School Board Reviews Budget

A report of Groom students completing the Texas Education of Minimum Skills Exit Test was given at the regular School Board meeting on December 15.

The test is administered to all Junior class members as a prerequisite for graduation. According to the report, 99 percent of the eleventh grade at Groom Schools completed the test satisfactorially.

Bill M. Baker, Certified Public Accountant of Borger was present to give the official report on the audit findings for school finances during the 1987-88 school year. Baker presented copies of the audit to board members and answered questions concerning the audit practices.

The Special Education Handbook, updated in September 1988 was approved by the board. A copy is kept on file in the office of the School Superintendent.

Groom City Councilmen; Bill Homer, Jimmy Britten, Ronny Fields, Jerry Thornton and Mayor Alfred Homer, met for their first meeting of the 1989 year on January 3, at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall.

A short agenda was reviewed by the council. The first item on the agenda, was the approval of the prior meetings minutes. The minutes were approved as read.

Bill Homer made a motion to the Council to approve an exemption of \$9,000 for the Groom property owners who are over 65 years of age in the 1989 tax year. Jerry Thornton seconded the motion. The motion carried with all councilmen approving.

The need for a new office chair for secretary, Pat Ashford was discussed by the council. The council approved the motion made by Jimmy Britten and seconded by Jerry Thornton, for Pat to purchase a chair at her own discretion.

Sheriff's Office Notes Groom Burglaries

Jerry Gaines reported on Monday that his plans to leave Grrom have changed. Gaines stated that leaving Groom was like leaving family and that after discussing the matter with Sheriff Terry Timmons, both agreed that Gaines would continue to serve in Groom where he has served as deputy for the past 10 years.

Last week the News Office reported that Tim Taylor would be moving to Groom, as of press time that decision had been changed. Tim will either be located in Panhandle or White Deer. At presstime that information was not yet known.

Numerous reports of burglary have been reported to the Carson County Sheriff's Department lately. The most recent was reported by Kenneth Sweatt at Groom ISD. According to Deputy Jerry Gaines, the intruder or intruders gained entry to the school through a door located near the pool. Bowers farms some 2,860 acres of his own with an additional 1,624 acres involved in a corporation. He also does custom farming on 1,280 acres.

He raises wheat, grain sorghum, and has gone more heavily into the cow-calf business this past year.

During this meeting held on Wednesday, December 7, S.W. True was re-elected as President of the Texas Farm Bureau. The board also selected Bob Turner of Voss as vice president and Steven Bearden of Harlingen as secretary-treasurer.

Delegates totaling 1,027 adopted several resolutions concerning the farm program. Among these was support for extension of the marketing loan concept to include wheat, feed grain and soybeans.

They supported efforts on the new farm bill to stop reductions of target and loan prices on all commodities and to update or use current Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service yields.

All board members were present including Howard Britten, Dennis Babcock, Don Lyles, C.D. Fields, Bill England, Janice Weinheimer and Gary Friemel.

Superintendent Rex Peeples, Principal Kenneth Business Sweatt, and Manager Joyce Hutsell were also in attendance, along with the following visitors, Susan Burgin, Debra Addy, Zeldon Jenkins, Jay Lamb, Michael Rose Jason Eschle, Glynda Eschle, Matt Weinheimer, Nila Burgin, and Annetta Childress. They favored a voluntary crop rotation of non-program crops without history of crops in government program.

Texas Agriculture 1988 A Year Hardship and Prosperity

Many Texas farmers and ranchers will remember 1988 as the year of the "big drought." But, more importantly, it was a year of contrasts-one that boasted large doses of both "good and bad."

The drought would have been even more devastating had it not been for good reasonably soil moisture over much of the state at the start of the crop season. Sparse rainfall during the growing season impacted heavily on crop and forage production in many areas, and those dry conditions continued through the year.

As 1988 drew to a close, rainfall deficits were prominent in many locations, particularly in southern southwestern, central, eastern and coastal regions. Some locations logged amounts of rain that were only 40 to 50 percent of normal. A good example was College Station, which annually receives just over 39 inches of rain. It came up more than 21 inches short for 1988.

Drought Only Part of Story The drought was only part of Texas' agricultural history in 1988. Strangely enough, while the traditionally highrainfall areas were suffering, the normally arid areas of western Texas and the plains were having a rare year of surplus rain.

Amarillo, for example, finished the year with about 6 inches more rain than its yearly average. Plain iew logged more than 7 inches of above normal rain while Fort Stockton and El Paso had "wet" years with rainfal of about 3 inches above average.

With that kind of scenario for the state, 1988 tested the mettle of most farmers and ranchers. Crop planting got off on schedule in most a reas although some farmers waited for rain to plant. In many southern coun ies. thouth, those rains never came and crops languished. Some corn and sorghum did not yield enough to pay for harvesting costs, so farmers cut the crops for hay or silage or turned their fields over to cattle to salvage the remnants.

Green Grazing for Cattle In a few cases, with red crops provided the only "green" grazing that cattle had during the course of the year. Others had to be satisfied with prickly pear once ranchers burned off the thorns. This lack of for age on pastures and range: in many areas caused sizeable reductions in cattle herds and also limited hay production."

Because of extremely short hay supplies in many counties, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service initiated a weekly report to monitor the volume of "for sale" hay on a county-by-county basis to help hay-deficit producers.

Generally, enough hay was produced in Texas to meet demands, but distribution proved to be a major concern. Hay surpluses abounded in many western areas as well as in some north central and northeastern counties.

As far as crop porduction is concerned, yields as a whole were only slightly off average levels. Of course, averages can be misleading--and certainly were in 1988. Some crops in South Texas yielded next to nothing while bumper yields were the norm over much of western Texas and the plains.

Somewhat higher market prices took some of the pjain away from farmers who experienced low yields although cotton prices were down some due to large supplies. Also, participation in government programs provided farmers some security.





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
