Woodward Declara Que No Hay Discriminación

En una acción ayer Jueves, los demandantes en contra la Ciudad anunciaron que las oficinas de Servicios Legales la ciudad de Ft. Worth han aceptado la demanda en contra la ciudad y pagaran todos los gastos necesarios.

El anuncio fue hecho despues de que hubo varias juntas para determinar donde se iban conseguir aproximadamente 8,000 para apelar el caso. Las juntas fueron llevadas acabo por diversos grupos de la comunidad.

Los abogados de los demandantes estaban preocupados por razon de que no habian lo suficientes fondos para apelar la causa.

Durante una de las juntas se discutió que su habia gastado mas de 18,000 en peliar la causa. Tambien se revelo que la ciudad habia gastado mas de \$35,000 para difundirse.

Otra junta que se llevo acabo el miercoles por la tarde se hicieron planes para formar comites de apoyo para recavar fondos presentes en dicha junta estuvieron representante de Raza Unida Party, LULAC, G.I. Form, Auxilio, PALMA, Brawn Berets, LACLA y El comite de Soporte de la Union de Campesinos de Texas. Todos los grupos presentes de comitiran a trabajar para recaudar fondos.

Las noticias de que la agencia de Servicios Legales se revelo el Jueves por la tarde en una conferencia de prensa.

Hace mas de tres años, se procesó una demanda legal contra esta ciudad, en nombre de la comunidad negro y los mexicanoamericanos de Lubbock. Se pedia en esa demanda, que el Juez federal Habert O. Woodward, ordenara que en las elecciones del concilio de esta ciudad se elijieran miembros representando todas las areas, incluyendo un representante residente del barrio mexicanoamericano y uno de la comunidad de los residentes negros. El presente sistema, segun esa demanda allíye el voto de estas dos minorias y depriva a estas mismas de una representación equitativa.

Sin embargo, en vista de la exuberante evidencia presentada en contra de la ciudad, el Juez Woodward, rindió su veredicto en favor del acusado! La siguiente, es una recopilación de 36 paginas de ese veredicto, segun la opinion de Woodward:

---A los grupos minoritarios, no se les miega el acceso, ni carecen del mismo en el proceso politico en las elecciones del concilio de la ciudad.

---No existe ninguna diferencia, conforme el alumbrado publico entre las areas recreativas de una comunidad y otras en el segmento opuesto de Lubbock.

---El Panteón Municipal, opera en una base no discriminatoria y cualquiera espacio vacante, puede ser utilizado para sepultar a cualquier occiso, sin importar su raza u origen. Ademas, el cuidado y la limpieza, es igual en todas las areas del mismo, inclusive donde se encuentran sepultados los difuntos de minorias.

---Las mejoras que han sido hechas en el aumento de personal y presupuesto, indican un continuo de parte de la Cd., en mejorar los servicios de salubridad, particularmente en las necesidades de las minorias.

---La Cd. há respondido siempre a las necesidades de las minorias, ya que les provee con areas recreativas y el mantenimiento de estas. De los aproximados 2,500 acres de terreno que la Cd. utiliza como parques publicos, el 7— por ciento de estos, estan en arenas donde predominan minorias.

Woodward agregó fque de 35 proyectos de obras publicas que estan por implementarse en renovaciones de parques existentes y construcción de otros nuevos, 15 de estos están o estarán en areas de minorias. Todos los centros de adultos mayores, estan en areas donde predominan las minorias.

---El Depto. de Bomberos, acuden a las llamadas de incendios en cualquier area de la Cd. sin sistinción de Raza.

---Segun la cantide llamadas de asistencia presentadas en corte por el Depto. de Policia, la ciudad no esta ignorando a las comunidades minoritarias cuando de proteccion policiaca se trata.

---Es difícil definir quien es culpable del estado decadente de las viviendas en vecindades de las minorias, pero seguramente, no se puede culpar a la ciudad, de Lubbock.

---La Cd. no es la responsable por el estado Ruín y deteriorado de estas casas, si los residentes mantienen "actividades indeseables" en su hogares.

---El uso de fondos monetarios del Desarrollo de la Comunidad, ha beneficiado extremadamente a las minorias y fque estos fondos, han sido distribuidos en una forma más que equitativa.

---No existe ninguna desacuerdo ni inigualada cuando se trata de componer o pavimentar calles en las comunidades de mayoria o minoria.

---Las tuberias de agua potable, son distribuidas igualmente atravez de la Cd. y no se discrimina en su distribución.

---Los servicios sanitarios estan en alcance de todos los sectores de la Cd. y todos los residentes de esta Cd. han sido asistidos igualmente.

Woodward concluyó, que despues de una minuciosa examinación de toda la evidencia que le fué presentada encontro que la Cd. de Lubbock, siempre ha respondido a las necesidades generales y especificadas de las minorias. En su opinion, los oficiales de las minorias. En su opinion, los oficiales publicas de esta Cd., Han utilizado todos los recursos dispuestos, para aliviar los problemas de los residentes urbanos y especialmente a las minorias.

La segunda pregunta que Woodward contestó, fue la de una distribución de empleados minoritarios en el municipio y el nombramiento de estos como representantes o miembros de las diversas mesas directivas en la Cd.

Contestó Woodward que la Cd., en un deliberado esfuerzo y atravez de su programa "acción afirmativa ha empleado muchas personas de entre las minorias, para incrementar el presonál de trabajadores municipales.

Woodward dijo que en su opinion, si no hay mas trabajadores municipales minoritarios, es debido a la competencia industrial y a la escasez de profesionales y obreros adiestrados en la alta escala de salarios en la ciudad.

Esto dice Woodward, es la razon de la falta de empleados de minorias y no por ninguna discriminación.

Tomando todos estos factores en cuenta, Woodward dijo que no encontraba ninguna barrera que prohibiera la participación de las minorias en el proceso electoral ni en ninguna otro asunto civico. Termino diciendo que por los ultimos diez años, o más, la ciudad há sido enteramente responsiva en todos sus canales y ha suplido los intereses y necesidades particulares, de todas las minorias.

Santos Alega Discriminación

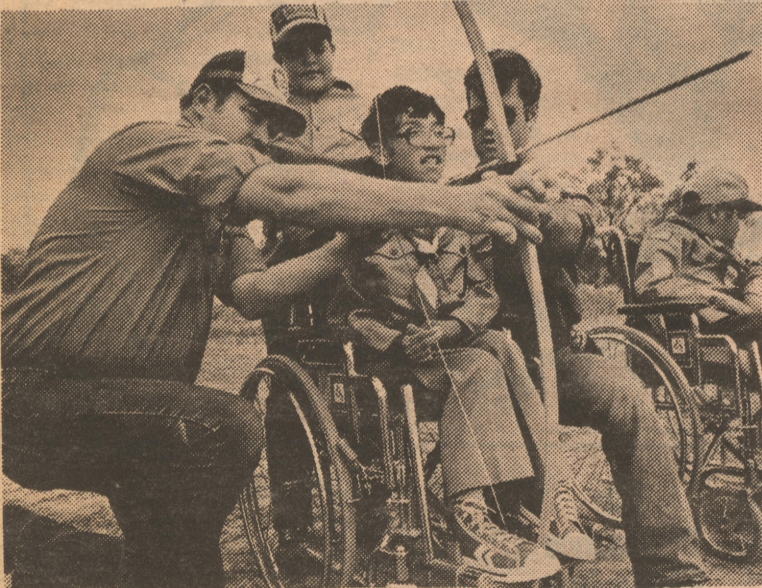

The following is the news release given by Dr. Ray Santos at a news conference held Thursday afternoon concerning the naming of a minority to the Hospital District Board of Lubbock County.

The purpose of this press conference is to publically criticize the recent actions of the County Judge and the Commissioner's Court, for their failure to provide adequate, justifiable representation in the Hospital District Board. The ethnic minorities in Lubbock County account for approximately 35 percent of the population. Since the inception of this public institution, which is funded and paid for by the tax payers of Lubbock County, there has been a concerted effort to keep away Mexican American and black representation on this Board. The County Judge and the County Commissioners are elected by all the people. The County Commissioners and the County Judge have failed to allow 35 percent of the population of this County to present their views.

I have repeatedly gone to the County Judge. The Commissioner's Court has been aware of our needs and our pleas, that this powerful emerging group of people be brought into the mainstream of life and have an input into the running of an instituion

Think of it. You're 10 years old and confined to a wheelchair for the rest of your life.

Like others your age you have the desire and need for love, companionship, learning and fun. What can you or your parents do? Where will your hadicap be not so much of a handicap?

TSgt Harvey Schirmer has an answer: the Boy Scouts.

Sargeant Schirmer is a T-37 jet aircraft inspection supervisor at Reese Air Force Base, Texas, and leader of Boy Scout Troop 514 which has been in existence since November. Working directly with the Muscular Dystrophy Association in Lubbock, Texas, and with generous support from Elk Lodge 1348, Troop 514 provides a recreational and educational program for physically or mentally handicapped children. It is the first of its kind in Lubbock.

The troop is open to physically handicapped youths from 10 to 21 years old and to mentally retarded youths from seven to 21 years old.

Earning merit badges in camping skills is not unusual for a Boy Scout, but doing it while confined to a wheelchair is another

Comentario

Nearly three years ago three undocumented Mexican farmworkers were sadistically tortured near Douglas, Arizona. The workers were hiking to the agricultural fields of Elfrida, Arizona to seek employment when anglo ranchers abducted them at gunpoint and then bestially proceeded to tie, beat, burn, hang and shotgun the campesinos.

Due to protests by the Mexican Government, Catholic bishops and hispanic leaders, ranchers Patrick and Thomas Hanigan were indicted to stand trial in a Cochise County, Arizona state court. An all white jury acquitted the Hanigan brothers despite overwhelming evidence that they had brutalized the farmworkers. A national campaign for a new trial in federal court was launched with the formation of the National Coalition on the Hanigan Case.

The U.S. Department of Justice refused to prosecute the Hanigans, claiming the wealthy ranchers had not broken federal criminal laws. However, the Coalition strenuously disagreed, and from November, 1977 to November, 1978, its lawyers prepared a scholarly legal document instructing the Department on the federal statutes violated by the ranchers. The document exposed the Department's dishonesty and bad faith in claiming that now laws were broken.

Unfortunately, just because it can now be shown that the Hanigans violated federal laws does not mean that the Justice Department has to prosecute them. The Department

can refuse to take action by hiding behind what is called "prosecutorial discretion." Unless our readers across the country send letters or telegrams to Attorney General Griffin Bell urging him to order a new trial, the government can be expected to refuse to bring justice to this case by invoking its discretion.

This is why your letters and telegrams are crucial; without them there is likely to be no justice. The Justice Department has shown a callous lack of interest in protecting the human rights of undocumented farmworkers, not only in this case but in many others.

A great deal is riding on the Department's final decision as to whether to institute a new prosecution. Should the Coalition and national civil rights leaders prevail, important legal precedent will be set, because the government will have recognized that undocumented aliens have at least some civil rights. 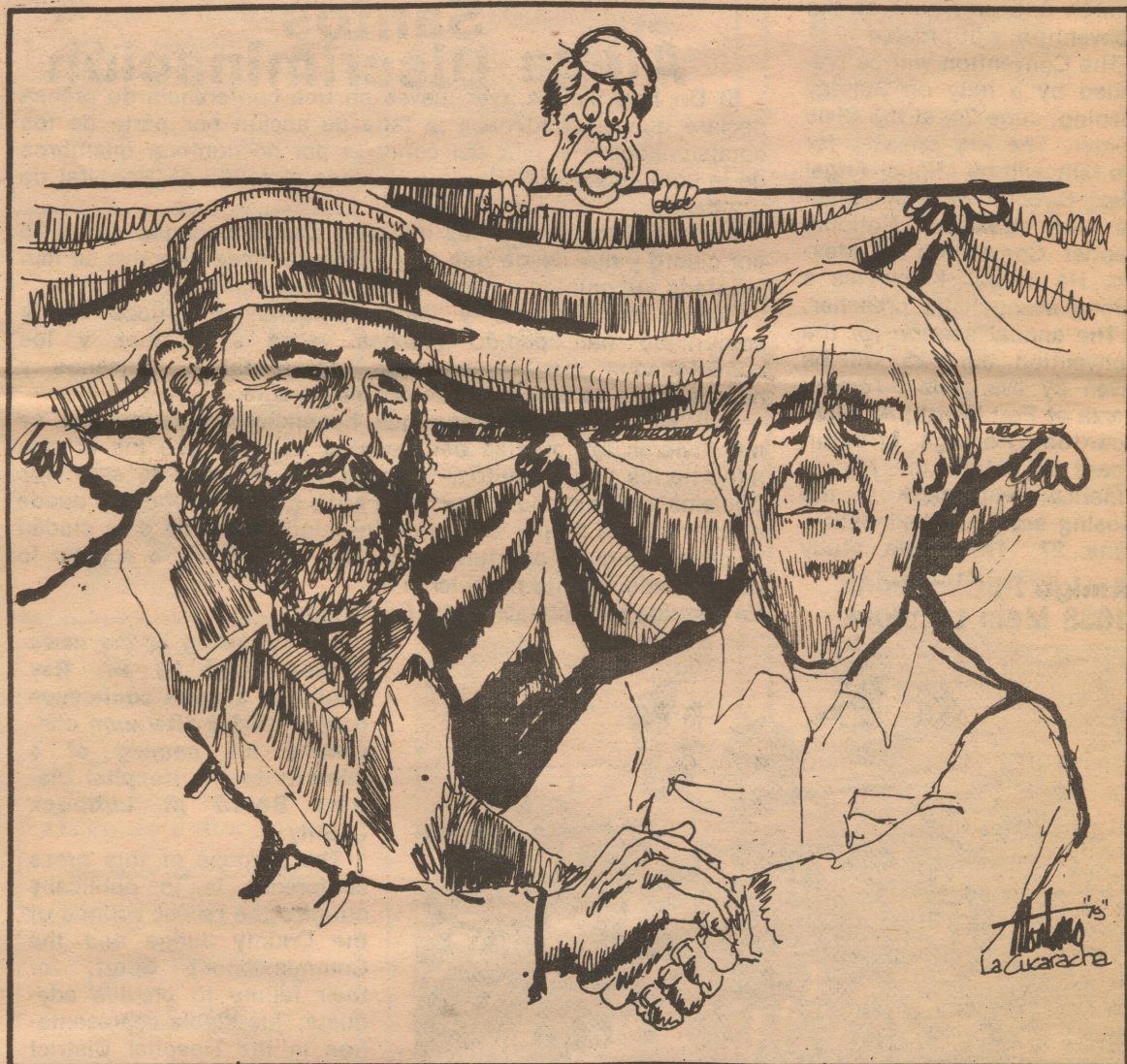

Castro's Visit to Mexico

Fidel Castro's recent trip to Mexico brought an important victory for the Cuban leader at the expense of Jimmy Carter and the United States in the eyes of the world.

Stepping on Mexican soil for the first time in 23 years, since Castro and 80 other guerrillas launched the successful liberation of their homeland from Tuxpan, Veracruz, in 1956, the Cuban leader brought world attention to the contradictions of Carter's human rights policy. Castro termed the economic blockade of Cuba by the U.S. a "grotesque" and "miserable" measure that has been in effect for 15 years.

"I think one of the most grotesque and miserable things is to deny a country the right to obtain medicines. I ask myself how can the blockade of Cuba be reconciled with these preachings about human rights," the revolutionary leader said.

The bearded leader and symbol of struggle for Chicanos and oppressed people throughout the world blasted the U.S. for its treatment of workers from Mexico, and praised Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo for refusing to favor the U.S. in his oil policy.

Castro's trip clearly illustrates Cuba's growing world acceptance despite U.S. wishes to the contrary. It served notice that the U.S. is going to have to reconsider its policies towards Cuba. If a reported exchange of four CIA agents being held in Cuba for the four Puerto Rican Nationalists being held since the early '50's for their attack on Congress develops, Castro will have made his biggest inroad into liberation movements in this country to date.

For the Chicano, Cuba's growth and global acceptance offers inspiration that will become more important as our liberacion struggle intensifies in the future.

This Memorial Day weekend the troop enjoyed its first camp-out, three days at Scout Camp Post in the hilly canyons just off the West Texas Caprock.

Another Air Force enlisted man who plays a major part in the troop's activities is SrA Roger Carter, who also works in the T-37 Inspection Branch at Reese AFB.

During the outing, the two men supervised retarded children and children severely crippled by muscular dystrophy in such activities as fishing, boating, archery, camp cooking, and nature studies.

"Some of these kids have never been camping in the country," Airman Carter said. "They're just amazed by some of the things they see out there."

Troop 514's success has made impressions in many places. Officials at Camp Post indicated that many of the facilities there

may be revamped to accommodate the handicapped.

"We were fortunate in having some necessary camping equipment donated for our use this time," Sgt. Schirmer continued, "but we can't always depend on that. We're just getting started and the troop has practically nothing except a place to meet."

Troop 514 went through a six month probationary period and recently renewed its charter as a full-fledged Scout Troop.

Not only does the troop need the things that any Boy Scout troop needs, but its "special" members have need for special equipment. Transportation for children in wheelchairs often presents a problem. A vehicle that can properly carry them on outings is lacking.

"We can't expect the financial burden to fall on the parents in this case," Sgt. Schirmer said. "Family finances are often stretched to the breaking point just to keep up with medical bills. One couple has three sons with muscular dystrophy. Two of them are completely confined to wheelchairs, and the other may be withing the next few years. Their medical bills are out of sight. I can't expect them to be able to afford uniforms or anything else."

Sergeant Schirmer estimated that it would take \$2,000 to \$3,000 to get the troop off to a good start.

Money is not the biggest factor in dealing with handicapped children. It also takes a lot of time, work, patience, and involvement.

"Once you start, you can't stop," Sgt. Schirmer said. "These kids are often scared of people because people won't let them forget how different they are. Once you gain their love and respect as a leader, they look forward to meeting with you at every weekly meeting. If you're not there, it's a real letdown for them."

The emotional commitment works both ways. "It really hurts if you ever lose one of these kids," the sergeant said. "It's like losing a member of the family. Just getting to know and love them is the best reward."

that is so vital to their lives every day.

I know of now group of people who stand more to gain by the survival of this institution than the Mexican Americans and the blacks. This institution was created for the purpose of providing a hospital system to furnish medical care for the indigent of this district, which in turn needs these people as patient. The School will provide them with adequate service and at the same time, have nough patients to where we can properly train our medical students intoo becoming physiapians. Yet, in spite of this, our elected officials have failed to hear the views of these people on this Board. You just can't dictate policies and shove it down the throat of 35 percent of the citizens of this County, without their have an input as to what they want to swallow and what they don't. I have not been able to convince the County Judge and the County Commissioners that it is of extreme importance to involve these people and have them share the problems that plague this public institution at the present time. They need a voice that can go back to the peole and explain the problems of the Hospital and get their help in remedying this situation. There is total lack of communication between what goes on in the hierarchy of this Court and the ethnic minorities of this County.

The most critical problem facing our City, County and State today, is how to assure that this emergent, powerful group of people, whose roots go so deep in the soil of this State, and whose loyalty to Texas and to America has never been questioned, can be appointed to positions of responsibility for which they qualify. The Mexican Americans have been politically active, they have turned out at the polls in decisive forces time after time, in local and State elections; nevertheless, when appointments to positions of responsibility and merit have been made, the Mexican Americans have been systemically short-changed.

I have pleaded with the County Judge, the Commissioners for a spot in this Board for the Mexican Americans and blacks, for the past five vacancies. Our needs have been ignored. I would like to ask of them, why are they are denying these people who are so vital to our community, who are as much Americans as anybody, the right to participate in the daily process that

goes on every day in this County. These policies affect them so much, yet they have so little to say about it.

The excuse that there are no qualified Mexican American is no longer valid. It is a myth, it holds as much water as my hand with my fingers open. Is it because of racial prejudice? Is it because they are not, in your opinion, as good as your are? I presonally blame it on your antiquated thinking. A city and county of this size cannot afford to have people in positons of pwere, with such thinking. It is not in the best public interest. You may not know it, but times have changed. It may not be better for a few, but certainly for the betterment of a lot. The time has come for a change in the attitude of those people responsible for making these appointments, for they are there only by the grace of the voters. The time has come too, for the Mexican Americans to wake up and to register and vote and elect those people that will support them by deed as well as by word, and kick out of office those that don't I ask the Court to look at these people as equals, as human beings with the same problems, the same feelings that you all share. If our attitude had been this a few years ago, there would have been no need for the Supreme Court to act and enforce and break the bonds of discrimination. There would have been no need for President Eisenhower to send troops to Little Rock. There would have been no need for John F. Kennedy to push for Civil Rights. There would have been no need for President Johnson to enforce the mandates of the Courts, to enforce the laws that guaranteed once and for all, those same human and civil rights. The laws that made

all the difference between distant hopes and present realities.

The County Judge and the County Commissioners and all of us, must recognize that in the world we live in today, things are different. You have not just the hope of opportunity, but the reality of it. You have not just the theory of equal rights but the reality of it and the certain knowledge that those rights will be defended. You have not just the idea that you are as worthy as the next person, but you are as worthy as the next person. The Mexican American knows that we are not cursed by a special fate, that our fate is not determined, that we aren't born to lose. We are blessed, not cursed. We are blessed by a country and a community that can care and does care. The Mexican American is not known for the buildings that he has burned down or for bashing head before the TV cameras. Our progress has been made possible without vilence, without bloodshed. For this I am proud of the Mexian Americans. I am not proud that our needs have not been heard and I ask of all Mexican Americans to fight back the only way the battles have been won with any triumph and decency, through voter registraton and the power of the vote.

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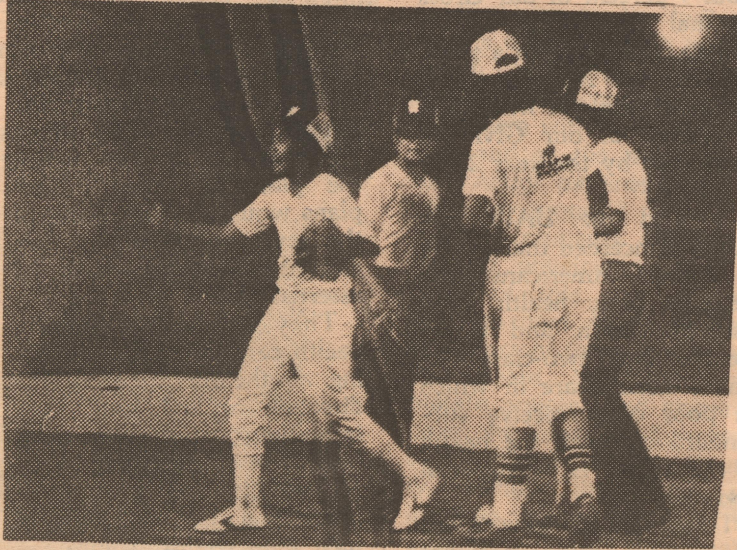
