


We had interesting October. On the 10th of Oct. we had Logan Martindale, age 5,







THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT ANTHRAX

Anthrax is caused by bacterial spores (Bacillus Anthracis), which live in the ground. Animals can contract the disease by breathing in the spores while they are grazing. The spores can live in the dirt for a very long. When the climate time. goes from wet to dry, the conditions are best for Anthrax infection. Another way animals get the disease is by lying on the ground where the spores are. If there is a break in the skin, the bacteria gets in causing

People get the disease by handling the dead carcasses of infected animals. To prevent animals.
inhalation, carcasseinhalation, he handled in well-ventilated areas. Handling the infected carcasses can also cause the skin variety or cutaneous form of the disease. There is also an intestinal form caused by eating infected meat.

In people Anthrax is mostly an occupational disease identified with people who are exposed to dead animals and animal by products such as wool and is very rare. The incubation period for Anthrax is about seven In inhalation days. anthrax the symptoms resemble a cold and progresses into difficulty breathing and is severe. or cutaneous, there is a boil that turns into a sore with a black center. The intestinal form causes nausea, loss of appetite, vomiting and fever. All forms of the disease are treated with antibiotics. There are no known cases where the disease has been spread from person to person.

So what are chances of having our problem with the disease? In nature it does happen according to

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

Since the very first days after the September 11 attacks, we have come to realize that our country has been attacked, and our freedom must be defended. This is truly a battle between good and evil, and in the process of holding accountable those responsible, the United States will act in a united, conscientious and determined manner.

tance, including food, to the innocent Afghan people people who have starved, suffered, and lost loved ones at the hands of the extremist Taliban regime. We are only targeting those who have committed evil, and those who support them. We will not let any stone remain unturned and we will not let this horrible act go unanswered.

It is our responsibility to make sure all of those who have died these past months and in the 200 plus years before that to maintain the freedom of this country, will never, ever have died in vain.

From the very beginning of our history, we have faced the challenges presented to us with courage and integrity - and we have defended freedom no matter the crisis. This difficult time reminds me of the very first great challenge our nation faced - the battle for our very indepen-

During the Revolutionary War, a brave young pa-triot, Major General Joseph Warren, fought against the Redcoats at Bunker Hill. He battled with the other American irregulars against an enemy more than twice their size – causing the Redcoats to lose more than a third of their troops - but, in the end, the ammunition of the Americans

While the bulk of the Continental Army retreated, the last units stayed in their trenches to hold off the British. They fought hand-to-hand. That is where Major General Joseph Warren was last seen fighting.

Before his death though, in the quiet before the battle. Joseph Warren gave the men under him a simple com-

"Our country is in danger now, but not to be despaired of. On you depend the fortunes of America. You are to decide the important questions upon which rest the happiness and the liberty of millions not yet born. Act worthy of vourselves.

That command applies to all of us now - and it is a challenge I know we are all capable of living up to and even exceeding. God Bless America!

Now, more than 130 years later, Lincoln's words still ring true. If America could persevere through those challenging times, we can surely make it through the challenges we face today.


The aftermath of September. 11 will be with us for a long time. But the good that has come in the days since has given us so many reasons to be thankful.



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
