The National Weather Bureau is predicting a snowy and cold winter this year. Much of the country has already broken record low temperatures.

Board Hears Report On Ag Program Expansion

The McLean Independent School District Board of Education met for a regular meeting at 6:00 p.m. on December 18, 2000. Board members present were Mike Darsey, Billie Ward, T.D. Simmons, John Holland, Neal Odom and Bob Glass. Others present were John Griffin, Superintendent, Blaze Herring, High School Principal, Leslie Darsey, Secretary, Margaret Milam and Jimmy Hannon.

Absent from the meeting was Don Dorsey and Dick Crockett.

All votes were unanimous unless otherwise stated.

The meeting was called to order at 6:15 p.m. by Bob Glass, President. Opening prayer was led by T.D. Simmons.

Minutes of the regular meeting of November 16, 2000, and the special meeting of November 30, 2000 were approved.

Jimmy Hannon gave the Board an excellent presentation of vocational programs that are being used by Samnorwood schools, in order for students to learn a

particular trade. Some of the teaching modules that are available include, AutoCad LT (computer aided design to give students a basic understanding of architectural and mechanical drawing), Electrical, Building Construction, Residential Plumbing, Graphic Design (used to create graphics on the computer to print banners, logos, T-shirt or cap transfers), Computer animation, Video editing, Multimedia, 3D modeling, Digital photography, Desktop publishing (to create anything from calendars to yearbooks), Digital imaging (transfer digital photos to an object such as a coffee mug), Welding simulator, and 4 stroke engine (to assemble and disassemble a Briggs & Stratton engine). There are 50 plus modules to choose from, and teaching would take place in a technology lab. Depco Inc. of Pittsburg, KS provides all materials necessary to conduct the class, including the computers, software, hardware, tables, and furniture. The fee for such a lab, with 15 work

stations would be approximately \$92,000.00. McLean ISD would not be out that much money, as we have a building that could be used and some of our own computers. The entire curriculum is written on a 6th grade reading level, which will help target a wide range of students. Students are tested daily, and held accountable for each project; also, students work in pairs to accomplish each task. If students choose to take a 2nd year of this course they may take 3 modules of their choice and work for 12 weeks on each (portfolios can be assembled to present to perspective employers to show experience). The Board was very impressed with Mr. Hannon's presentation and his enthusiasm. After the Christmas holidays, the Board will travel to Samnorwood to take a look at the program, before making their final decision. Mr. Hannon would need 24 credit hours of certification in order to teach these courses, and is very excited about teaching this type of vocational

study. Implementation of this new vocational course, could possibly be ready at the start of the next school year.

The Board decided to stay with Unicare as the Health insurance provider for the employees, and to split the difference of the premium increase with each employee covered.

Mr. Griffin recommended that McLean ISD continue to pay for employee annuities that are in force from previous board policy, in which the individual was covered under their spouse's insurance, then they were eligible to receive such an annuity. The Board made the decision not to allow any new options on annuities, but to continue to offer the benefit of health coverage, in hopes that the group would stick together, so as not to receive another premium increase.

The Interlocal contract for EPSSA (Special Ed program with Shamrock was signed by Board President, Bob Glass, and had been approved at a prior board meeting.

The 77th Legislative Session was for discussion purposes only.

Mr. Griffin suggested that McLean ISD do not apply for the PS9TIF Grant, for computer infrastructure with the school being responsible for local matching funds.

He stated that McLean ISD was not in a position to accept the grant at this time.

Financial Reports A, B and C were approved.

November bills were to be paid as presented.

The meeting adjourned at 8:24 p.m.

Extention Service Honors Jerry Hawkins

Clarendon College instructor and longtime Donley County 4-H program supporter Jerry Hawkins received the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Panhandle District's Friend of Extension award.

Hawkins was a former ag teacher in Groom school from 1960 - 1963.

He was recognized during recent ceremonies at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Amarillo. He was cited for his contributions and leadership as a 4-H volunteer and resource person for youths throughout the region.

A career educator and mentor to area public school and college students, Hawkins began teaching at Clarendon College in 1968. He developed the ranch management curriculum for the school's current ranch and feedlot operations program in 1973.

Hawkins' tenure as coach of the college livestock judging teams began in 1974. He started and now supervises the school's horse and meat judging teams. His teams consistently win at state and national competitions.

"He is an ever-present mentor and resource person for area youth involved in 4-H, FFA and college-level organizations," said Dr. Bob Robinson, Extension's district director for agricultural programs.

The new gym continued to be a topic of discussion at each school board meeting. CIB installed the second new floor and other repairs were made.

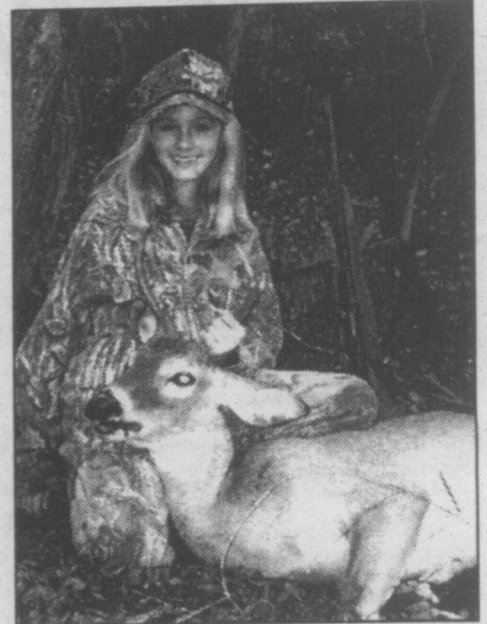

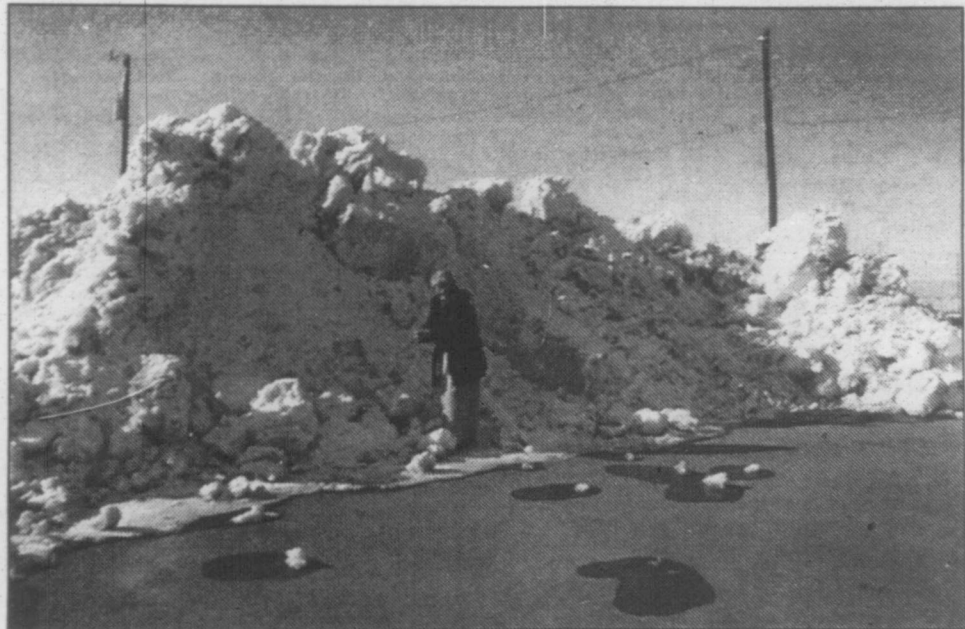
Santa Brings A White Christmas To The Panhandle; Near 20 Inches Accumulated

School Finance Tops News In 2000

School finance woes have led the headlines in the new millennium. Groom school has had an on-going problem making ends meet in recent years with decreasing student population and declining property values. Residents of the district passed a bond issue to help free up some of the regular budget from needed capital improvements. In December, a group of concerned citizens met with school board members to discuss possible cuts. The situation is expected to be resolved by the January or February school board meeting.

January 2000 came and went without the dreaded millennium bug doing much if any damage. Local politicians made announcements to run for the March primaries. Groom's Community Clinic closed suddenly. Some Groom students distinguished themselves. Dusty Crump, Chris Ollinger, and Evan Crowell were named to the Six-Man Football All-State team. Justin Homen won the Swine Showmanship award at the Carson County Junior Livestock Show. Groom School lost a valuable teacher with the

retirement of Georgann Hinson.

Groomites continued to put the city on the map with their accomplishments. Native son, Tracey Britten, was named "Coach of the Year" by the Texas Tennis Coaches Association. Kerry Jenkins was named E.M.T. of the year by Panhandle Emergency Medical Services (PEEMS). Groom Tigers won the basketball district championship and the Groom Tigerettes won the Bi-District Championship. In agriculture concerns drought threatens the winter wheat crop with no measurable precipitation for 5 months (September 1999).

Groom students continue to shine with Carrie Davis named MVP of the District and Candace Bohr, Krisanne Davis, Dewayne Gray and Dustin Babcock named as All-Stars. Magan Bivens earned top honors at the Amarillo College Science Fair placing 1st in Zoology and earning two other awards for her project. Jodi Homen was crowned Miss Irish Rose at the Shamrock celebration. One Act Play made a comeback after a long

absence at Groom High School, with Dewayne Gray being named to the District All-Star cast.

The Easter Bunny visited Groom in April along with some much needed rain. "Holy week" events at the Cross of Our Lord Jesus Christ included a visit from Bishop John Yanta. Groom High School students competed in U.I.L. events, 6 qualified for Regional. Track teams aced the District and Area titles and Groom's band earned Sweepstakes status.

In May, Josiah Scott competed in State U.I.L. and earned a Bronze medal. Groom elementary students won their District U.I.L. contest by a landslide.

Carrie Davis earned 4 medals at the state track meet, 1 gold, 1 silver and 2 bronze. Nineteen seniors and 14 eighth graders were in graduation exercises. Groom City Council swore in a new member, W.H. Ollinger. A group of 35 volunteers under the direction of Joe David Brown descended on the City and worked together to clean up city streets and vacant lots.

Mother nature had a little surprise in store for the Panhandle in June.

A "million dollar" rain broke the drought with the area receiving between 5 and 8 inches of rain in a 24 hour period. Work culminated on an updated ex-student directory that is a keepsake with all the wonderful pictures and memories of Groom School included. The book was a sell out and reprinting was necessary by Groom Day in August. Groom welcomed a new DPS officer and his family. Trooper Tony Rocha will soon provide Groom with another first as he is soon to have a trained Drug Dog as his new partner. Groom's EDC placed attractive signs at the city limits and downtown to help direct travelers to Groom's amenities.

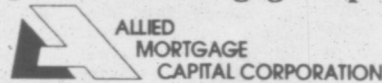

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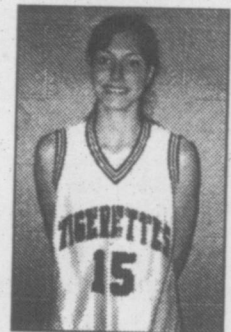

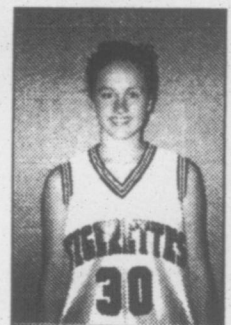
