Surge la amenaza de epidemias

Venden en 370 dólares a niños colombianos

BOGOTÁ, (EFE).- El director del Instituto Colombiano de Bienestar Familiar (ICBF), Jaime Benítez Tobón, denunció el secuestro y posterior venta de numerosos niños víctimas de la tragedia del Nevado del Ruiz.

Benítez Tobón denunció que en medio de la confusión, "el comercio criminal de niños ha surgido en Bogotá donde, -añadió- son vendidos por 60,000 pesos (unos 370 dólares)".

Según cifras oficiales, en la tragedia de Armero, ciudad que prácticamente desapareció con más de 20,000 personas de sus 22,000 habitantes, 8,000 de los muertos eran niños.

La catástrofe del Nevado del Ruiz en la madrugada del pasado viernes, tras el deshielo de toneladas de nieve que aumentó el caudal de numerosos ríos,

provocó una avalancha de lodo y rocas que afectó a 14 localidades de los departamentos de Caldas y Tolima, al centro del país, donde

muriieron 25,000 personas, al menos, la mayoría de ellas menores de edad.

Mauro Praises U.S. Rep. Pickle for Rescuing Texas Veterans Program

Austin-Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro praised Tuesday the recent actions of the House Ways and Means Committee, especially the work done by Ways and Means Committee member Rep. J.J. "Jake" Pickle, that has prevented Congress from ending the Texas Veterans Programs.

"Texas Veterans owe a debt of gratitude to the Texas members of the House of Representatives, but especially to Congressman Jake Pickle, for serving Texas' Veterans programs in the House Way and Means Committee," Mauro said during a joint press conference with Pickle in the Capitol. "If it wasn't for Jake Pickle, not only Texas Veterans, but all Texans, would have lost the best Veterans programs in the U.S.A."

The original tax reform proposals put forward by the U.S. Department of Treasury had earmarked both the Texas Veterans Land Program and the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program for extinction. Under this proposal known as Treasury II, Texas Veterans programs would have been ineligible to use federal tax exempt bonds to fund the program.

Without the use of these tax exempt bonds, the Texas Veterans programs wouldn't have been able to continue to offer below market-interest rates on any loans,

thereby ending the immensely successful land and housing programs.

"The Veterans Land Program has its roots in Texas history all the way back to the Alamo and Goliad. The modern version of the Veterans Land Program, established in 1949, has made 85,000 loans in its history. The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program, created in January, 1983, has made about 25,000 loans since the first loan was made in January, 1984," Mauro said.

These companion programs loan \$20,000 to qualified Texas Veterans at below market interest rates—currently 9.97 percent—to buy a home or 10 acres of land. In return, these programs, which don't cost the Texas taxpayer a single penny because the Veterans pay for the cost of operating the program, generate seven dollars in economic activity for every dollar loaned through them.

"As a result of Congressman Pickle's efforts, as well as other members of the Texas delegation, tax exempt status for Veterans bonds has been restored," Mauro said. "This means that Texas Veterans can look with confidence to uninterrupted, low-market interest rate loan to buy a home or a piece of land."

The action of the House Ways and Means Committee gave Texas Land Commissioner Garry Maruo, a chairman of the Texas

Ciudad del Vaticano, (UPI) El Papa Juan Pablo II inauguró las sesiones del Sínodo de los Obispos de todo el mundo, en el que se revisan las reformas hechas por el Concilio Ecuménico Vaticano Segundo, las que 20 años más tarde aún provocan controversias.

El Pontífice de San Pedro y luego les dirigió un discurso a los 165 obispos y otros altos prelados que participan, con derecho a voto, en la reunión que durará dos semanas.

El Papa invitó al Sínodo, a otros 15 "oyentes" especiales, entre quienes se encuentra la ganadora del Premio Nobel de la Paz, Madre Teresa Bojaxhiu, la monja oriunda de Albania que desarrolla actividades caritativas entre los pobres de Calcuta y al principal de los Caballeros de Colón de Estados Unidos, Virgil Dechant.

Los oyentes invitados, no tendrán derecho ni a voz ni a voto durante el pleno del Sínodo, pero se les permitirá conversar en las sesiones de trabajo en las que se reunirán los obispos.

Juan Pablo también invitó a 10 observadores de otras iglesias cristianas, que han mantenido conversaciones ecuménicas con la Iglesia Católica desde que el Vaticano II señaló como objetivo la unidad de la cristiandad.

Se espera que representantes de las iglesias Ortodoxa, Coptica, Anglicana, Luterana, Metodista, Reformada, Discípulos de Cristo, Bautista y Pentecostal asistan al encuentro, así como también delegados del Consejo Mundial de Iglesias grupo al que no pertenece la Iglesia Católica.

Después de la fuerte presión de grupos femeninos dentro de la iglesia, el Pontífice invitó a nueve mujeres a las sesiones del Sínodo, en calidad de oyentes o invitadas especiales.

Exploitation Deluxe

There is one painful certainty about the immigration bill now pending in the House of Representatives. Whatever else it might do, you can be sure it would only worsen the already miserable situation of farm workers.

As passed by the Senate, the bill includes a "guest worker" program that would in effect revive the thoroughly discredited *bracero* program. That's the program, remember, which provided growers a virtually unlimited supply of captive Mexican workers from 1942 to 1964, and enabled them to keep the pay and working conditions of foreign and domestic workers alike at the lowest possible levels.

The new program was put into the bill under heavy pressure from western fruit and vegetable growers. They demayed it as a counter to a provisio that would phase out their employment of undocumented workers from Mexico.

It's not that there aren't plenty of othe' workers available. It's simply that the growers prefer to hire undocumented workers, who generally must take whatever is offered them. That's usually pay no higher than the bare federal minimum of \$3.35 an hour and often not even such basic on-the-job amenities as toilets and fresh drinking water.

But what can the undocumented workers do? They are not eligible for the unemployment and welfare benefits that help ease the plight of jobless citizens. Too, they fear deportation back to country with severe unemployment and in which the pay and working conditions offered them here -- however inadequate by U.S. standards -- would seem downright handsome to many

people.

The growers naturally have a different explanation for their reliance on undocumented workers. They are the oly people, say the growers, who will do "stoop labor".

But who is it that cleans the sewers and collects the garbage in the United States? Who are the cement masons, who spend virtually the entire workday on their knees? The roofers who work with scalding hot tar all day? The steelworkers?

Those workers generally are not undocumented, of course. They are workers who are treated with dignity, paid a decent wage, given decent working conditions, and not thrown into competition with desperate undocumented workers.

Any chance of getting growers to treat their employees in the same way would be utterly destroyed by the "guest worker" program. It would allow growers to hire even more workers from abroad -- 350,000 to 420,000 of them in each of the next three years as temporary workers who would enter the country legally -- while allowing them to continue using all of their currently employed undocumented workers in the first year, two-thirds of them in the second year, and one-third in the final year.

Republican Senator Pete Wilson of California and other sponsors of the program nevertheless contend it would not exploit workers. They nte that before any of the "guest workers" could be hired in any particular region, federal agents would have to determine that no local workers were available and that the "guest workers" would be paid the "prevailing wage."

Those rules, however, are

much the same as those that prevailed during the *bracero* era. There's no reason to believe that growers and federal officials would act any differently under them than they did back then.

Growers seeking *braceros* rarely were required to do any serious local recruiting, often being allowed to arbitrarily set the "prevailing wage" so low, in any case, that it discouraged local workers. Once that artificial shortage of workers was created, grower- warned that their crops would rot if they didn't get *braceros* to harvest them -- and, presto, in came all the *braceros* they wanted, at the worst possible pay and working conditions.

Heavy unemployment among domestic workers in all industries finally generated enough pressure to kill the program. But growers and their allies have been trying ever since to revive it.

Senator Wilson has even taken

to warning his colleagues that unless a new program is approved, terrible things will happen to the nation's crops. That's right: They'll ro; -- "slowly but irrevocably rot in the fields and on the trees," as Wilson declared solemnly the other day.

Republican Senator Alan Simpson of Wyoming, chief author of the immigration bill, says he had to accept the amendment by Wilson that would create the program in order to get the votes needed for Senate passage of the bill. But that does not mean Simpson accepts the notion that those advocating the program are motivated by fear of rotting crops.

"Greed," says Simpson -- "that's what you have here. Exploitation deluxe."

District 83 Representative Speaks on the Water Theme Park

East Lubbock residents, once again west Lubbock is challenging you. Do you realize that our community has none of the conveniences that are found abundantly in west Lubbock. The reason is simple, east Lubbock only has what west Lubbock give as "tokenism" much like the days of slavery. Whenever something is suggested for the eastside, the westside finds sophisticated methods to stop it and the eastside goes about its merry way, complaining only to themselves.

The Water Theme Park which is proposed for the MacKenzie

Park area will be dropped unless the eastside residents come together as a total community and vote for it in January 1986. You can no longer wait for someone else to look out for you, we must stand on our own, face-up to the challenges and win. By bringing the Water Park issue to a city wide vote, west Lubbock believes the measure will be easily defeated.

Half trues are being spread that the park will cause taxes to go up, well, in all likely hood, taxes will go up in the next 5 years, with or without the pa'k. Therefore, why not have the enjoyment of the park, at least you can see where and why your taxes are being raised. Another argument presented, here is already a Water Park in Lubbock, where is this park, closer to Brownfield than east Lubbock, plus it only has a Bater slide. Another argument, the city would be going into partnership with private enterprise, well, the city is already receiving returns from the concessions at the airport and MacKenzie gold course. To me, that indicates they are already in partnership with at least two private enterprises, maybe many more.

Will the city lose money if they invest in the Water Park. As with any investment, there is a risk involved while the'e is a chance to make a profit. The same applies to the Water Park, however, there is a 50-50 chance, not like other expenditures that the city has made well in excess of 2.4 million dollar. What are the chances of the city receiving any return on the man-made lakes, Maxey, Mae Simmons, Guadalupe Parks or any other beautification or recreation, it will bring new businesses such as motels, service stations, restaurants with even more jobs within the east Lubbock area. Something taht many have not considered, the Water Park will give us somewhere to take visiting relatives and friends, not to mentioy somewhere for our youth to go besides street corners to "hang out".

Middle class women also became instrumental in publishing material against the Diaz regime. Officials jailed Juana Gutierrez de Mendoza in Belen Prison in Mexico City repeatedly for using her newspaper *Vesper* to speak out in defense of the mine workers and for lashing out at the capitalist policies Porfirio Diaz. Upon leaving San Antonio, Carmen and Aquiles were given ammunition and weapons to be distributed to rebels in Puebla for the Diaz overthrow on November 20th. On November 18, at approximately seven o'clock local police led by Colonel Joaquin Pita and federal troops commanded by General Luis del Valle, tipped off by an informant, fell upon the Serdan home to confiscate the weapons being stored for the Revolution and to arrest Aquiles Serdan. During the battle Carmen was wounded and her younger brother Maximo, plus sixteen other rebels, were killed. Carmen, her mother, and sister-in-law were arrested and held for questioning. Carmen was responsible but never prosecuted for the death of one of the two policemen killed during the conflict. The morning after the conflict, after hiding in the Serdan home to avoid capture, Aquiles was killed while fleeing by Lieutenant Porfirio Perez.

If you want more info'mation, information that is fac'ual, then contact Councilmembers Trejo or Patterson or FantaSea. These people Bill give you the pros and cons on the Water Park. As your State Representative, I support the Water Park for Mackenzie Park and I feel the City of Lubbock should pay whatever to bring this park to reality. It is an investment that will be well spent. To all the voters I say vote for the Water Park in January 1986, do not allow the private interest of a few, sway your vote against something that will benefit "positively Lubbock".




