Board To Seek Legal Action On Unpaid Bills

The McLean Independent School Board of Trustees met for a regular meeting on Monday, July 18, 2005 at 7:00 p.m. in the business office. Those present were Billy Bybee, Marshall Hanes, Toni Bohlar, Terri Adams, David Fuller, Joe Riley, Chet Bohlar, and Superintendent, Jimmy Hannon. Also present were principals, Dick Crockett and Rhonda Patterson, along with John Dickey.

The meeting was called to order and Toni Bohlar gave the invocation.

All votes are unanimous unless otherwise stated.

The minutes of the regular June 20, 2005 meeting were approved.

As there were no visitors present for the visitor comment section, the board me ved to the next agenda ite n.

Evan McMordie was unible to attend the me ting to discuss the band and instruments but called to 1 squest a chance to do so later.

The board moved to approve the pre-k program to begin this school year.

An athletic inventory was given to the board with all the items accounted for. No action was needed.

The board looked over last school year's cafeteria bills that were in non-compliance. After some discussion the board requested that Mr. Hannon seek legal council as to what could be done about the outstanding bills.

Mr. Hannon read part of a

letter to the board to announce that September 17 would be deemed the day that all Texas schools would be teaching about the Constitution of the United States of America in every grade. No action was needed.

The board discussed the Department of State Health Service Contract and approved it.

The board then went into Executive Session. After exiting Executive Session, the board voted under the recommendation of Mr. Hannon to table the High School Science position. The board voted to accept the resignation of Jason Farmer. The board then voted, under the recommendation of Mr. Hannon to table the girl's basketball coach and history teacher.

The board voted to approve the applying of expedited waivers to hold school for 178 instead of 180 with the extra two days being used for teacher training.


After much discussion

The board then discussed the issues related to the Chapter 41 status. Mr. Hannon will be addressing the public regarding this issue at a later date.


The board voted to adopt the Inter-local Agreement Resolution with Region 17 for the Employees Benefit Co-Op.

secretary, she helped him bring to fruition his vision of a museum for the community. She served as curator for the White Deer Land Museum for 26 years, retiring in 1990.

She also served in many volunteer capacities in the community. Among them were chairman of the Gray County Historical Committee, board member of the Friends of the Library, chairman of the Gray County Bicentennial Committee, member of the local Red Cross board, member of the Pampa Community Concert Association, the Pampa Fine Arts Association, and the Pampa Knife & Fork Club.

She was a charter member of Beta Sigma Phi and was honored as their Woman of the Year in 1976. She was also honored by the Amarillo Globe News as Woman of the Year in 1977, and received the Distinguished Service Award from West Texas State University in 1978.

A recent storm caused severe flooding in the facility. The club''s Board voted last week to begin

structural repairs to the rear wall and rear entrance, to evaluate quotes for an electrical upgrade, and to solicit estimates for a total electric heating/cooling system. Board members believe the total cost of the improvements may reach approximately \$30,000.

"We have \$7000. in a savings account that we can use for the first phase of the project." Reeves said. "We also intend to pursue any grant money that might be available for this type of project."

"Most of us are faced with giving birthday and Christmas gifts to people who really don't need anything," he said. "A donation to this group would serve a dual purpose by honoring the person in whose name the gift is given and by helping a great group of people in our community."

The McLean Young at Heart was started in 1972 with grants and gifts from interested community members.

Immunization Requirements Effect Sept. 1

A New law effective Sept. 1 requires that children attending childcare centers and enrolled in early childhood programs be vac- connoted against invasive

pneumococcal and hepatitis A diseases, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services(DSHS).

Pneumococcal disease is caused by a bacteria that often leads to middle ear infections, pneumonia, blood stream infections, sinus infections and meningitis. The vaccine is required for all children age 2 months through 59 months attending child-care facilities and prekindergarten programs.

Hepatitis A is a liver disease that is spread from person to person, often by putting objects in the mouth that have been contaminated with the stool of a person with he patitis A Children in child-care centers and prekindergarten programs who are 2 ;years old or older will need two doses of hepatitis A vaccine given six to 18 months apart.

To attend child-care facilities and prekindergarten programs, a child also must be immunized against tetanus, diphtheria. pertussis(whooping cough), polio, measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis B, and varicella. (chicken pox) at

appropriate age. If children do not have at least the first dose of the required vaccines by Sept. 1 they may be excluded from child-care facilities and prekindergarten programs.

New this year for school children are expanded requirement for hepatitis B and varicella immunizations. Students in kindergarten through 11th grade must have received

hepatitis B vaccine.

Those in kindergarten through fifth and seventh through 11 grade must have received the varicella vaccine before the start of school.

"Parents should be sure their children are in compliance with all schoolenrollment vaccination requirements prior to the start of school," said Monica Gamez of the DSHS Immunization Branch.

State rules require that school students be vaccinated against nine illnesses: diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis. polio, measles, mumps, rubella, henatitis B and varicella.

In addition, hepatitis A vaccine is required for students in kindergarten through third grade who attend school in a county with a high incidence rate.

Routine vaccination recommendations call for most of the vaccine doses required for school attendance to be given by age 2 with boosters

between 4 and 6. Catch-up schedules are available for students who did not receive the vaccines when

Military dependents,

homeless students and certain students transferring from other Texas schools will be granted temporary enrollment regardless of vaccination status. Some students are exempt from vaccination requirements for medical reasons or for reasons of conscience.

Specific vaccination requirements for school attendance are available from schools, physicians' offices and local public health departments. The information also is available online at or by calling DSHS toll free at 1-800-252-9152.

Vaccination requirements apply to all public and private primary and secondary schools, those in registered child-carefacilities and students enrolled in pre-kindergarten programs in Texas.

back in time




