## Smell.

Natural gas algne does not have a distinctive odor. Sometimes natural gas contains additives to give it a specific odor resembling rotten egg, skunk or sulfur.

## Sound.

Don't ignore hissing, blowing or roaring
sounds. Even subtle noises could indicate a natural gas leak.

## Sight.

Keep your eyes open for visible clues of a natural gas leak. Such warning signs include water or dirt blowing in the air, persistent bubbling in standing water, discoloration of vesetation or actual natural gas coming up
from the
ground.

If you discover or suspect any of these
warning signs, leave the area immediately.
Do not operate motor vehicles or equipment nearby, and forego any activity that could generate a spark. You should immediately contact your local emergency outhorities and the pipeline operator. For ONEOK Field Services, call 1-888-675-3302.
