AUSTIN, Dec. 17. (AP)-Judge Roy C. Archer ruled today that if the Texas A&M board of directors does not establish a law course for Negroes by Feb. 1, Heman Marion Sweatt must be admitted as a student at the University of Texas.

Attorneys for Sweatt countered that the terms of ceedings this morning after Judge Archer's June 17 ruling had not been met by the action of the A&M board. They contended his constitutional been accepted.

British Back US Proposal For Action

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 17 UP) .- The United States lost its fight today for immediate approval of its plan for con-trolling atomic energy after Soviet Russia pleaded for delay to study the proposal paragraph by paragraph.


LAKE SUCCESS. N.Y. Dec. 17. (AP)-The United States and Great Britain formally called upon the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission today to approve the United States' plan for harnessing the atom for peace. Bernard M. Baruch led off with a proposal that the commission approve now his plan for outlawing atomic weapons and using the atom for peaceful purposes.

Sir Alexander Cadogan, British delegate, quickly seconded Baruch and asked that the American principles be incorporated in the report that the commission must make to the United Nations Security Council.

In a brief speech to the full meeting of the commission, Baruch said that the question had been debated long enough and that the time for action had come.

Baruch, the United States representative of the atomic energy commission, came to the meeting with the determination to push for a decision as soon as possible. The commission is considering







The farms they seek average 87 1-2 acres and are in the area of the Lost river, a strange, two-way stream which can be made to flow in either direction - depending on whether its waters are needed for the Klamath river or neighboring irrigation streams.

"The whole area open to settlement has been estimated to be worth \$2,000,000 - with individual farms valued around \$15,000 each - but you can't fairly place an estimate on them," a bureau spokesman said.

"Of the 7,527 acres, 1,300 were farmed under WRA (War Relocation Authority) and last year one man bid \$76 an acre and invested \$4,500 in a lease for one year. The average 1944 crop output per acre of an adjoining project was \$161.68".

DALLAS, Dec. 17 (P).-Liquor drinking was blamed today by William Hamilton Moody, 42, for his prospect of a term in prison. He stoically heard a jury in Judge Winter King's court last night find him guilty of the Sept. 1 pistol slaying of his neighbor, Eugene L. Ballard, 41, and assess a 30-year term in the penitenti-

"Guess I would have felt the same way had I been on the jury," Moody, a former tavern operator, said. "I received a fair trial and, without funds now, expect I will accept sentence and not appeal." Moody testified he and a woman companion turned in the Bal-lard House believing it to be his

own. He told the jury he fired thinking Ballard to be a hijacker after the latter had knocked him and the woman down on the porch. The couple lived two doors farther down the street. Moody admitted they were intoxicated. From his jail cell today Moody attributed his plight to excessive drinking. "It would suit me if they closed up every liquor store in the country," he said.

Proposed Project Would Aid Area

The state board of water engineers has granted permission to the Upper Colorado River Authority to construct a dam on the Colorado above Robert Lee for the impounding of waters for irrigation purposes.

This is a welcome development, for virtually everyone familiar with the potential development which could ensue from irrigation of lands below the proposed dams will agree that it will mean much to the area,

Previously the board had allocated waters on the river above Colorado City to the Colorado River Municipal Water association for the developement of a multi-city water supply. The UCRA expressed concern at the time, and filed a mild protest to the appli-

cation, that it would place that project in jeopardy. These fears, we believe, were not well founded. Even if the up-river project materializes, there will be ample water left to meet the demands of the UCRA project, for all its figures are based on a miximum utilization of lands subject to irrigation. Experience shows that this would not, in all liklihood, materialize.

Thus, there should be enough water impounded, behind the Robert Lee dam to meet such needs as will arise. 


