The question is: who will the Clinton supporters vote for?


But that is not the only question which seeks an answer; as one of the concerns is whether the Hispanic populace will join the African American community and vote for Barack Obama.

A survey by a group of minorities conducted by New American Media in 2007 found that 61% of Hispanics prefer relationships with Anglos or whites; in comparison to the 3% who prefer relationships with blacks.

Now that the race is between Obama and McCain; voters may very well decide that Obama represents a better opportunity for Latinos than does Senator John Mc-Cain. There are many examples of Hispanics voting for a black candidate as they did in Chicago when Harold Washington was elected Mayor; the only time an African American has won the position of Mayor.

But never before have the stakes been so high. Never before has a black candidate had to appeal to the Latino voter on such a grand scale. The fact that Obama had a hard time winning the Latino vote during the primaries does not bode

# gaining strength in key states

By STEPHEN OHLEMACHER WASHINGTON - Voting by Hispanics surged in the last congressional elections, showing strength that could swing this year's presidential vote in closely contested states like Colorado, Nevada and New Mexico.

A government report released Tuesday shows that 5.6 million Hispanics voted in the 2006 general election, an increase of 18 percent over 2002, the previous year for a federal election without a presidential race on the ballot. That compares to a 7 percent increase among white voters and a 5 percent increase for black voters.

"For years they called the Latinos the sleeping giant. Well, they woke us up," said Luis Vera, general counsel for the League of United Latin American Citizens, or LU-

Vera said the debate over illegal immigration has energized Hispanic voters, a trend he expects to continue this year.

The presidential candidates are taking notice. Republican John Mc-Cain and Democrat Barack Obama both addressed the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials last week and both are scheduled to speak at the LULAC national convention next week.

Hispanics made up only 6 percent of American voters in 2006, according to the report by the Census Bureau. But their numbers are big enough to be decisive in several battleground states, especially in a tight race.

Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico and Florida all have a significant number of Hispanic voters. President Bush narrowly won all four states in 2004, and they could all be hotly contested this year.

"When you look at the battleground states, at least four of them are very heavily Hispanic," said Simon Rosenberg, head of a think tank called NDN, formerly the New Democrat Network. "We will see more (campaign) media heaped on Hispanic voters than at any time in American history."

Hispanics, long considered part of the Democratic base, have become swing voters in recent elections. President Bush did well among Hispanic voters in his two presidential victories. But many swung back to the Democrats in 2006, when many Republicans staked out tough positions against illegal immigration. The Democrats regain control of both houses of Congress.

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## Is Obama too Liberal?

It seemed that Senor Quirino came to our rescue to bring us back to earth on all our decisions and therefore served as our mentor and most respected advisor of the group.

My fondest recollection was when our group decided to have an Adelita as the symbol of Las Fiestas instead of a "Reina" or queen of the fiestas; as had been the tradition. Prior to that year; a Reina de las Fiestas or queen of the fiestas was selected to serve as the fiesta's queen. Our idea was to crown an "Adelita" instead of a queen; since Adelita was a Mexican Revolutionary figure and represented the struggles we were going through back in the 70's.

"Están locos!" You all are crazy! That was Señor Quirino's first reaction. But as we evolved the reasoning behind having an Adelita became clearer, and Señor Quirino grew to accept and love the newly established

Throughout the years it seemed Señor Quirino remained involved in Texas everything from the Raza Unida Party on the political front to participating in many student activities at the university level. We always welcomed and treasured his opinions.

Hispanics are the nation's largest and fastest growing minority group, though they have been slow to gain political power nationally because only 60 percent of adult Hispanics are U.S. citizens, according to the Census Bureau.

Both political parties, however, see their voting strength growing.

"Just looking at the demographics, whichever party ends up winning the Latino vote will be the majority party in the 21st century," Rosenberg said.

# Carlos Quirino Sr. Hispanic voters What Latinos want from their president

Any candidate who wants to and that is compassionate in a way that is attract this crucial voting bloc must address racial equality. By Alberto R. Gonzales

Sen. Barack Obama's presidential campaign has reignited an examination of race relations in America. It has led some to question how deep the divide is between black and white Americans. From my perspective, the question ignores the reality of our diverse society. We must also consider the divide between the majority from another group, one that I happen to belong to: Latinos.

According to the Pew Research Center, Latinos are the nation's largest minority group, at 42 million people and 14% of the population. By 2050, that population will triple, to 128 million, which will be 29% of the American population.

Those numbers are already having a political impact. Just how strong it may be could become clear in November. In a close presidential election, the Latino vote could decide the outcome. For example, in the closely contested strategic states of The Associated Press compared New Mexico, Florida and Colorado, Latinos make up, respectively, 37%, 14% and 12% of eligible voters.

The conventional wisdom is that Latinos vote Democratic. But not necessarily. In 1999, according to a Pew Hispanic Center report published in 2007, Democrats enjoyed a 33% advantage over Republicans in partisan allegiance among Latino registered voters. However, in 2003, a sufficient number of Latinos voted for Republican Arnold Schwarzenegger (over a respected Latino Democrat) to make Schwarzenegger the governor of California. In 2004, President Bush won a historic percentage of the Latino vote (more than 40%). By 2006, again according to the Pew Hispanic Center, the Democrats' edge in partisan allegiance had dropped to 21%.

Pew's numbers now show that Latino voters are heading back into the Democratic fold, but the message in these voting patterns and in the demographic projections is that neither party can afford to take the Latino vote for granted.

The great diversity within the Latino population presents a challenge for both parties. Mexican Americans in Texas, Cuban Americans in Florida and Puerto Rican Americans in New York do not agree on every issue. But - while I can't speak for all Latinos -- I believe there are issues that resonate for us all.

Among them, of course, is immigration. Latino support will swing to the political party that has the courage and fortitude to put forward a specific immigration solution that is effective and efficient in securing our borders, that supports the economic interests of the nation

consistent with the character of a nation of immigrants.

Beyond immigration, both parties need to forge closer relationships with Latino voters. They need to connect with and make use of surrogates, as the Democrats have done with L.A. Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa. They need to make more contact, an effort both parties launched last weekend, when they spoke to a conference of Latino elected and appointed officials in Washington. More important, they need to embrace policies from the Latino point of view.

What is that point of view? For starters, we may now wear suits on Wall Street or Main Street, but we know the experience - personally or from our parents and grandparents - of working in the fields, on the docks and in the kitchen. We want a job, not a handout. We value opportunity over more government. We are risk takers, willing to bet on ourselves and start a business. We want a society that recognizes and rewards us based on our hard work and ingenuity, not our skin color.

We are unabashedly proud of America, and we are prepared to enlist, fight and die for this country, sometimes even without the right to vote for its leaders. We believe an education represents freedom in America, and we are willing to work multiple jobs so our children can go to college.

Finally, although we know that America strives to be a fair country, the harsh reality is we are not one nation with liberty and justice for all. And yet equal opportunity -- to a job, to capital and to credit - is a cornerstone of American success. The promise of equal opportunity is what drew our parents and grandparents and what still draws immigrants to the U.S., and it is what firmly knits them into the country once they are citizens.

As we move to the next phase of the presidential campaign, some people may try to discourage discussion about race relations in favor of issues they say are of greater importance: the war against Al Qaeda, the cost of energy, the sub-prime mortgage crisis. However, we need leaders who appreciate - and who choose to confront - the crucial elements of racial inequality within these so-called bigger issues. Those are the leaders who are likely to be successful in finding effective solutions to our most important challenges.

I have said often that Latinos share a common prayer: "Just give me a chance to succeed." I believe that the candidate who will win Latino votes is the one who understands that desire and who will engage the issue of racial equality for Americans of all colors. It's politically wise. More important, it is the right thing to do for our nation.



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
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

# Yanez says he's off U.S. Olympic boxing team

Luis Yanez, the light flyweight on the U.S. Olympic boxing team, said the sport's governing body plans to remove him from the squad for a rules violation, according to a report on the Dallas Morning News' website.

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

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# Can't sleep a



It's estimated that about onehalf of all seniors suffer from sleep problems. As we age, we tend to have more "fragile" sleep, meaning that we're more easily awakened, and deep sleep stages get shorter. Some of these sleep changes are hormonal, but various illnesses, pain, psychiatric conditions, and medications can also interfere with rest.

Whatever the reason, being deprived of sleep can leave you tired, irritable, and unable to concentrate, and can cause headaches and memory troubles - and accidents. On the other hand, we generally need less sleep as we get older, so if you feel rested and refreshed in the morning, don't feel drowsy during the day, and don't need long naps, you don't have anything to worry about. It's easier to get a good night's

sleep if you try the following: \* Don't have drinks with alcohol or caffeine before bedtime. Alcohol may put you to sleep at first, but you'll get less deep sleep

and may wake up more often later. \* Avoid having a big meal less than three hours before

bedtime. \* Don't smoke, since nicotine can keep you awake (it's a stimulant).

\* Try not to worry about things when it's time to sleep they can wait until tomorrow. If you simply can't put them out of your mind, try writing out your concerns on a list to help put them aside until daylight.

\* Avoid watching TV or reading in bed - keep the bed for sleeping.

\* Relax before going to bed by doing deep breathing exercises, drinking warm milk, or taking a warm bath.

\* If you can't get to sleep, try not to watch the clock. Instead, get out of bed and watch TV or read until you feel tired.

If your sleep troubles last over a month or disrupt day-to-day life, don't suffer in silence - ask your doctor for help.

# La atención médica está en riesgo La administración de George

W. Bush retrasará por 10 días laborables, hasta el 15 de julio, el recorte de 10.6% en los pagos de Medicare que reciben los médicos, en tanto el Congreso determina el futuro de una medida que eliminaría ese recorte.

El Congreso se marchó por una semana de receso debido al feriado del Día de la Independencia (4 de julio) sin aprobar el proyecto de ley que pretende eliminar la reducción precisamente de 10.6% en los pagos que reciben los aproximadamente 600 mil médicos que proveen servicios a beneficiarios de Medicare.

Se supone que el recorte entrara en vigor ayer, pero el Centro de Servicios de Medicare y Medicaid (CMS) anunció que congelaría las reducciones por 10 días laborables. Medicare es el seguro médico para ancianos y discapacitados.

En respuesta, dos senadores demócratas, Charles Schumer, de Nueva York, y John D.Rockefeller, de West Virginia, le enviaron una carta al secretario de Salud y Servicios Humanos (HHS), Mike Leavitt, argumentando que el retraso de 10 días es nulo porque de todos modos las peticiones de pagos que someten los médicos vía electrónica tardan 13 días en procesarse.

Asimismo, los demócratas argumentan que la decisión del gobierno de Bush tiene motivaciones políticas: impedir que los republicanos retornaran a sus distritos en el receso y fueran acusados de permitir que el recorte de 10.6% entrara en vigor, desencadenando una serie de consecuencias, entre otras las amenazas de los doc-tores de atender a menos pacientes.

El recorte automático surge de la ley de presupuesto balanceado de 1997, que exige las reducciones si los gastos por concepto de Medicare sobrepasan el tope impuesto por dicha ley. Cada año el Congreso aprueba medidas que impiden los recortes.

Y este año se encaminaban a hacerlo, pero la medida se

estancó en el Senado por la oposición de algunos republicanos al lenguaje del proyecto, que no sólo elimina la reducción, sino que ofrece un aumento a las cuotas que reciben los doctores.

La oposición republicana se debe a que para pagar por el incremento a las cuotas que reciben los doctores, el proyecto reduce a su vez los pagos a los médicos privados que aceptan los planes de Medicare Advantage.


La semana pasada esa medida no se aprobjó por apenas un voto. Se requerían 60 votos y acumuló 59.

Sin embargo, aunque la medida se apruebe al retorno del Congreso la semana del 7 de julio, la Casa Blanca ha amenazado con vetarla. Para anular un veto se requieren 67 votos.

La Cámara de Representantes aprobó de manera bipartidista una versión con los recortes a los proveedores privados que aceptan Medicare Advantage y lo hizo con una mayoría a prueba

de vetos, 335 sobre 59. La American Medical Association (AMA) denunció a los re-

publicanos que votaron en contra del proyecto adivirtiendo que el programa de Medicare estaba al borde del colapso.

"Estos senadores se fueron para sus pasadías del 4 de julio sabiendo que los estadounidenses más vulnerables están en riesgo por la incapacidad del Senado de frenar los recortes drásticos a los pagos por servicios de Medicare requeridos por nuestros pacientes de Medicare y TRICARE",

Unidos están indignados porque un grupo de senadores republicanos siguió las direcciones de la Administración Bush y prefirió proteger a las compañías aseguradoras a expensas de los ancianos, los discapacitados y las familias militares de Estados Unidos", agregó Nielsen.

A su retorno la semana entrante, el Senado intentará aprobar el proyecto que eliminaría el recorte de 10.6%.

# Travel Health Tips

First of all, to make sure you stay healthy when you take a trip, don't leave your medications at home!

Keep these tips in mind for managing your medications on the road:

\* Before your trip, review

your dosage schedules with your doctor or pharmacist, especially if you'll be crossing time zones - you

may have to take your medications at different times.

\* If you are traveling to another country, visit www.cdc. gov/travel/outbreaks.htm to see if you need special protection against disease in the country you are visiting.

\* If you are going somewhere warm, chances are you'll be swimming. Bring along a bottle of flumethasone-clioquinol ear drops (available by prescription) in case you develop swimmer's ear. This infection is caused when water

becomes trapped in the ear and

can be extremely painful if left

promotes bacteria growth, and it

untreated. Symptoms include itch-

ing or inner ear pain and red, flaky

skin on the outer parts of the ear.

\* Some drugs can make you more sensitive to the sun and heat - check labels for warnings, or ask your doctor or pharmacist. You may need to cover up or use stronger sunscreen.

\* Store medicines away from direct sunlight or high heat. A

beach bag or your car's trunk or glove compartment aren't good places to keep medicines.

\* Don't put your medicines in checked luggage. Keep them with you, and bring enough to last the whole trip; when you go on an outing, carry along a day's supply.

\* Keep with you a list of all the medications you take and their dosages, your doctors' phone numbers, and health insurance information.

\* Put together a travel first aid kit containing over-the-counter and prescription medications you may need if you become ill or are injured. Some items you may want to include are:

\* antihistamines in case you have a mild allergic reaction

\* a painkiller such as acetaminophen or ibuprofen

\* medications for motion sickness and diarrhea

\* anti-infective ear drops for swimmer's ear - clioquinol/ flumethasone (Locacorten® Vioform®), gentamicin (Garamycin®), neomycin/polymyxin B/ gramicidin (Neosporin®)

\* an antibacterial cream that contains fusidic acid for cuts, insect bites and burns

\* a course of antibiotics

Talk to your doctor or pharmacist about which specific medications may best suit your needs, depending on your medical history and travel destination.

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
# Desarrollan nueva cámara para los mamogramas

¿Recuerda haber mirado a través de un View-Master? Los científicos están utilizando el mismo concepto del juguete infantil para tratar de ver mamogramas en tercera dimensión.

El objetivo es tener una mejor forma de buscar indicios de cáncer en mujeres con senos demasiado densos para que los

más fácil de examinar. Pero si un médico advierte a una paciente que tiene seno denso, existen pocas recomendaciones útiles sobre cómo obtener actualmente una mejor revisión sobre cáncer.

"Es un asunto muy importante actualmente en este campo, cada vez más, sobre cómo atender las necesidades de revisión de



mamogramas actuales puedan proporcionar una imagen clara.

El que los radiólogos empleen lentes de tercera dimensión no es la única ayuda potencial. La Clínica Mayo en Rochester, Minnesota, está probando una nueva cámara para examen de seno que podría desafiar las imágenes de los mucho más costosos exámenes de resonancia magnética que actualmente se aplican a las mujeres con mayores riesgos de desarrollar la enfermedad, a una fracción de su precio.

La tecnología aún está en fase experimental, pero se le está dando un cuidadoso seguimiento debido a que hay mucha necesidad de ella: se calcula que la mitad de las mujeres menores de 50 años y la tercera parte de aquellas con más de 50 tienen senos densos.

Además de que es más difícil detectar tumores incipientes, las mujeres con senos densos tienen mayor riesgo de desarrollar cáncer de pecho.


Sólo un mamograma puede señalar si un seno esta compuesto de tejido graso denso o de uno

mujeres con densidad significativa en los senos", señala Robert Smith, especialista en monitoreo de la Sociedad Oncológica Estadounidense. "Nosotros y las mujeres y todo mundo nos quedamos preguntándonos qué sería mejor bajo qué circunstancias", comentó.

Pero "lo podemos hacer mejor de como lo estamos haciendo", pronostica la doctora Mary S. Newell, directora adjunta de monitoreo de seno de la Universidad Emory en Atlanta, quien está probando la técnica de tercera dimensión.

Los mamogramas son exámenes de rayos X que buscan manchas densas en tejido de seno normal, sombras que podrían detectar tumores. Realizarse mamogramas con regularidad a partir de los 40 años de edad ayuda a reducir las muertes por cáncer de seno al encontrar tumores cuando son más pequeños y más tratables.

Sin embargo, están lejos de ser perfectos, y los senos densos podrían ser el mayor obstáculo para los rayos X.



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
