Judge Roselius and Mike Commissioner Britten recently toured the Waste Isolation Pilot Project (W.I.P.P.) twenty miles east of Carlsbad, New Mexico. WIPP is a cornerstone in the U.S. Department of Energy's national clean up strategy. The WIPP

designed to permanently dispose of transuranic radioactive generated waste defense program activities. The site features disposal rooms excavated in an ancient, stable salt formation 2,150 feet underground.

matching hat of satin, beads and tulle. Her bridal bouquet was made white mini roses,







Bond Issue Scheduled

Grandview-Hopkins Independent School voters on Saturday, June 27, 1998, will vote for or against a propostition to allow the District to issue \$2 million in bonds while maintaining the current tax levy rate which would retire the obligation within a seven year period. A meeting with the public and taxpayers to discuss the bond election, instructional projects, and will be finances conducted at 7:00 p.m. at the Grandview-Hopkins auditorium on Tuesday, June 9, 1998.

Approval of package could reduce the flow of local monies to the state which, through the 1998-99 school year, will amount to over \$3.3 million for a eight year period. Grandview-Hopkins would assume debt while retaining local tax money in the District. Taxes would not be increased if the million bond is passed.

School District Trustees decided to take this

action because the 75th Texas Legislature, during 1997, removed bonded indebtedness from "recapture" provisions of

school finance legislation.

Under the state's current funding program,

Grandview-Fopkins Independent School District must give the state a percertage of their tax collections (currently over 50%), which is then redistributed to the "property-poor" districts.

This means that for every two dollars that Grandview-Hopkins ISD collects in taxes, Grandview-Hopkins ISD must send one dollar to the state.

The "Robin Hood" method of wealth equalization involves taking local property tax monies from propertyrich school districts for distribution to Austin or property-poor school districts. Grandview-Hopkins receives less than 64 cents (.631) from each dollar and 30 cents collected from local taxpayers.

In other words, to finance a budget proposal of \$411,577.99 for the 1998-99 school year, the District would require a tax rate of one dollar and 30 cents per \$100.00 valuation. If recapture didn't exist, the new tax rate for the District would be \$.5448273, just over 54 cents.

If the proposition is adopted, funding would be committed to the construction of energy efficient classrooms and facilities, update equipment and furnishings, enlarge the library, and develop a community center.







We receive the weather updates from the National Weather Service just as the television stations are broadcasting the In fact, information. sometimes the television stations receive the information before we do," stated Mrs. Daniels. we

"We have to maintain contact with our weather spotters, relay weather information to those spotters as well as the regular duties of the dispatch office during the times of bad weather. If many would listen to their scanners, they will hear the weather updates being transmitted to the spotters and could relay this information to their friends or relatives who do not have scanners. This would alleviate a lot of the of the burden from our dispatchers and would allow them to perform their job better as well as keep everyone informed of the weather conditions.'

"If our phone lines are busy with individuals wanting weather information, it will be impossible for actual emergency phone calls to be answered," said Mrs. Daniels. "Please watch your television and listen to the scanner for the latest weather up dates."

Citizens are reminded that when the tornado siren sounds, seek shelter, a tornado has been spotted, the siren will not be sounded again and there will not be an all clear signal given. DO NOT call the dispatch office wanting to know if tornado has been spotted, remember the tornado whistle will not be sounded unless there is a tornado spotted, so seek shelter immediately when the tornado whistle sounds.
