## CarsonCounty Taxes Due To Increase <br> The 'white oil' issue <br> 'white oil' and falling oil commissio <br> commissioners have decide

The 'white oil' issue little understood by the average citizen will soon mean much more as Carson County taxes rise to offset losses in revenue from the
concerns of "white oil" concerns of "white oil"
County Judge Jay Roselius says the county, by estimates from the Carson County Appraisal District, lost $\$ 257,500,000$ in tax value due to the situation brought on by the "white oil" issue. According to the values set for ths tax year, the county will need 26.189 cents to generate the same monies collected last year to fund the budget. County taxpayers paid 18 cents per $\$ 100$ valua tion last year.

Even bleaker are the figures explained by Tax Collector Zloyd sterling During the past three years, ancoilected taxes have taken a steady rise. In 1984 un$\$ 11,000$, last year in 1985 the figure rose to an all time high of $\$ 67,000$ and in 1986 as of August 7 , the figure rose to August 7, the figure rose to Sterling $304,214.90$ large uncollected amount to conditions brought about by

On the bright side, the county has $\$ 657,570$ fund balance. The surplus funds are spread into three accounts, Farm-to-market maintenance and operation, \$85,070; Public Road maintenance and operation, $\mathbf{\$ 1 7 2}$, 145; and General Fund maintenance and operation, $\mathbf{\$ 3 9 9}$, 355.

Judge Roselius also attributes the major increase to be charged to fund the required from the budget to fund indigent care. The figure will be an additional $\$ 113,000$ for the county to pay hospitals and health care institutions for residents of the county unable to pay. "In the past, residents of the county with medical needs have requested help from the commissioners court, and on an individual basis, the
whether to help out and by what amount. The new system to be placed into effect Sept. 1 by the state will help only the poorest of the poor," says Roselius. Persons must first be certified indigents of the county according to their annual income. The state reimburs es payments by 80 percent or qualifying individuals. Any other aide given the poor will be strictly funded $y$ the county.
Commissioners will request only an additional 213,921 to fund the budget over last year's figure. The $1986-87$ budget is set at $\$ 2,205,065$. Taxpayers will be asked to pay 8 cents more per $\$ 100$ valuation than last year to cover county expenThe commissioners will meet August 25 at 10:00 a.m. at the courthouse in Panhandle to set a tax rate to fund the budget. Judge Roselius stated anyone interested in the budget hearing or setting of the tax rate may appear at the meeting to make comment or comments may be sent in a written review.
