## Red Light Cameras Installation; Other Council Decisions Dominated News Scene in 2007

**A**s people start to come out of their celebratory mood and face the realities of a New Year, the news coming out of the "old year" will be far from the patriotic tradition in the form of the Virginia Tech campus murder rampage; thousands of Americans losing their home in the sub prime mortgage crisis, and some to the California wildfires.

Meanwhile the rest of the country is waiting

come home as the war continues into the New Year, headed towards its 5th anniversary; and wondering just who will be elected president in November to lead this country out of that quagmire beginning in January 2009.

As far as Lubbock is concerned, there was plenty to go around. And the access to news and information continues to multiply by leaps and bounds as the internet viewing audience continued to grow and new web sites and blogs continued to be introduced.

On the local scene, Lubbock residents experienced just about everything under the sun; the recall effort against a city council member, the resignation of another council member, the installation of red light cameras; and the kidnapping of a newborn baby from the Lubbock Medical Center, and the non-re-appointment of Lubbock resident Chev Morales to the Civic Lubbock Inc. Board after 13 years of service.

And that list is just for starters.

One of the primary concerns among many Lubbockians in 2007 was the increase in criminal activity in the city.

Mitchell Wachholz. A few seconds later, the young man by the name of Chace Pendleton lies dead outside on the store's sidewalk entrance. The murderer was especially appalling to some residents when it was discovered that the killing had racial overtones as the suspect had been angered to the point of shooting Pendleton because Pendleton was a person of color.

And it's not over as Congress continues to try to find ways to investigate the firings and tries to find ways to force ex-administrations officials like Karl Rove to testify. Although Congress has issued subpoenas, they have largely been ignored by individual individuals involved.

long awaited kidney transplant. Aguirre says he "feels blessed and very grateful" for his operation's success and that he is doing well.

On the other hand, this city's landscape will never be the same as the Lubbock city council voted against the installation of red light cameras at 12 Lubbock intersections. By all indications, the majority of city residents were adamantly against the cameras; but the majority on the council, with the exception of Councilman John Leonard voted in favor of installing the cameras; a fact that will be remembered by voters in May as they elect a new Mayor and new council members in District 2, 4, and 6.

And how can residents forget the summer water crisis as they were forced to cut back on water usage and consumption after Assistant City Manager Tom Adams gave the go ahead for construction to begin on a

water main connected to the construction of the Sharp Freeway. The restrictions ultimately cost the city over \$1 million of thousands of dollars in loss of water sales, overtime costs of more than \$80,000 dollars, and a very substantial loss of revenue to this city's landscape and nursery businesses.

Will we ever know the actual cost? That's a figure that no one at city hall is in a hurry to make public.

For El Editor, the year started with the headline, "Hispanic Group calls for Moratorium on Immigrant Raids" and concluded with a story about whether Hispanics will vote in greater numbers in the 2008 presidential election. "Will the Strong Giant Wake Up?"

In between, we have had literally a smorgasbord of news. The Lubbock City Council gave us plenty of material and we expect 2008 to bring us some of the same.

As the year came to a close, the decision by Assistant City Manager Scott Snider to censor artwork based on religious preferences versus constitutional law and revelation that the Lubbock Police Department has placed police surveillance cameras in at least 7 different alleys in the city, has caused quite a stir. Residents, including some city council members by proxy. To date, we have learned that Mayor David Miller and ex-police officer and current District 2 council member Floyd Price were aware of the cameras. Which once again opened the council and Lubbock Police Department up to criticism since Jim Gilbreath, John Leonard, and Todd Klein all said they were not aware of the cameras but wished they had been informed.

And last but not least, one of Lubbock's oldest Mexican organizations, which started out as the "Comunicantes Organizados Mejico Americanos" and later became the Lubbock Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, might cease to exist in its present form after 33 years in existence. On December 13, the majority of the Hispanic Chamber's members decided to merge with the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce. As a result; money was the main issue and driving force behind the merger. Now the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce will have to vote in the merger before the board can be disbanded.

Will we see as much a year from now as 2007 was? By all indications, the Mayor and other city council members, and the race for Precinct 3 County Commissioner between incumbent Ysidro Gutierrez and former County Commissioner Gilbert Flores will provide us plenty to write about in the coming year.

### Democratic Iowa Caucuses Heats Up Between Richardson and Clinton

While the weather has been cold and blustery in Iowa, chances are that it is not much colder than the mood between some of the candidates as they await the first Caucus in the nation which will go a long way toward determining just who is a legitimate Presidential contender.

Will it be Obama, Clinton or Edwards? Or will it be Bill Richardson who has been able to mount a credible campaign by raising more money than anyone thought he could?

The Iowa Caucuses definitely are heating up more than the weather outside; even though the candidates remain cool to each other.

In a news release, the Richardson for President Campaign says that Richardson "welcomes her [Clinton's] attempt to focus on who is ready to be President, because the answer is her." Richardson, "Richardson," "I am ready, I am tested, and I can triple my efforts together to change the country," says the current Governor of New Mexico and serious Presidential contender.

Richardson's was responding to a Hillary Clinton television ad which asks the question: "Who is ready to be President?"

According to Richardson, "every candidate in this race is asking for the biggest job promotion of his or her life."

He asks rhetorically, "What has the Senate done in the last 12 months? Since my colleagues took over leadership of Congress, have they gotten us out of Iraq? No. Did they scrap No Child Left Behind and reform education? No. Did we stop an Attorney General who wouldn't say that water boarding is torture? No. Have they done something to create the next generation of great paying jobs? No."

Both sides seem to be in agreement on this point. In her baseless attack, Richardson concluded her statement this way, "In the last twelve months, I helped shut down North Korea's nuclear reactor. We brought back the remains of 6 American soldiers from that country that had been missing since the Korean War. I extended health coverage to every child under 12 in my state. I raised teacher salaries. I cracked down on unsupervised lenders. I passed a landmark clean energy bill to create clean air and thousands of jobs that cannot be outsourced."

"That's what I'm offering: real change, not excuses."

### Arnett Benson Resident First Traffic Fatality of 2008

Juanita Perez, a long time Arnett Benson resident and mother of 4, became the city's first traffic fatality when she was struck by a car in a 4200 block of Erskine Street in North Lubbock.

The accident happened around 12:30 AM on Tuesday morning; just as New Year's Eve traffic was beginning to head home from a night of celebration.

According to a friend of the family, the victim and her friend were headed home when the accident occurred. For some reason, Perez got out of the car she was in and decided to walk home.

Lubbock police are still investigating the accident; but it is not expected that charges will be brought against the driver of the vehicle which struck Perez.

The street where the accident happened was well known to Arnett Benson and North Lubbock residents. The stretch of road runs west of Indiana and intersects with North Quaker. It is a dark street and one which does not have any street lights; an issue that is sure to be discussed as the accident investigation continues.

Perez leaves 3 sons and one daughter, and grandchildren behind.

Also in July, 25-year-old Alonso Lewis was charged with capital murder after he stabs Lubbock resident Don McCullough in McCullough's driveway in Southwest Lubbock while McCullough's wife was him inside the house. ### Year 2007 - Wildest Ride ever for Hispanic

Never in history have Hispanics been the focus of so much major stories as in 2007.

Headline glare ranged from immigration turmoil to the dreary departure of Alberto Gonzales, the nation's first Hispanic Supreme Court Justice.

Thirteen '07 occurrences were identified by Hispanic Link editors and columnists as of unique and vital significance to the nation's 44 million Latinos. Congress' rejection of comprehensive immigration legislation was deemed of greatest significance by most of the ten surveyed journalists.

In order of emphasis, the episodes were:

#### 1) FEDERAL IMMIGRATION REFORM: The community's position remains that a path to citizenship for the 12 million undocumented immigrants who live here now must be included.

A bipartisan proposal failed to gather enough steam in the U.S. Senate last June. And as President Bush's initial support waned, additional reform bills and dreams went nowhere. The AGJOBS bill AND dream act, each of which had been supported by Hispanic concerns, also eventually floundered.

#### 2) STATE IMMIGRATION BILLS: More than 1,500 immigration bills were introduced at the state level in 2007, nearly tripling the number submitted in 2006, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

Main areas addressed were employment, education, health care, driver's licenses and voter forms as identifiers, public benefits, law enforcement and human trafficking. While the majority of them were restrictive in nature, some aimed to integrate or benefit immigrants living here.

Spread across 46 states, a total of 244 bills became law. The NCCLS attributed the spike to federal government inaction.

3) PROTEST V/S. PBS, KEN BURNS: University of Texas at Austin journalist professor Maggie Rivas Rodriguez and San Diego activist Gustav Chávez spearheaded a campaign to give recognition to some

On returning to Lubbock the team continued to receive a local and statewide accolades. They received a well deserved hero's welcome upon their return to Lubbock at the airport. The team's success continued, finally culminating with a parade organized by over two thousand adoring fans.

The year also saw a contentious battle between supporters of a street renaming in honor of farm workers labor leader and activist Cesar Chavez and those who opposed it. It was a long arduous process with many residents from the Hispanic community getting involved and appearing before the City Council during the regular City Council meetings to make their case for the name change. There, they joined the majority of the city's residents who also approached the council in opposition to the proposed name change east of 10th street.

And after years of trying to get Canyon Lakes Drive renamed in honor of Chavez, supporters finally had to settle for a truncated Cesar Chavez Dr. Despite Councilwoman Linda DeLeon's admittance to the council to "not give her scars"; the councilwoman ultimately voted in favor of the amended resolution.

For the publisher of this newspaper, the beginning of 2007 also brought good news; as Publisher David Aguirre finally received his

15-hour PBS documentary The War.

Racing to intense pressure, Burns added interviews with two Latino veterans. The War was released Sept. 23, ironically coinciding with Hispanic Heritage Month.

Hispanic leaders and Congress members continue to denounce the effort and press for more, particularly with regard to materials being distributed to schools.

4) RICHARDSON RUNS FOR PRESIDENT: Gov. Bill Richardson (D-N.M.) announced May 21 his candidacy for U.S. president. While frequently acknowledged as best qualified by experience for the position, his political poll findings behind Clinton, Obama and Edwards. Analysts often mention him as a prospective vice presidential candidate.

#### 5) LATINO COMMUNITY RESPONSES: Latino and immigrant activists strengthened their relationships and flexed their united political muscle in 2007 following massive grassroots protests nationwide the year before against House's passage in December '05 of the enforcement-only Senate immigration bill. Participation in 160 demonstrations hundreds of cities was topped by Chicago, Los Angeles and Washington, each estimated at about half a million.

6) ALBERTO GONZALES RESIGNS: Embattled U.S. Attorney General Alberto Gonzales, the nation's first Latino to hold the position, resigned Aug. 27 after enduring months of press criticism and calls for his resignation from Democratic and some Republican elected leaders. Gonzales was one of nine U.S. Attorneys in the spring of 2006, some reportedly motivated by politics.

Civil rights groups cheered his resignation as they related his term to controversies such as the abuses in Abu Ghraib. National Latino organizations remained mostly silent about his resignation.

## 2008 Will Bring Questions about Bond Election; Mayoral and County Commissioner Election

We know what 2007 brought us; are we ready to look forward and see what 2008 will deliver? Will the New Year bring us unexpected surprises like more Lubbock police surveillance cameras in our residential alleys?

Our guess is that it will be one of the most news filled years we have had in a very long time. And that's saying a lot considering that every year seems to bring us an abundance of news.

Sometimes, things are easy to predict. Take the 2008 Presidential Election. We all know it will be a big story; we just don't know who will emerge as the two Presidential contenders; who will be on the ballot come November 4?

In our view, there are certain stories we plan to pay particular attention to.

First and foremost, the Mayor's race in May is sure to produce more fireworks than the 4th of July. We expect a contentious drag out fight between the 2 major candidates Mayor David Miller and Tom Martin. ## 2007 Congressional Review: No help for Hispanics on immigration, the rest was a mixed bag

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The first session of the 110th Congress began in 2007 with a pair of significant firsts for the Hispanic community:

Representative Nydia Velázquez of New York became the first Latina ever to chair a full congressional committee when she took over the House Small Business Committee, and Silvestre Reyes of Texas became the first Hispanic to chair the influential House Select Committee on Technology.

The year began with high expectations on a number of fronts, including immigration. Democrats had largely run in 2006 on the promise that if they won control of Congress, they would certainly take up comprehensive immigration reform, including a path to legalize many of the estimated 12 million undocumented persons residing in the United States.

The Senate took on the issue almost immediately, but supporters were repeatedly blocked by a vocal anti-immigrant faction that took advantage of the fact that the Democrats held only a razor-thin majority in the upper chamber.

For legislators who normally requires at least 60 votes to pass, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) could count on no more than 51. He tried and failed a couple of times to move bills forward. By summer it became clear that the Senate would at least reach, if not after the 2008 election.

At least once tried, House leaders repeatedly declared they would not take up the issue if the Senate failed to pass it. It was a bitter pill for the millions who had anticipated a friendlier atmosphere on Capitol Hill. Congress also failed to pass the so-called Dream Act, which would have permitted some undocumented high school graduates to pay same-in-state tuition as their legal counterparts and would have allowed many to obtain legal residence status.

Additionally, Congress was unsuccessful in passing legislation that would have granted temporary residency to undocumented ag-

ricultural workers. Ag-fighters failed to move even with the support of agriculture.

But not all was gloom and doom. Members did manage to pass the first increase in ten years in the federal minimum wage. Democrats touted the measure as a great benefit to Latino families.

Latino advocates for expansion of the State Children's Health Insurance Program were disappointed by the legislation's failure to increase the coverage. President Bush vetoed SCHIP targets children in families who earn too much to qualify for Medicaid but too little to pay for their own coverage. Forty percent of Latino children with health insurance receive coverage through SCHIP.

Supporters sought to expand the program from its current level of four million children to 10 million. The president vetoed the bill to too costly.

All three Latino senators, Republican Mel Martinez of Florida and Democratic Robert Menendez of New Jersey and Ken Salazar of Colorado voted for passage of the controversial legislation to expand waivers and easements without a court warrant — a measure the American Civil Liberties Union blasted as unconstitutional and “un-American.”

The legislation also allowed the CIA to engage in “ harsh” interrogation tactics without significant oversight. The ACLU and other groups criticized the Congress and Democratic leaders for failing to bring in “unraveled hysterics” fueled by the White House in the attack against terrorism.

Lawmakers were more subtle about passage of a free trade agreement with Peru. Supporters of the pact called it a passage of a major victory in a Congress controlled by Democratic less inclined than Republicans to approve trade bills. As did in 1993 counterpart North America Free Trade Agreement (with Canada and Mexico) the pact allows for greater exchange of goods and services, some tariffs and removing other barriers.

Other Latin American trade pacts languished. Legislators declined to support one with Colombia, accusing its government of

elacionadas con particular grupos. Los gobernantes de África Unida spenden millones unicamente habilitando el U.S. Congress to green-light a trade pact.

Congress came under fire for not making any significant change in the Bush administration's Iraq policy, which polls show is strongly opposed by Latino voters. Repeatedly blocked from passage was any legislation that contained an exit plan or troop departure date.

Legislators were home for the holiday after passing a massive budget bill that called for funding for nearly all federal agencies and departments except the Defense Department for fiscal year 2008, which began in October.

Democrats had originally sought a funding increase averaging seven percent, while the White House proposed just one percent.

Democrats and the White House clashed over funding for a wide range of programs, including food stamps, student loans, home heating assistance for low-income families, and urban renewal.

Democrats also sought a budget bill that included a proposal for reauthorization of the farm bill.

Congressional observers call this first session of the new Democratic majority a “wash,” while congressional leaders argue that more change will come only with the election of more Democrats in 2008 — enough to stop what they call Republican obstructionism.

Republicans naturally disagree, arguing that they are the ones prioritizing what Latinos and others in the country want from Congress.

Overton Neighborhood Association and Sorca and Street Lights

Last week, Clyde “Chico” James wrote: “In his latest letter, Roger Settler spoke of the streetlights in South Overton. In the letter, he gave credit where credit is due in name of the SORCA neighborhood association that originated the drive to fix them.”

NOT TRUE, CLYDE! This letter demands a proper response. This writer did not give SORCA credit for anything in all his column, nor “Tenet.” My statement was that as a representative of the Overton Neighborhood Association (OSNA), I spoke with Mayor DAVID MILLER about fixing the ornamental street lights, many of which were burned out, dim or damaged. For a number of years, nothing had been done. In his usual functional support of LINDA DELFON, something I have never understood, Clyde attempts to give Linda credit for the repair instead of Mayor Miller. The FACT is that Linda took office in 2004, and NOTHAPPENED, as usual. Mayor Miller, when asked to help the neighborhood, began the next day. Whatever you might think of the Mayor and his performance in office....and I for one has disagreed with almost all of his major votes....he rightly deserves credit for his promptness and action. Had he not done so, Linda, the lights would still be the same. I would be the LAST to credit the town for saving the ornamental street lights.

OSNA would have been the first to complain if anything had happened to the ornamental street lights in South Overton. In the late 1990s, SORCA came under new leadership, and began a path of neighborhood involvement. ## REPASO CONGRESIONAL DEL AÑO: RESULTADOS MIXTOS PARA HISPAÑOS

La primera sesión del congreso federal comenzó en el 2007 con dos primicias de importancia para la comunidad Latina: la congresista Nydia Velázquez de Nueva York se convirtió en la primera latina en tomar el mando de un comité congressional al encabezar el Comité de Propiedad Empresarial de la cámara baja, y Silvestre Reyes de Texas pasó al ser el primer hispano en dirigir el influente Comité de Asuntos de Inteligencia.

El año comenzó con altas expectativas en varios asuntos, incluyendo el tema de la inmigración. Los demócratas se postularon en el 2006 mayamente bajo la premisa que i llegaran a la mayoría en el congreso, cuesten lo que cueste tomarían el asunto de una reforma migratoria integral que incluyera pasos hacia la legalización de muchos de los aproximadamente 12 millones de indocumentados viviendo en el país.

El senado votó el tema de inmigración, pero lo que apoyaban la medida fueron continuamente bloqueados por la gran mayoría de republicanos que se oponían a la medida de los demócratas. Los demócratas no tuvieron una mayoría que i llegaran en el senado.

El fraude del congreso fue un trago amargo para los millones que anticipaban un ambiente más abierto al tema en el congreso con mayoría demócrata. El congresista además frascos en aprobar el llamado Dream Act que hubiera dejado que millones de jóvenes obtuvieran residencia legal y que los estudiantes indocumentados pagaran la misma matrícula universitaria que sus compatriotas en estados de donde se han graduado de escuela superior. ## El año 2007 - Tormentoso como nunca para los Hispanos

Nunca en toda la historia han sido ni el foco ni el fulcro los hispanos de tantas noticias importantes como en el 2007.

El destello de los titulares corría la gama desde el tumulto migratorio hasta la deprimida partida de Alberto Gonzales, el primer hispano en la Corte Fiscal de la Nación.

Los editores y periodistas de Hispanic Link identificaron a tres eventos en el 2007 como de particularidad única y significación vital para los 44 millones de latinos de esta nación. El rechazo del Congreso de legislación migratoria comprensiva se consideró de mayor significación por parte de la mayoría de los diez periodistas entrevistados.

En orden del énfasis atribuido, los episodios fueron:

### 1)REFORMA MIGRATORIA FEDERAL:

La posición de la comunidad sigue siendo que se debe incluir un camino a la ciudadanía



para los 12 millones de inmigrantes sin documentos que viven aquí hoy.

Una propuesta bipartita no logró recoger suficiente apoyo en el Senado estadounidense el pasado junio, y en la otra cámara no logró el apoyo suficiente. El presidente Bush había disfrutado en un comienzo, no fueron tampoco a ninguna parte otros intentos de reforma.

La propuesta de ley para trabajos en la industria agrícola, AgJOBS y la ley que daría acceso a estudiantes de secundaria sin documentos a cursos universitarios en su estado pagando la misma matrícula que los residentes del estado. Diferentes Act. también trastabillaron en su nacimiento.

2)PROYECTOS DE LEY DE REFORMA MIGRATORIA EN LOS ESTADOS: Se presentaron más de 1.500 proyectos de ley a nivel estatal en el 2007, casi el triple del número entrado en el 2006, según la National Conference of State Legislatures (Conferencia Nacional de Legislaturas Estatales,

NSCL por sus siglas en inglés).

Las áreas principales a las que se dio enfoque fueron el empleo, la educación, la salud, las licencias de conducir y otras formas de identificación personal, beneficios públicos, cumplimiento de la ley y trámite humano. Mientras que la mayoría fue de naturaleza restrictiva, algunas tuvieron el intento de integrar o beneficiar a los inmigrantes.

Entre los 46 estados, un total de 244 proyectos se hicieron ley. La NSCL atribuyó el auge a la falta de acción por parte del gobierno federal.

3)PROTESTA V. PBS. KEN BURNS: Profesora de periodismo de la Universidad de Texas, Asunción Maggi Rivero-Rodríguez y activista de San Diego, Gus Chávez encabezaron una campaña que se reconoció en el medio milón de latinos que pelen en la segunda guerra mundial. Exigieron que se incluyera la experiencia hispana,

cía como el mejor calificado por razón de sus experiencias, en las encuestas normalmente salen autor, después de Clinton, Obama y Edwards. Los analistas lo mencionan a menudo como presunto candidato a la vice presidencia.

5)RESPUESTAS DE LA COMUNIDAD LATINA: Los latinos respondieron a las amenazas y provocaciones con sus luces y mostraron su misticismo en unión política en el 2007 tras masivas protestas de base a nivel nacional el año anterior contra la aprobación de la Cámara de Representantes en diciembre del 2005 del proyecto de ley migratoria propuesto por Sensenbrenner que incluía sólo término de cumplimiento de la ley. La participación en las manifestaciones de 2006 de los latinos de ciudades vivió con mayor vigor en Chicago, Los Angeles y en Washington, D.C., cada una con un estimado medio millón de participantes.

6)LA RENUNCIA DE ALBERTO GONZÁLEZ: El asediado Fiscal de la Nación, Alberto Gonzales, primer latino en asumir el cargo en la historia de los EE.UU., renunció el 27 de agosto después de resistir meses de críticas de la prensa y lucha de su administración por electores demócratas y algunos republicanos. A Gonzales lo pusieron en la mira por haber despedido a nueve fiscales federales estatales en la primavera de 2006, algunos reputados haber sido despedidos con motivación política.

Grupos de derechos civiles vitorearon su renuncia por lo que relacionaban su término con controversias como los abusos en Abu Ghraib. Organizaciones latinas nacionales y locales celebraron su salida en mayor parte sobre su permanencia.

7)LA DEPORTACIÓN DE ELVIRA ARELLANO: Durante su año en el santuario de una iglesia en Chicago, después de haber de-

la cual fue completamente omitida, en el documental de 16 horas, *The War*, del cineasta Ken Burns, emitido por PBS (el sistema de televisión y radio pública).

Reaccionando contra una intensa presión, Burns agregó entrevistas con dos veteranos de guerra latinos. The War salió el 23 de septiembre, irónicamente coincidiendo con el Mes de la Herencia Hispana.

Direntes hispanos y miembros del Congreso continúan denunciando el esfuerzo y presionan para que se haga más, en particular referente a los materiales que se están repartiendo a las escuelas públicas.

8)RICHARDSON SE LANZA

A LA PRESIDENCIA: El gobernador Bill Richardson (demócrata de Nuevo México), anunció el 21 de mayo su candidatura al cargo de presidente de los Estados Unidos. Si bien se le reconoce con frecuen-

tia como uno de los padres de su movimiento, el 21 de mayo se convirtió en el primero en la ciudad fronteriza de Tijuana.

9)MURIO EN LA FRONTERA: Directivos de gobierno mexicanos se unieron a grupos de latinos estadounidenses en oposición a la construcción de un muro de 900 millas de largo que cerraría el acceso entre México y los Estados Unidos.

10) INCREMENTO EN EL SALARIO MINIMO: El salario mínimo aumentó el 22 de julio por primera vez en diez años — de \$5.15 a \$5.85 la hora — con incrementos de 70 centavos para llegar a \$6.55 para julio del 2008 y a \$7.25 para julio del 2009.

Los defensores de la medida proyectan que será de beneficio a 1.3 millones de trabajadores latinos y sus familias.

10) CAMPAÑA PRO CIUDADANÍA: Se acercó a las madres latinas por las campañas que dirigieron a un millón de personas a las listas de ciudadanos estadounidenses en el 2007. Las organizaciones latinas y empresas medianas han completado la primera fase de, 'Ya Es Hora. Ciudadanía!'

El Instituto de Políticas Tomás Rivera calcula que 9.3 millones de hispanos votarán en el 2008.

11) DECRETO DE TIRADO EN HAZLETON: Un decreto que

aprobó el consejo municipal en Hazleton, Pensilvania, habría obligado a los caseros y empleadores a requerir prueba de estado legal antes de alquilar o contratar fue tachado por un juez federal el 26 de julio por ser inconstitucional. La batalla en corte la encabezaron la American Civil Liberties Union y la Fundación Pueblito de Defensa de los Derechos Civiles.

12) DEBATES DE LOS CANDIDATOS PRESIDENCIALES: La mayoría de los candidatos republicanos evadieron los debates

publicos sobre temas referentes a los hispanos y de raza, mientras que ambos partidos hicieron caso omiso de dar enfoque a asuntos de importancia a la población hispana y latina, o directamente evocando cuando se les preguntaba, por ejemplo, sobre su posición referente a los niños nacidos en los EE.UU. de padres indocumentados.

13) SUBE EL COSTO DE SERVICIO DEL USCIS: Los costos

por obtener la ciudadanía aumentaron de \$475 a \$675 y de \$300 a \$1.010 para la residencia permanente. El Servicio de Inmigración e Immigration and Naturalization Service (USCIS por sus siglas en inglés) sostuvo que el aumento era necesario para dar mejor servicio y fortalecer la tecnología.

Grupos hispanos cabdearon extensivamente por bloquear el aumento, reclamando que los costos por la ciudadanía y la residencia permanente estarían lejos del alcance de muchas familias latinas.

USCIS advirtió que era probable que los demandas en el procesamiento de solicitudes. Esto llevó a protestas y disturbios entre los dirigentes hispanos quienes temían que por causa de las demoras en el procesamiento miles de hispanos no podrían votar en el 2008.

The 30-year-old Mayweather is considered the best pound-for-pound fighter in the world and boxing's No. 1 drawing card. His fights this year with Ricky Hatton and Oscar De La Hoya generated 3.25 million pay-per-view buys, more than \$200 million in revenue and earned him about \$50 million.

After the war she recorded for a variety of labels and continued to enjoy big hits in the Hispanic market, including Amor Bonito, one of the few songs she wrote herself and which was dedicated to her first husband.


Her career declined for a time in the late 1940s when it was widely believed that she had died in a car accident. In fact, it was her sister, Panchita, who had been killed but when Mendoza began touring again, the public took some convincing that it was her. On at least one occasion, her manager was attacked by angry fans who believed they were being sold an impostor.

Very much alive, she went on to record more than 50 albums in a long career that only ended when she suffered a stroke in 1988. After moving to Houston in 1964, she also began to reach a white college audience on the burgeoning folk scene and later became popular with a world music audience.

She was asked to sing at the inauguration of President Jimmy Carter in 1977. In 1999 she was awarded the National Medal of the Arts. In a ceremony at the White House, President Bill Clinton described her as "the first rural American woman performer to garner a large following throughout Latin America."

In 2001 the Oxford University Press published Lydia Mendoza's Life in Music, a 235-page academic study by Yolanda Broyles-González.

She is survived by a daughter, Lydia Mendoza, singer, was born on May 21, 1916. She died on December 20, 2007, aged 91
