Football Main Topic At Local **Board Meeting**

Coach Terry Coffee met with the Groom School Board last Tuesday night fielding questions on the transition from eleven-man football to a six-man program as well as various questions concerning his policies in the current foot-

ball program.

Board member Bill
England questioned policies on whether or not coaches would allow a person to join the team that did not participate in two-a-day drills at the opening of each season.

Coffee answered, "That decision is mine to make, but it would depend on whether circumstances preventing the kid from attending practices were beyond the kid's control." coaches would decide that question on an individual

England also asked what the policy was for letting a person come out in mid-

Coffee stated, "ultimately, that would be the coaches decision, but any kid allowed to come out in mid-season See School Board, Page 4

junior high team has not won a game in three years, quite a change for Groom which two years before fielded district champs. "We would be more viable competitors in the next few years," says Coffee, "playing six man football."

The need to make the decision now is to be included in a district. District divisions are set up every two years, if area schools considering the change wait past the deadline, they will play no-honors ball meaning that the teams are on pro-bation and cannot win disdual honors and they will play out-law schedules, playing whatever teams coaches can line up.

Schools in the area considering six man teams are Groom, McLean, Follett and Claude. Coffee stated that a district could easily be formed in the area if several districts make the switch.

Lefors School converted their program two years ago because their numbers of eligible players were too dwindling. Their team has to travel as far away as 150 miles for games. This year's schedule included Texline,

Silverton, Patton Springs, Higgins, Guthrie, Miami and North Side Vernon. School officials say having area teams eligible to compete would be a benefit for all concerned.

Coffee says he sees no problem for coaches making the conversion to six man football and supporters in Miami and Lefors are just as avid over the six man football as the old eleven man style.

Local school officials see

The decision rests with the school board who plan to take a vote on whether to weather the storm with an 11-member team or convert to six man in their November 10 meeting. Coaches see the conversion as a definite advantage to the team's ability to be competitive at the sport in the next few years.



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

Doughboy Recalls WW I

series of articles on Mc-Lean's fighting men. We started with the first half of a profile of Walter Evans, the only World War I veteran left in McLean. As you may remember, he had been a cowboy in the years before the war and signed up in March 1918. After going through basic training in San Antonio and Atlanta, he shipped out from New York to France in mid-1918. He was a member of the Motor Transport Company whose duty it was to carry ammunition and supplies to units in combat.

Evans went across the Atlantic Ocean in a convoy of 24 ships, including freighters and one battleship. The convoy was constantly hurassed by German submurines. In fact, during the 18 day trip, a U-boat tried to torpedo the ship carrying Evans. The torpedo missed but hit and sank the boat next to it. Twelve people were killed in the incident but, fortunatley, the rest were saved.

"The trip took 18 days,"
Evans said, "and for three of those days and nights we were pretty nervous because the battleship protecting ts had turned back and the sub chasers that were supposed to meet us were late. We had no protection for those three days."

He finally arrived in France on July 12, 1913. After several transfers to different locations, he ended up in Motor Transport Company whose job it was to haul ammunition and supplies to the front. He and 12 other men were the first ones assigned to the company but by the end of the

war there were over 1,000 men in the unit.

"We drove solid tire quad trucks with no cab," he said.
"And it didn't matter if it was raining or snowing, we still had to drive. The most unpleasant thing about the whole experience was having to drive in that bad weather with no cab on the truck."

Because the vehicles were going right up to the front, where the fighting was going on, they were not permitted to use their lights. "We would pull up close to where the fighting was going on and wait for someone to guide us in to drop off our loads," he said. "There were so many holes from all the exploded artillery shells that we couldn't get in without the guide."

Although he and his company were constantly under attack by artillery, Evans said his closest call came from another source. "I was in line waiting to be guided in to drop off my load when an artillery shell exploded. We all thought it had poison gas in it I was standing outside my truck and had left my gas mask in the front seat. From that point on, I always kept my mask around my neck."

He had another close call in 1918 but it had nothing to do with the war. During that year, a massive flu epidemic swept the entire world. As Evans put it, "In 1918, we actually had more men die from the flu than from combat wounds. I heard of one unit that lost 80 men because of it."

Evans was one of those who caught the virus and lived to tell about it. "I had been wet for three days and

during that whole time." he said. "When I got sick I was afraid to go to the hospital because it seemed like everyone who got sick and went to the hospital died. I had a company commander who said his mother's favorite remedy for sickness was to take some whiskey with lemon and then just sweat it out. And that's just what I did. Every time a doctor would come around to look for people to take to the hospital, I would just hide until he left. I never was so hot and sick in my life but I

finally just sweated it out." World War I was famous for its artillery barrages and Evans saw a prime example of why the war earned that reputation. "We were hauling ammo and supplies to the mountain town of Metz, France," he said. "The Germans had taken it from the French and the French were trying to get it back with the help of the Americans. The Allies hit Metz with an artillery barrage that lasted for about two hours. By the time it was over, the town was almost completely destroyed. There was so much artillery that every time we tried to walk the vibrations of the explosions would knock us down.

It wasn't all bad for Evans while in France. One time, he reports, he and 18 others got a long furlough and went to Grenoble in southern France. "We stayed in the best hotels where the weal-thy stayed in peacetime," he said. "Everything, the hotel, food and entertainment, was paid for by the French government. It was their way of showing their appreciation to us."

He finished up his hitch overseas, which lasted one year and one month, as a guard at a POW camp. "It got me out of the rain and I had a warm bed to sleep in," he said. "The camp was located at Langres on the Marne River. It was one of the oldest towns in France. It had a rock wall about 20 feet high all the way around it and the walls had portholes in them."

After the war, Evans and his outfit stayed in France to look after the military equipment until it could be sold or disposed of. None of it was brought back to the United States

Finally on July 12, 1919, eight months after the end of the war, Evans started the voyage home aboard the battleship USS Frederick. But his adventures still weren't over. "We left Brest, France, and hit a terrible storm in the Bay of Biscay," he said. "It hit about midnight and lasted for three days. That was the seasickest bunch of fellows you ever saw. One sailor told me he had crossed the Atlantic 20 times and this was the sickest he had ever been.'

After an eleven day journey, he landed in Brooklyn, New York. From there, he went to Long Island, where he was discharged, and returned home by way of Washington, D.C., and Memphis, Tenn. in August,

After the war, Evans' dedication to the armed services didn't stop. He was one of the original founders of the American Legion and VFW Posts in McLean. He said, "We had to put a lot of work into organizing the American Legion post. We even put on a big rodeo just to help raise money for it."

He was also a member of the honor guard that fired a 21-gun salute for Andy Floyd, the only McLean resident killed in World War I. According to Evans, "The body originally had been buried where Andy had died in Europe but after the war it was returned to McLean. That burial brought out what was probably the biggest crowd this town has ever seen. People from all over came for it. The body was carried to the cemetery on a wagon drawn by two hor-

Between the wars, Evans worked as a farmer and when war came to the U.S. again in 1941 he did his part. He served on the Fire Department at the POW camp outside of McLean. He continued to serve out there until the camp was torn down after the war. "In fact," he said, "I was one of the last persons to leave when they finally closed the

During his full and active life, Evans found time to get married and raise a family. He and Mary Langford were married in 1925. Through his long life, he has had the difficult task of burying his wife, who died in 1959, and two sons, John, who was killed in 1967 while in the service of his country in Viet Nam; and Joe Don, who passed away earlier this

The remaining children of this remarkable man are: Jerry Corbin, of McLean; Bill Evans of Alamosa, Col.; Jim Evans of Amarillo; Bob Evans of Midland; Sue Modderman of San Antonio; and Linda Ellison of Corpus Christi.

They, and all of us, are grateful to men like Walter Evans who, because of their willingness to endure hardship and sacrifice, have given us the freedoms we enjoy. You have our everlasting gratitude and res-

Tigers Make Strong Offensive Effort **Against Booker**

As we have said before, the final score of a game doesn't always indicate the quality of play. Although the scoreboard said the Tigers lost to Booker by a score of 41-6, they didn't lose at all as far as their fans are concerned.

There were so many heroes and fine plays but certainly one of the players who deserves honorable mention is quarterback Jim Anderson. Ending the evening with 130 rushing and 124 yards passing, he helped the Tigers to a total of 324 total yards and 17 first downs, by far their best offensive effort of the year.

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

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


