.

Much of the problem seems to stem from what they consider inflated rates compared to other




Temporary Help Assists At Post Office

Our interim officer in charge (OIC) is Janis Cannon of Skellytown. She has worked for the postal service for 2 years. She is married and has two children. Her husband, Willie works for Phillips Petroleum Co. Son Josh, age 12 is in the 6th grade and daughter Jessica, age 8 is in the 2nd grade and both

attend school at Spring Creek. Ms. Cannon worked previously for K-Mart as a Merchandiser.

farmers at the meeting were customers of Trans Texas, much of their discussion centered around that company. Documentation was shown, where letters had been sent to the gas user, notifying them of rate increases and the reasons for the increase. Response letters were shown where area farmers had protested the increase. In almost every case, CEO of Trans Texas, Morris Shapiro, had revoked or reduced the increase, only to wait a few months before again increasing the price.

Roman Friemel stated, 'Everytime we went to Shapiro, he came down on the price, but it was always back up within 6 months."

In most of Mr. Shapiro's letters he stated as one of the main reasons for the price hike was increased cost from his supplier, Northern Natural. Paul Fields stated that it was a matter of public record that Trans Texas was

paying only \$14.00 per month on all the gas they get out of one well which pumps about 10-14 MCF per month. According to Fields they have a copy of a sales contract that states this. Mr. Friemel went on to say that according to spot price information, Trans Texas had to be making about \$1.25 per MCF clear profit.

Roman Friemel, who was formerly a customer of West Texas Gas, recently switched to Cibolia, which is just a marketing firm. They are buying gas from Northern Natural. Mr. Friemel was paying \$2.33 MCF in June. He switched in July the price per MCF dropped to 1.65. Mr. Friemel said that he saved between the period of July 1st through October \$15,081.66.

"Over a year's time I'm sure I will save about \$30,000.00," he said.

contact with several major companies and independents that supply services similar to Trans Texas. With their advice they proposed to the group to form a Gas Users Association. The purpose would be to explore ways to find cheaper supplies of gas and eventually own their own gas lines as a cooperative.

One company proposed that they could come in, lay new lines, supply cheaper gas (estimated at about \$2.00 BTU) and the group would have paid their investment back in two years time. Fields contended that one of the reasons Trans Texas was so high was that the overall condition of the lines were old and poorly maintained. Leakage caused from these old lines was being sub-sidized by the farmers. Mr. Fields stated that the



As the world stands poised and waiting, we find ourselves on the very brink of a third world war, thoughts turn back to a day 49 years ago when time stood still and lives were forever changed. No one could have foreseen how that few minutes on an island several thousand miles from the United States would start a chain of events that would make the proudest nation in the world fall to her knees and cry out in rage

The day was December 7. 1941. Sunday morning. Most of Europe was already at war with Germany. America was talking about the possibility of entering the fight against Hitler. No one dreamed how rapidly that would occur. The effects of the depression were still very much a reality in the everyday lives of most people. Although bureaucratic raged, most people were concerned with making a living for their family. The world was a much larger place then and news was slow in getting around. To most people it really seemed not to touch the average American.

Before the smoke had cleared on that fateful morning, life as most knew it would never be the same. Much of the population of Groom is of that WWII generation and the effects it had on their lives is as far reaching as it was the whole country.

Betty West, who at the time was living with her parents on their farm near McLean said, "I couldn't understand the concept of

in front of children. I remember how quiet it was as everyone sat waiting for news. Later I remember seeing a picture of a woman standing alone with a child. When I asked my mother about it she said that the woman was alone because her husband was killed in the war. I think that is when some of the gravity of the

situation hit me." A. J. Newsome was at home in Wayside. His family had just returned from a get-together when it came over the radio. He remembers the reaction of the adults around him. Fear was touching everyone. Many boys he knew were immediately drafted. His wife, Leona, recalls the

shock of returning from Mass and finding out what had happened. Her parents, being very upset because they had three sons who all, eventually, served in the Armed Forces.

Doris Kuehler, living at Grandview then, heard it on the radio too. "I can remember sitting in front of that radio, it must have been at least four foot tall, for hours just waiting to hear anything about what had happened."

Kenneth Black was duck hunting north of Groom when he heard the news. "Everyone was in a state of shock." His wife, immediately felt the effects, her brother signed up the very next day.

Norris Hoyt was working for Glen Ritter at the time. When he came in for lunch Mr. Ritter broke the news to him.

Of course, every cloud has a silver lining, Dan Ashford had no trouble at all recalling where he was and what he was doing. "I was pulling bolls (cotton) in Northfield,

Texas. I was so glad to get out of that cotton patch that I felt like sending the Japanese a Thank you note! The next morning I climbed on a bus back to East Texas. I had already taken my physical. I was immediately called."

Art Britten remembered sitting in the old high school auditorium the next day, listening to a radio that had been brought in, as Roosevelt declared war, and of the boys sitting there together-three never returned.

Waiting it seemed was one of the really hard parts. waiting for news was a big event. Today we hear about events nearly as they happen. Methods have changed but war is still war. The media and all the high technology available at our finger tips will not make it anything else. To mothers, fathers, husbands, wives and children who have someone far away the waiting is still the hardest part of all.








Tigers VS Ft. Hancock—Semi-Finals
