## Hurricane Like Winds, Rain Surprises Groom

Hurricane force winds took the City of Groom by surprise Friday afternoon. The storm seemed to come from nowhere as the rumble of thunder and the flash of the approaching lightning was the only warning that Groom received. Area television stations were so preoccupied with an impending concert that little, if any warning was given to the town of 650 residents.
$11 / 2$ to 2 inches of rain fell in sheets and seemed to come from every direction. Pea to marble sized hail was
driven like bullets by the 90 mile per hour winds.
The storm, which lasted maybe 45 minutes from beginning to end, is one of the most expensive in recent years.

Many residents lost tre limbs, shingles and windows. At lease one tree was completely up-rooted at the home of Barney Davis. Vehicles were pelted with flying debris. Several reported broken window and lots of dents and pings. Max Wade lost the plate glass windows at his office. glass windows at his office. The Groom Grocery stor lost a window as well.
Chris Britten lost a barn just south of town. A truck trailer blew over on Old Route 66.
Allsup's may have sustained the greatest loss.

The store was in the process of undergoing some remodeling. The roof was totally destroyed and water damage was apparen damage was apparent on the inside ceilings. The powerlines were severed by flying debris and county officials had to rope off the area to keep someone from being injured by the live lines.
Bonnie Terbush, store manager, stated that the store will be closed for few bay file for few days while they push ahead with their remodeling plans.

This is not the way we would have preferred to do this, " she stated. "But we will have a whole new look when we are done."

Groom School weathered fairly well. Windows on the south side leaked a little. South facing outer doors leaked as the 90 mile per hour wind drove water through every tiny crack The roof was ripped from the old hog pens and cattle
feed was lost to the driving rain.

Concluding it all, no one has been reported to have been injured, although there may have been several tired backs after spending the weekend picking up tree limbs. Groom sweeps up awaiting the new blow that Mother Nature plans to dish out.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved with a typo correction.
Monthly bills were approved for payment. Don Case abstained from voting due to a conflict of interest.
Insurance for city property was discussed at length. The Council will set up a special meeting, requesting that interested requesting that interested
parties attend to diecuss specifications and special
insurance needs of the city. The Council unanimously voted to table discussion of the possibility of condemning buildings at this time.
The council agreed with the exception of Ellis Stapp who was against the measure, to charge off past due accounts belonging to John Bennett for $\$ 10.48$. John Bennett for $\$ 10.48$; Lloyd Guikey for $\$ 15.67$; and Gary Werfelman for

will be kept on file and should they move back to Groom these accounts must be cleared up before service can be restored. Executive session ended at 9:53. Mayor Homer commended all the employees for doing a good job. He also stated that raises will be considered during the budget setting process.

Sgt. Ray Davis and Deputy Fred Herrick assisted the Amarillo Police Department Tuesday evening in the investigation of the armed robbery of Amarillo jewelry store. Oi Amarillo jewelry store. Our department was called by a Conway resident and told of items being placed in a garbage dumpster by persons matching the description of the Amarillo robbery suspects. When Sgt. Davis and Deputy Herrick arrived at the dumpster they found various clothing items, some jewelry and several firearms which are believed to have been used in the robbery. All of the evidence was turned aver to an officer from the Amarillo Police Department Amarilo Police Departmen for further testing.
Our department is investigating allegations of a parental-kidnapping or violation of court order case which has been forwarded to us from the State of Missouri. We are working with Missouri authorities and investigators from

Services to verify the ailegations and take the appropriate actions.

Sgt. Ray Davis, Fred Herrick and Deputy Jeff Oldham responded Friday evening to Groom where straight winds in excess of 80 mph uprooted trees and damaged windows and roofs on residences and busines property. Electric and telephone companies had to be called to deal with downed lines, but there were no injuries reported.

State Law requires periodic inspections of county jail facilities (VTCA Local Government Code Chapter 351 \& 511 and Chapter 297 of the Texas Commission of Jail Standards). The Carson County Jail was inspected on July 10, 1997 and found to be in compliance with the Texas Minimum Jail Standards.
"The Carson County Jail was built in 1952, yet it still has to comply with the standards of 1997 or we run the risk of expensive corrective measures or even closure by the State. We have an inmate housing capacity of 24 and an average daily population of 8 prisoners. We have the ability to hold felony, misdemeanor, female and segregation prisoners and we process between four and five hundred persons a year through our jail. There have been no escapes, natural causes deaths or suicides in the facility for the past five years."
"Keeping a 45 year old facility in compliance with 1997 regulations is a difficult matter, but we are fortunate to have Deputy Sheriff Gary Robertson and Corrections Officers Brenda Turpin, Misti Beck, Chris Richardson, Shauna Holtgrewe and Bonnie Flood working to keep the prisoners contained while
operating within the confines of the jail regulations. In addition to regulations. In addition to Jafficers Officers handle all 9-1calls for Carson County, all radio dispatching for the law enforcement, fire and ambulance services in the
county and all evening and holiday telephone calls for the Panhandle Police Department. All of our Corrections Officers bring a variety of talents to our department and I'm very proud of the way they handle the volume of calls that they do while still being able to deal with people on a personal level."
"We've been particularly fortunate to have Deputy Gary Robertson supervising the operation of the jail. Gary came to work for us in February of 1997 and has been instrumental in tightening up our operation and making the jail run more professionally and efficiently. No one can accuse us of running a country club for criminal offenders, but neither can offenders, but neither can we be accused of operating
a dungeon. Our officers a dungeon. Our officers are well trained
professionals who meet the certification and training demands of the Texas Commission on Law enforcement Officer Standards and Education and our jail meets 1997 certification standards."

Vote On Constitutional Amendment August 9

Texas members of the
American Association American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and other senior citizens are being urged to vote August 9, 1997 on a number of Constitutional Amendments which will be offered as a result of action taken by the 75th Legislature.

Of particular interest to homeowners will be a proposal for an increase in the school property tax homestead exemption to $\$ 10,000$ and limiting the school property tax rate increases to eight ceats above the rollback rate and transferring the over 65 tax freeze to a new homestead.

If this measure is passed, it will apply to the tax ycar beginning January 1, 1997.
A related bill, Senate Bill 841, addresses concerns dealing with apprais: Is. Appraisal procedures are defined and voting is required for rate increas:s. Tax deferrals or abatements Tax deferrals or abatements at 8 percent interest uncer this measure. An annıal
appraisal increase may not exceed 10 percent. Public hearings are required if the effective tax rate is increased more than percent, and the appraisal appeal process is simplified.
Another tax measure, AJR 43, to tax measure, November to be voted on November 4, 1997, is a Constitutional Amendment to limit increases in appraisals and to make property tax freezes portable.

## Farmers, Ranchers May Apply For Programs <br> lower than maximum cost-

TEMPLE - July 9, 1997 Farmers and ranchers may apply for the new Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) July 14, 1997, through August 1, 1997. The new August 1, 1997. The new
conservation program, a conservation program, a
result of the 1996 Farm result of the 1996 Farm
Bill, offers a liraited number of producers who have serious soil, water, and other natursl resource problems wit 1 technical, financial, and educational assistance.
According to John P. Burt, State Conservationist for USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), "EQIP is not like the former Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) or Program (GPCP) or
Agricultural Conservation

Program (ACP). program is extremely Timited and is for persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production who would provide the greatest environmental benefits the least cost to the the least cost to the program.
"Applications will be prioritized after August 1, 1997, according to specific criteria," Burt continued. "After Farm Service Agency (FSA) determines producer eligibility, NRCS conservationists and the producer will make producer will make an
inventory of the natural inventory of the natural
resources, resources, identify natural resource problems and concerns, determine treatment needs, and agree upon the land management and structural practices the producer will install." Burt
added that the extent of the conservation practice fields and acres to be treated, and cost-share rate and incentive payment levels the producer will accept, as well as the total program payments, are included in a ranking formula.
Twelve Geographic Priority Areas (GPA), encompassing 167 counties, are the primary target for over $\$ 8.7$ million EQIP funds allocated to Texas. Each GPA has similar natural resource problems and concerns which EQIP can address. Water conservation, excessive wind and water erosion, limited water supply and brush water supply, and brush invasion are a few of the specific resource concerns identified in the GPAs.

Producers in counties
outside of a GPA are also outside of a GPA are also
eligible for the remaining $\$ 4.7$ million EQIP funds provided it will solve identified statewide natural resource concerns such as excessive erosion and ground and surface water quality. Carson County is considered in this area.
considered in this area.
Each application will
Each application will compete with other applications in their GPA, while those outside of the GPAs will compete against each other. "Contracts will be awarded based on their ranking, regardless of ranking, regardiess of location," cautioned Burt. That means some counties may not have any contracts, even though they are located inside a GPA," he said. Burt added that applications for a singie conservation practice on an
individual field addressing a single natural resource concern may not be competitive in a GPA or with the statewide natural resource concerns.

Acceptance into EQIP will require a 5 to 10 year contract, even if only 1 year of cost-share is needed. Contracts are for a maximum amount of $\$ 50,000$ with a maximum 75 percent cost-share. Though entire farms or operation units are not required to be included in a contract, the included in a contract, the
proposed area must include proposed area must include
that portion with the identified resource concerns which meets the goals and objectives of the GPA or statewide natural resource concerns. Producers may increase their chances of acceptance by submitting a
share rate, enrolling entire operating units in the contract, and by agreeing to fully meet treatment needs fully meet treatment needs of all identified natural resource concerns on the farm or ranch.

For more information about EQIP, contact your local USDA-NRCS office, Soil and Water Conservation District office, or FSA office in your county.

With a yell of terror I leaped and flung myself backwards through the air, landing in a very uncomfortable position. I uncomfortable position. I looked back at the tractor
trying to get my heart to trying to get my heart to start beating again. The big bull snake was crawling out of the hot tractor cab where he had been placed by son David, and slid into the weeds.

Once again I renewed my promise to watch out for the unexpected.
