Randy Stubblefield has announced his candidacy for Sheriff of Gray County Stubblefield, who took office January 1, 1993, stated that the Gray County Sheriffs Office has seen many Ofrice has seen many changes since he has take office as the new sheriff.
One of the most notable changes is the presence of deputies in the rural areas of the county. Stubblefield stated that the operation of the Gray County jail is the biggest challenge in his past three years as sheriff. He stated that his officers have booked into the jail over 2,000 prisoners and that more than 500 of those were felons. "The jail capacity is 76 and I have tried to keep the count under 48 so that the county does not have to hire more jailers. I know hire more jailers. I know that some people do not understand why we can't combine city and county jails but I have researched this with Texas Jail Standards and taking on the city prisoners would require the addition of 5 more jailers at a cost of about $\$ 130,000$ to the county and that is not counting the food costs and medical expenses. The city's offer of $\$ 14,000$ per year offer of $\$ 14,000$ per year does not even come close to what it would require to
fund the consolidation of fund the consolidation of the two jails," Stubbiefield said.
