Child Nutrition Program Approved By School Board

The Board of Trustees of Groom Schools voted to maintain meal costs at the level of 1985-86 at their level of 1985-86 at their regular August meeting. In addition, the same process of paying for student meals in advance will remain in effect. The child nutrition department will be serving meals from the first day of school, so parents should make arrangements to send money with the student. Students may pay for one meal as the meal is served or may pre-pay as many meals as desired.

"We are publishing the guidelines for eligibility for free and reduced-cost meals, so that parents may plan in advance if their children are going to be eligible," says Joyce Hutsell, business man-

ager of the School.

"Parents should make arrangements to come by the business office prior to the starting of school if they believe they meet the qualifications," she continues.

"In addition," she explains, "the approximation is maintained. "the program is maintained in strictest confidence in in strictest confidence in accordance with Federal guidelines. No one except the parents know the status of the student's meals."

"A letter of application for participation in the Federal school meals program will be sent with each student at respiratory for the parents."

CarsonCounty Taxes Due To Increase To Cover Budget

The 'white oil' issue little understood by the average citizen will soon mean much more as Carson County taxes rise to offset losses in revenue from the concerns of "white oil".

County Judge Jay Roselius says the county, by estimates from the Carson County Appraisal District, lost \$257,500,000 in tax value due to the situation brought on by the "white oil" issue. According to the values set for the tax year, the county will need 26.189 cents to generate the same monies collected last year to fund the budget. County taxpayers paid 18 cents per \$100 valua-tion last year.

Even bleaker are the figures explained by Tax Collector Lloyd Sterting. During the past three years, uncollected taxes have taken a steady rise. In 1984 uncollected taxes amounted to stagering \$304,214.98.

attributes the large uncollected amount to conditions brought about by

'white oil' and falling oil prices. "Attorneys hired by the county will file on all delinquent taxes they feel can be collected, but no decision has been made on what legal action to take on the collected taxes due from delinquent taxes due from those involved in the 'white oil' issue."

On the bright side, the county has \$657,570 fund balance. The surplus funds are spread into three accounts, Farm-to-market maintenance and operation, \$86,070; Public Road main-tenance and operation, \$172, 145; and General Fund maintenance and operation, \$399, 355.

Judge Roselius also attributes the major increase to be charged to fund the budget to the 10 percent required from the budget to fund indigent care. The figure will be an additional \$113,000 for the county to pay hospitals and health care institutions for residents of the county unable to pay. "In the past, residents of the county with medical needs the past, residents of the county with medical needs have requested help from the commissioners court, and on an individual basis, the

whether to help out and by what amount. The new syswhat amount. The new system to be placed into effect Sept. I by the state will help only the poorest of the poor," says Roselius. Persons must first be certified indigents of the county according to their annual income. The state reimburses payments by 80 percent for qualifying individuals. Any other aide given the poor will be strictly funded by the county.

Commissioners will request only an additional \$213,921 to fund the budget over last year's figure. The 1986-87 budget is set at \$2,205,065. Taxpayers will be asked to pay 8 cents more per \$100 valuation than last year to cover county expensioners will meet August 25 at 10:00 a.m.



Immunization Guidelines Listed For **School Enrollment**

State law requires the veri-fication of the age of all 5 and 6 year-old children who are 6 year-old children who are entering Texas public schools so the parents of such students should present their birth certificates when

they register for school.

Kenneth Sweatt stated that parents unable to obtain birth certificates should parents unable to obtain birth certificates should check with him concerning other proof that can be used to determine age.

School districts may bar students from classes until proof of the immunizations required by state law have been obtained. The following record of immunizations are

record of immunizations are required:

Three injections of combination DPT vaccines, with one given since the fourth birthday, or if applicable, a tetanus-diptheria booster within 10 years. tetanus-diptheria within 10 years.

Three polio vaccines, one since the fourth birthday.

possible," says Hutsell.
"The Federal government, in cutting programs, has reduced the availability of these Federal funds over the past two years. For instance, last year a family of four could have a yearly income of \$19,703 and still qualify for benefits. This year, the family of four will not qualify over \$20,350. The sliding scale makes it slightly more difficult to qualify in the smaller families.
"Groom School benefits from this Federal program in being able to continue to serve nutritious meals for all

serve nutritious meals for all students. It would be diffi-cult for the school to fund the entire program locally, and this is one instance of a Federal program which really delivers the benefit in

a direct manner to the child." she concludes. Prices for the meals are set at \$1.00 lunch for kindergarfor 7th through 12th grades, and \$0.50 for each student breakfast. Reduced cost meals are \$0.30 breakfast and \$0.40 lunch. For adults, breakfast is \$0.75 and lunch

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


