

The War Memorial Board, consisting of Chairman Joyce Hoffman, Ava Hale, Dixie Surratt, and Jean Cox, gave the annual report for the building upkeep and budget. The board requested suggestions for obtaining revenue to cover increasing costs of the building. Dixie Surratt will study past history and laws governing the use of the

building to determine if any charges or donations can be collected on a regular basis. Ava Hale submitted her resignation from the board, after serving since 1985.

Gary Beddingfield met with the court to discuss hazard insurance coverage of county property.

Beddingfield reported that

were under the 80% total were under the 80% total replacement costs. Some increase in coverage was discussed for current policies and areas not adequately covered. Beddingfield said it would take an additional coverage of \$7,039.00 per year to increase the plan.

Carson County Tax-Assessor Collector Barbara Cosper met with the court for approval on measures for the 1999 tax year. It was decided to set the optional homestead exemption at 20%. Also adopted were

October, 2% in November and 1% in November December. December. A policy to accept installment agreements for payments on delinquent taxes and partial payments on current taxes was adopted. Cosper reported that 95.66 per cent of the county's taxes have been collected as of March 31,

county's taxes have been collected as of March 31, 1999.

A safe-keeping release from First Bank & Trust of White Deer - cusip #3133 M 6 P 6 9 for \$250,000.00 was replaced with cusip #313A2682 in the same amount.

Carson County Sheriff Loren Brand petitioned the court for additional manpower in the jail/field area. Sheriff Brand stated that four full-time dispatcher/jailers are now employed by the county. According to the jail commission standards, the average daily jail population exceeds the recommendations of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. The request was allowed for additional help at an

annual base salary of \$16,863.00.

Fire service agreements with the cities throughout the county were discussed. The county currently pays \$100.00 per ambulance call, \$350.00 per fire run and \$3,500.00 a year to each \$3,500.00 a year to each city for capital improvements. Carson County Auditor Jacqueline West will report to the court an average amount paid to the entities over the past five years.

## To Be Installed In Hall Of Fame



(Editors Note: You would probably have to be in the newspaper business in order to realize what a great achievement it is to be installed into the Hall of Fame. We ask that you join with us in paying tribute to a man who for 61 years has reported the accomplishments of others, was the behind the scenes cheerleader for community and our family and has never wanted or needed recognition for himself.)

Joseph J. Miller, resident and owner for 38 years of the local newspaper, The White Deer News, has been elected by his peers to the Panhandle Press Association's Hall of recipient's life time achievement in the Newspaper industry. Miller and his wife Jean purchased the small, weekly newspaper from the Cavenaughs in August 1961. The White Deer News had been in operation less than a year when the Millers pulled up stakes in Chickasha, Oklahoma to purchase the newspaper and commercial print shop. Miller said, "The responsibility of our own newspaper and making a living here was very much a concern with three young children."

He came to White Deer after beginning his newspaper

children."

He came to White Deer after beginning his newspaper career at the age of nine with the Oklahoma News by selling papers on the street. When he reached fourteen years of age, he was old enough to get a job at the local, daily newspaper, Chickasha Daily Express. He posted bond and worked partime delivering and selling papers, working in the composing room, pouring pigs (melting lead for type), cleaning the Linotype machines and pulled packard (catching papers as they came off the press). From 1946 to 1951 Miller served his apprenticeship as a journeyman and printer's devil when he passed his Typographical Union Test. He continued to work with the newspaper and attend school prior to Uncle Sam's calling on him to perform

another of his duties and responsibilities to World War II.

He entered Ft. Robinson, Arkansas in April 1944 at the age of 18 and with World War II in full action. He was drafted as one of the youngest to enter World War II. It was in April 1945 and for the next seven months, it would be his company's service and responsibility to stop the Japanese aggression in the Philippines. Joe said, "It was our job to push the Japanese out of the Philippines one hill at a time." Miller entered combat placed in the Sixth Infantry Division, Company G, 63rd Infantry. They were known as the now infamous "Red Star Doughboys".

On August 15, 1945 General Douglas McArthur ordered a cease fire after President Truman dropped the second atomic bomb on Japan. General McArthur was head of all the Pacific forces, located in Manila to sign the peace treaty. But the Japanese were in the Luzon mountains and did not believe the American's white flags being waved meant that the war was over. So Miller and his company had to stay in the fields and foxholes for two more weeks until the Japanese surrendered. As the Japanese General Tomayuki, known as the "Tiger of Malaya" Yamashita was taken to Manila by jeep and by American escort, Miller was there to witness the history making transportation of Yamashita to the peace signings. Yamashita surrendered to the 6th Division in Kiangan, an area of the Luzan, Philippine Islands.

The 63rd Infantry and Corporal Miller were awarded a

The 63rd Infantry and Corporal Miller were awarded a presidential citation for action taken near Kiangan. "Our division is proud of the number of Presidential citations it has received. These citations were for outstanding gallantry and heroism against the enemy have been confirmed in General Orders of the Department of the Army in the name of the President of the United States as public evidence of deserved honor and distinction," Major General C.E. Hurdis commented. Miller was awarded other medals, decorations and citations. Some of them included: Good Conduct Medal, American Theater Ribbon, Victory Ribbon, Philippine Liberation Ribbon, Combat Infantry Badge, and See Miller, pg. 5

So now with the war over, Miller had a little more time to serve his country. He was sent to Korea where the Americans had to force the Japanese and communists out of South Korea. "It was after the clear-out, the job was completed and I was on the next ship home," he said. When Miller's stint in World War II was complete, after

thousands of Americans, like Joe Miller, obtained their goal in stopping the spread of communism and protecting the United States' way of life, his newspaper career began again. Ironically, the pledge he made at the tender age of eighteen, to serve and protect the constitution of the United States, would be utilized for many years to come. The precious benefits of freedom of speech and freedom of the press would loom large in the newspaper industry and Joe Millers daily life. He returned to the daily newspaper where he worked in production, and later was promoted to production manager and composing room foreman. The next fifteen years were spent back at the Daily Express. Miller and the newspaper career would never part again. He married Melva Jean Howard in April 1951. So with the war over, back at work at the newspaper, they were expecting their first child. Phillip J. was born in 1953. Teri Jean came along in 1955 and Rodney Joseph was born in 1959. thousands of Americans, like Joe Miller, obtained their

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As the newspaper industry changed as it has many, many times throughout Miller's career, he had always dreamed of owning and publishing his own newspaper, somewhere.

Locating a small and young newspaper for sale in White Deer, Texas some 220 miles west from the only place he had ever called home, the decision was made to make the move.

Miller said, "The decision came after much discussion and receiver."

Once in White Deer, hot type was the process used to publish the paper. The old two-cylinder flat bed sheet fed press was used for ten years in the shop. Then it was to the folding tables where the whole family turned and folded papers as they came off the press. "So I had very little time to even think of failing this mission," he explained. Joe tells the story of a man in White Deer that told him that he

would never make it six months here. Well, it has been thirty-eight years.

Miller purchased the Panhandle Herald in 1971 from Don Peoples. It was at this time Miller changed the typesetting of the straight matter of the news on IBM typesetting of the straight matter of the news on IBM typewriters. The headlines and ads were hand set, then taken to Amarillo to be printed as the "offset" age came about for the local newspapers. In his many years of working, Joe has seen the linotype machine go the way of the dinosaur, the computer age began slowly but rapidly took over.

Joseph J. Miller was born on January 26, 1926 in Chickasha, Oklahoma as the third child to Charles and Era Miller. "Growing up in the depression in central Oklahoma, Miller said, times were pretty tough at times, especially on town folks where food was sometimes hard to come by compared to some of the country families I knew."

Charles and Era Miller lost their first child at nine months in 1922. Then came big sister, Mary Catherine in 1923. Joe was born 3 years later before Catherine and Joe welcomed little brother, William John.

All three children attended a Catholic school taught entirely by nuns, just 3 blocks from their home in Chickasha until graduation.

Joe Miller will be recognized for his years of service and dedication to the newspaper industry Saturday, April 17, 1999 at the noon luncheon of The Panhandle Press Association's 89th Annual Convention at the Ambassador Hotel In Amarillo.

The Panhandle Press Association is made up of newspaper members that include the Texas panhandle down to Lubbock over to Childress, western Oklahoma and eastern New Mexico. Members meet annually to discuss concerns of the newspaper business, attend seminars and have a press contest.

Joe is semi-retired from The White Deer News and The Panhandle Herald. He is a stockholder in Palo Duro Offset Printing Company in Canyon. But his expertise with newspapers is still in great demand on Monday and Tuesday, helping the newspaper staff meet their deadline. Joe's youngest son, Rodney has been helping with the newspapers the past couple of years. Daughter Teri is a first grade teacher in Canyon and the oldest son, Phil is in his 23rd year of newspaper business in Groom, McLean and Claude. His wife Jean has been teaching in the White Deer School system for over 36 years now. Joe and Jean have 5 grandchildren and one great-grand daughter.
