Diabetes entre los Hispánicos y Hipertensión entre los negros son los problemas mayores de salud entre las dos razas en la comunidad de Lubbock dice Jose Alvarado, coordinadora de servicios a la comunidad de el Departamento de Salud.



"Probablemente, estoy es cierto por toda la nación," agregó Alvarado.

"Diabetes es prevalente entre los hispanos y haci ha sido por muchos años. Unos estudios dicen que es por la dieta y unos dicen que es generico," dijo ella.

Por si acaso es la dieta que cause el diabetes, la problema

as difícil es en corrigiendo sa dieta.

"La gente esta impuesta a comer comidas como frijoles, papas, arroz y tortilla. Esta difícil para cambiarle la mente a nuestra gente especialmente cuando les encanta lo que han comido toda la vida. Es difícil para que ellos entiendan que es comida les puede hacer daño se lo consumen en alta nivel."

Alvarado dijo que ella ha trumfado en ayudar a algunos de sus pacientes con platicar con ellos individualmente y explicarles que realmente no es necesario dejar de comer esas comidas buena pero se tienen que comer en moderación.

"Les explicamos que si comen papas, ho deben de comer arroz en la misma comida o si comen torillas, no deben de

comer papas al mismo tiempo. No le prohibimos que coman sus comidas favoritas," dijo Alvarado.

La enfermeda contribuye a otras enfermedades como cecion de los riñones, problemas del corazon y perdida de la vista. "Cuando vamos a el centro del dialysis vemos que la mayoría de pacientes son de raza minoria - hispanos por el dia-

betis y los negros por la alta presion de sangre," dijo Alvarado.

La alta presion de sangre, segun Alvarado, es uno de las enfermedades que mata mas a la raza negra.

"Entre los negros que tienen poco dinero, la alta presion es principalmente causado por fumar," dijo Alvarado.

WEEKLY MILLIONAIRES—"When the first Texas Lottery tickets go on sale May 29, seven weeks ahead of schedule, lucky Texans could win a prize no other state lottery has offered in its first game—a cool million in cash!" State Comptroller John Sharp announced this week.

(Austin)--"En cuando salgan a la venta los primeros boletos de la Lotería de Texas el 29 de mayo-siete semanas más temprano que la fecha límite-los Texanos tendrán un millonario nuevo cada semana por las siguientes 12 semanas," dijo el Contralor Estatal, John Sharp.

"Los 12 ganadores recibirán sus millines en efectivo, no en pagos anuales como se acostumbra en otros estados-algo que ninguna otra lotería ha ofrecido en el primer juego," dijo Sharp.

"Premios instantes para 'Millones Lone Star' tienen un valor de \$2 hasta \$10,000, pero miles de boletos les ofrecerán a los jugadores la oportunidad de participar en el sorteo de un millón de dólares," Sarp dijo.

"Texas obviamente tiene el más eficiente comienzo de una lotería en la historia reciente," dijo Sharp. "Hemos podido limitar los costos, implementando por ejemplo un límite al empleo de la lotería de solo 186-comparado con los mil empleados de California y los 775 de Florida-tambien estamos empezando siete semanas antes de la fecha límite establecida por la Asamblea Legislativa.

"Todos estos elementos nos ayudarán crear un millonario instante cada semana desde junio hasta el Día del Obrero en Septiembre," dijo Sharp.

"Se espera que dentro de la primera semana de ventas de boletos, la Lotería de Texas le generará al estado-con un 10 por ciento de interés-los \$12 millones que fueron asignados por la Asamblea Legislativa para comenzar la lotería."

Se espera que más de boletos ganadores, proveando hasta \$7.1 millones, se venderán el primer día de los juegos. Y más de 28,000 de los boletos del primer día les ofrecerán a

los jugadores la oportunidad de participar en el sorteo del gran premio de \$1 millón.

Empaquetado en libros de 500 cada uno, 300 millones de boletos 'Millones Lone Star', que son blanco, rojo, azul y plateados, se han depositado en un almacén en Austin bajo guardia armada. Los boletos de un dólar serán distribuidos a los 14, 700 comerciantes en la cadena de la Lotería unos cuantos días antes del estreno estatal el 29 de mayo.

"Los Texanos verán que facil es jugar el primer juego," dijo la Directora de la Lotería, Nora Linares. "Todo lo que tienen que hacer es rasgarle en las sies cajitas que se encuentran en el frente de los boletos. Cada rasquecito revelará una suma de premio.

"Y cualquier boleto que contenga tres sumas iguales será boleto ganador," Linares dijo. "Con la variedad de premios generosos-y la oportunidad de ganar un millón de dólares en efectivo-esperamos que muchos de los Texanos gozarán del juego 'Millones Lone Star'.

Las probabilidades de ganar un premio instante son uno en 7.9.

Comenzando a las 6 de la mañana, viernes, 29 de Mayo, los boletos de la Lotería de Texas salrán a la venta. Tambien estará listo el sistema de computadoras para la validación de boletos ganadores.

Cualquier comerciante participando en la Lotería puede pagar un premio hasta \$100. Ganadores de premios desde \$10,000 necesitarán traer o mandar por correo-sus boletos a uno de los 24 centros de reclamación de la Lotería establecidos por todo el estado.

Comentarios de Bidal

Every now and then we get letters that were originally written to the Lubbock Avalanche Journal and the writer asks us to consider printing letter in our paper because they know it is highly unlikely that it will appear in the A-J because of their disagreement with the A-J editorial board.

We received two such letters this week. One is on page two written by Chico James about the recent elections.

The second letter is from our friend Tomas Garza. I thought it would be appropriate to print this letter in my column this week because of its importance to the minority community.

Dear A-J Editor: After reading your editorial Sunday regarding the jury verdict on Rodney King, I must make this observation. You made a good case for accepting the jury verdict as just and fair. While you did not come right out and say that the facts justified the verdict, probably for fear of being branded a racist, you came close. However, Robert Musselman in his letter to the Editor on Sunday did come out and say that Rodney King deserved what he got because he disobeyed the law.

What is wrong with this picture? Did the fact that Rodney King speed, evade arrest, maybe resist arrest, and generally disobey the police officer justify the beating? Had he been found guilty of any or all those offenses, would he have been beaten just the same as punishment? Or, did the police officers become angry because of his disobedience and they decided under their unwritten code to show this stupid Black and all other similarly situated persons not to mess with the cops? What facts would justify the beating we observed? That is, a beating which could be given to any person, even a white person, by any police officer? I cannot think of any.

As you well know, this verdict was similar to other verdicts in Texas and other states in the South involving white police officers. In those cases, as in 'Mississippi Burning', the Federal Government had to step in and investigate and prosecute the wrong doers under the Civil Rights Act.

It is really sad to watch you and others like Robert Musselman, try to justify the beating of Rodney King by emphasizing the fact that he was evading the police, speeding, and resisting arrest. When you try to justify it or even give it some reason for the beating, you insult my intelligence. If you can justify the Rodney King beating, then I guess the same type of mentality justified slavery, separate schools for Blacks, the refusal to allow black people to vote, and the lynching of Mexicans (remember Gregorio Cortez).

I am just glad the President suggested the use of the Civil Rights Act, a law he and most other Republicans have resisted and voted against, to possibly prosecute the police officers. Hopefully, he is truly concerned and not just being a politician.

Finally, if you can honestly say that the verdict would have been the same had it been black police officers and a white victim, in Sini Valley, then I stand corrected. If not, perhaps, perhaps not, you may understand the problems. Justifiably yours, Tomas Garza

TDPS Warns About Safety Problems

AUSTIN--Despite a record number of murders, crime in Texas increased only 2 per cent in 1991 compared with 1990, according to Uniform Crime Reporting information compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"We're pleased the overall number of reported crimes in Texas grew only slightly last year, but we're very concerned with the jump in violent crime, which was 12.7 per cent," DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson said. "All law enforcement agencies in Texas face a tough challenge."

The crime rate--the number of reported offenses per 100,000 population--actually decreased slightly in 1991, dropping from 7,825.9 to 7,818 or by

0.1 per cent. The DPS statistics show 2,651 murders were reported in Texas last year, compared with 2,388 in 1990. That amounts to an increase of 11 per cent.

The largest violent crime category increase was in aggravated assault, which grew by 13.8 per cent last year. Rape cases increased 5.9 per cent, and robberies by 12.1 per cent.

"The news was a little better in the property crime category," Wilson said. "Overall, property crime increased by only 0.9 per cent, though motor vehicle theft was up 6.1 per cent. Burglary decreased by 0.6 per cent and theft grew slightly by 0.4 per cent."

Bingaman Legislation to Support Hispanic Schools

WASHINGTON--The White House Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans is supporting a measure by Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) to provide \$45 million in grants to colleges with large Hispanic populations. The Hispanic Higher Education Coalition is also endorsing the measure.

The legislation, which the Senate has passed as part of the Higher Education Act, will designate 115 colleges nationwide as "Hispanic-Serving Institutions" eligible for special grants. To be eligible, an institution must have Hispanics composing at least 25 percent of its enrollment and half of those Hispanic students must be eligible for financial aid.

"Nearly half of the Hispanic college students in the nation attend these designated schools," Senator Bingaman said. "The schools are generally small and do not have the re-

sources of the large, wealthier universities that traditionally have fewer Hispanics. These grants will be used to improve the quality of education that many Hispanic students receive."

The schools may use the funds for any project that improves or expands their capacity to serve Hispanics and other low-income students. The measure also requires that the schools take action to help reduce Hispanic dropout rates, improve Hispanic rates of academic achievement and increase the rates at which Hispanic high school graduates enroll in higher education.

A Joint House-Senate Conference Committee will meet as early as mid-May to reconcile the differing Senate and House versions of the Higher Education Act. The resulting bill will reshape Federal higher education policy until the year 2000.

The All-Conquering Jalapeño

Is the United States in danger of losing its cultural-socio-political identity to 22 million Hispanic Americans? There are many who believe this to be true. They are wrong, and they are right.

That is, some Hispanic cultural and social traits will crowd out some tired, traditional American ways and social mores. Why? Because America always absorbs the best of every culture: Americans are cultural cherry pickers.

Music? Try Los Lobos and their distinctive contemporary East L. A. rock. Or try Linda Ronstadt's Spanish renditions of "Canciones de Mi Padre" (Songs of My Father). Try, also, Julio Iglesias for an international adventure.

Dance? Count the sold-out houses when Mexican folkloric troupes tour the United States. Count the Anglos who pay upward of \$35 to see traditional Mexican dances.

Work ethic? See the Census Bureau reports that note 82 percent of Mexican American males work, in contrast to only 74 percent of the rest of American males.

Food? Count the number of Mexican restaurants springing up around the country. Watch the sales of Mexican food products climb in America's supermarkets.

Language? Federal law requires bilingual education in school districts that have 20 or more students with a language other than English as their home language. Thus, millions of kids who enter school speaking Spanish only are supposed to be taught in Spanish and then switched to English.

This, however, is not happening, and when it does, it creates problems. Protests come from those who believe America is being hijacked by Spanish speakers. They confuse language with culture. In this, they are not alone.

Militant Mexican Americans, self-styled Chicanos, insist that the use of Spanish is a manifestation of their Mexican cultural background. In doing so, they give their detractors ammunition.

Let's see what such ill-informed militancy--on both sides of the question--can nurture. We have two examples, one Canadian and one Israeli.

Famed Canadian author Mordecai Richler writes in "Oh Canada! Oh Quebec! Requiem for a Divided Country" how he watched a middle-aged man photographing restaurant signs to turn in violators of Quebec's ban on English-language signs and menus. The man, Richler writes, is a "tongue trooper," a "self-appointed vigilante" who will turn in his "evidence" to Quebec's Commission for the Protection of French Language.

Sounds like U. S. English and other English-only organizations, doesn't it?

Other language restrictions in the province of Quebec are that indoor signs can have English on them as long as they have twice as many French words. Richler suggests that French be spoken twice as loud as English, as well. Additionally, Quebec is spending over half a million dollars on removing bilingual traffic signs and replacing them with French-only signs.

Does this sound like those Americans who object California's publishing traffic regulations and educational material in Spanish and some Asian languages?

Lastly, Richler describes how French-speaking hard-liners organized undercover language cops to enter department stores to see if clerks used English or French with their customers. If English, would the clerk turn "curt or disagreeable" when asked to speak French?

Does this remind anyone of English-only speakers who file complaints when employees of companies or government agencies speak Spanish in their presence? Are we destined to have language cops also?

Our other example comes from the democratic theocracy that is Israel and concerns one of the highest cultural contributions any group can make to a society--food.

Pizza has come to Israel. Rabbis in ultra-Orthodox towns and neighborhoods say pizza is dangerous, decadent and decidedly un-Jewish. This is according to Chicago Tribune writer Tom Hundley.

He quotes one rabbi as saying, "Pizza is goyish food. It will lead us to become like all goyim. It is cheap, not respectable and not nice to eat like that in public." Goyem, goy and goyish are Jewish-Yiddish terms for non-Jews.

They carry a disparaging meaning, much like "gringo" used to when used by Yanquibaiting Latin Americans.

Despite rabbinical opposition, pizza is hot. Ask Benny Farkash. When he opened his first shop in an Orthodox neighborhood, he sold over 1,000 pizzas in the first three days.

"It was crazy," Benny told reporters. "Two thousand people came to the opening. People got so excited they fainted."

What can we deduce from these experiences of our Canadian and Jewish friends? Smile when you speak Spanish around English-only speakers, and smile when you see burgeoning Mexican food sections in supermarkets.

And note that one more American cultural bastion has fallen to the onslaught of 22 million Hispanics. To wit: Salsa has just surpassed catsup in sales--in America.

Conquering the world with jalapenos, what a people we are.

Dear Sir:

In the recent school board elections, the question was, "Who are the leaders of the Hispanic and Black communities? Are they to be hand picked by the Anglo power elite, or will they be chosen from within the Black and Hispanic communities themselves?"

There can be no doubting the answer Black and Hispanic voters gave to that question: Linda DeLeon won by majorities between 85% and 90% against another decent and well-meaning Hispanic, but one whose candidacy from day one was sponsored and financed by the Southwest Lubbock power elite. The same was true in Mrs. Anderson's victory: the Black community gave a resounding "thumbs down" to a "leader" who had always danced to a tune played by people outside her community.

Lubbock is not Los Angeles. We do have some biracial political coalitions and co-operation between the various racial communities. But if the power brokers of the Anglo majority expect there to be a sense of unity, then they are going to have to give up once and for all the dream that they can choose who will speak for the Blacks and Hispanics. If they want any meaningful dialog with minorities, they will have to reconcile themselves that the Hispanic and Black communities, and ONLY those communities, will choose which leaders will represent them.

Our new mayor has promised to work with all groups in Lubbock; I have confidence that he will deal with the leaders that various racial and regional groups themselves have chosen. If we go in that direction, this city will finally get moving again after a long, long period of inaction, drift and discord.

Lubbock no es Los Angeles. Sí tenemos algunas coaliciones birraciales y un poco de cooperación entre las distintas comunidades raciales. Pero si los poderosos entre la mayoría anglo esperan una futura unidad en nuestra ciudad, van a tener que abandonar para siempre el sueño que son ellos, los blancos, que escogen a los líderes de las comunidades hispanas y negras. Si quieren dialogar con las minorías, tendrán que aceptar que los negros e hispanos, y sólo los negros e hispanos, son los que van a decidir quiénes son y serán sus líderes.

Nuestro nuevo alcalde (mayor) ha prometido trabajar con todos los grupos en Lubbock; espero que trate con los líderes escogidos por los mismos grupos étnicos y regionales. Si la ciudad va en esa dirección, volverá a avanzar después de un largísimo periodo de inacción y luchas políticas inútiles.

A Marriage Between Mexico and the U.S.

It is a marriage of convenience, and there is nothing wrong with that. Tying an "economic knot" between Mexico and the United States in a Free Trade Agreement allows us to continue enjoying the prosperity to which we have become accustomed. Staying single and being a protectionist country will not work.

A new world order is taking shape. Unless we marry our neighbors to the north and south, we will be overtaken by common markets of Europe and of Japan and Asia. Countries are teaming up in other parts of the world. They all seek the same thing: economic partners with whom to share jobs and products on preferential terms. By acting together, they can more readily assure their economic viability. At the same time they can flex their muscles against those countries that stay single.

Many of our communities have a lot at stake in this new world order. We will lose and where can we come out ahead?

U. S. companies can put plants wherever in the world they wish. They do it to stay alive. It works to our benefit if the plants go to Mexico, rather than Asia or other parts of the world. The more money Mexico has, the more comes back to

our pockets.

Mexico buys U. S. products. Last year alone, it imported over \$25 billion worth from the United States. It's our third best customer in the world.

In this time of recession and presidential election year, it is easy to complain about not wanting a Free Trade Agreement with Mexico because it might take away jobs. But labor-intensive U. S. plants are going to close down with or without a pact with Mexico. The competition will make sure of that.

What we need to protect is our investment in those plants in Mexico; we want to own them. That way, the wealth can be kept here. We can also keep the distribution, marketing, finance and many other jobs that are associated with the production in those plants.

The proposed Free Trade Agreement may cause job shifting, but that does not necessarily mean overall job loss.

Mexico wants our plants; we want access to more of its markets. The more Mexico opens its markets to our products, the more jobs are created here. That's why we do not want tariffs or export obstacles.

Nor do we want our investments in Mexico to face risk of discrimination or expropriation. For U. S. manufacturers

needing low-skill, cheap labor, the alternative may be Mexico or death. Why make it difficult for them? It is better that we have a treaty with Mexico that gives security to their investments down there.

Timing is important. We should not delay. We trust President Carlos Salinas de Gortarti, but his term ends in a couple of years. The politics of that country could easily revert to what it was before he took over. Before, Mexico did not even want to talk about a Free Trade Agreement. The politicians there did not want to disturb the status quo. They feared competition and investment by U. S. companies would mean an end to many Mexican businesses--that we would overpower them.

President Salinas de Gortari took a political risk by recognizing that free trade and integration was the only way out of Third World status. Miraculously, the public has followed his lead. Mexicans are betting on tomorrow. They know that

free trade means risking domination by outsiders during their transition from Third to First World status. But they see better products and prices coming from liberalized trade and foreign investment rules.

If we abandon President Salinas and his country, chaos may result. His policies may be reversed by old-line politicians. U. S. businesses investing there may pull out and take their plants elsewhere, but not necessarily bring them back here. There is Europe and there is Asia.

We are a country that is not used to losing. But we are at risk in the worldwide economic restructuring that is taking place. We need to think integration, not isolation.

We want partners who can add value to us. The best partners happen to be in the Western Hemisphere. These countries can support us by buying our products or by supplying us with Mexico and the rest of our Western Hemisphere represents our future.

For this election season, we should also start posting signs describing first aid for sufferers of Oh-no-they're-gonna-vote! The signs will have to go up in the offices of more than a few incumbent mayors, judges, even some congressmen.

"If you see any persons losing their minds because Latinos are going to vote them out of office," the wording will warn, "stay calm. Sit the victim down. Administer the local politicians' favorite beverage." (In Los Angeles, it's a Napa Zinfandel; in Florida, a screwdriver--easy on the O. J.; in Chicago, cheap bourbon.)

"Console the victim," the Oh-no-they're-gonna-vote poster will encourage. "Tell him or

her that, hey, maybe your district's gerrymandered boundaries will save your skin come election time. Or, maybe there's a future for you out of office--say, on the talk show circuit. You could rant about 'alien hordes taking real Americans' jobs' and 'minorities wanting special treatment' and then run for president!"

That's it. Tell them anything. Just don't tell them that when it comes to the Latino vote--the times they are a-changing.

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Oh No! They're Gonna Vote!

Damn, but change hurts. This is what I thought as I spoke with the mayor of a small Chicago-area suburb a couple of months ago.

I had volunteered to work at a U. S. citizenship workshop in the suburb in question one Saturday afternoon. The organizers had hoped that maybe 50 or so members of the local Mexican community would show up when--wham!--200 Latinos came through the doors to apply to become U. S. citizens. The mayor, who attended the workshop, was suddenly busy helping to fingerprint people.

The affair's organizers were set on getting non-citizens to naturalize in time to register and vote in the November '92 elections. (A reasonable chance: With a little luck, Chicago's INS office could get them through the process in six months or so.)

The mayor was not Latino. He had undoubtedly been elected by the community's dwindling, white ethnic population. He looked a little uncomfortable among the crowd of Latinos at the workshop, like somebody who got separated from his tour bus and didn't speak the local language.

After the hectic day, the mayor and I sat and ate carry-out fried chicken from card-

board boxes. As we talked, I explained to him that naturalization drives could swell the ranks of Latino voters. After all, a few million Latino immigrants nationwide are eligible for U. S. citizenship.

Then I realized I said something wrong. The mayor started twitching uncontrollably; his eyes grew wide.

At first, I thought that he was choking (Geez! How does that Heimlich maneuver go?) Then I wondered if the MSG in the fried chicken batter was short-circuiting the guy's nervous system. (My mind reeled: What's the antidote for that stuff?)

Finally, it hit me. This guy's got a re-election campaign

coming up and he's suffering from the "Oh-no-they're-gonna-vote!" syndrome!

On-no-they're-gonna-vote! hits like a thunderclap. It stuns its victims--usually incumbent non-Latinos--to the reality that the Latino community is about to head for the ballot box. You can spot the symptoms. The face goes red and the eyes bulge. Victims often start to babble that there's too much immigration.

By law, all Illinois restaurants must post signs explaining the use of the Heimlich maneuver to help a choking victim. Just wrap your arms around his or her gut, point the person in a safe direction and squeeze hard.

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

Mother and Daughter Nourishing 'American Traditions

Tradition. Do you remember that scene from "Fiddler on the Roof"? Tevye, the poor milkman, seemed to have the odds stacked against him as the modern world encroached upon his way of life. Yet, don't we all hand over without a battle the traditions our families have taken generations to create and embellish.

As a young adult, I often felt as if in the United States ours was a tradition of the malls, and our true national pastime, consumerism. It wasn't until I left this country for college that I realized what gives me pride in our culture is our freedom, our democracy, our equality. (We're still working on that last one but we have a good start.)

Yes, there's more to us "ugly Americans" than dollars. Our tradition also includes what can be described as quality time: time spent with family doing the things your parents did with you, and their parents did with them.

It has nothing to do with the best deal at department stores, or fast food, or TV, or cost-effectiveness.

It has everything to do with spending a whole day making tamales with your children the way your mother did with you. It's about spending the weekend on the hard ground of a campsite to show your kids the wonders of nature. It's making cookies from scratch.

It's doing anything together that takes more time, perhaps even more money, in a way that would never pass in the executive board room. Yet it has passed the test of time.

This definition of tradition came to me as I was enjoying the luxury of shopping alone one day at a fabric store. My mother may not have passed down a love of the kitchen, but we both have a craving for fine fabric. I was in ecstasy as I floated down the aisles touching this fabric, then that one. I actually caught myself

acknowledging my pleasure out loud as I'd turn down the aisle and find a whole new row of material.

Without my children around, losing themselves in games of hide-and-seek between the bolts, I had time to observe some customers. One teen-ager was collaborating with her mother on a new outfit. They found just the right material to match the pattern. They weren't arguing. Neither was cajoling. They were working together to create something.

A middle-aged couple--he in his cowboy hat, she armed with pattern in hand--were looking over the bridal fabrics. "I think she might look nice in this," the wife commented. Her husband watched in silence for a long time. Then, with his big, rough, weathered hands, he put together two delicate pieces of silk and brocade and asked his wife awkwardly, "How about this?"

I imagined him as his own great-great-grandfather, wading out of a dusty street into a dry-goods store to pick out a piece of calico for his wife, waiting at home on the ranch.

Why do people still sew? In this fast-paced life, where store prices could beat any savings we might make by doing it ourselves, what's the point?

When I got home that day, I showed my daughter the piece of pink, flowered material I had picked out just for her.

While she hugs it, there's no instant gratification. She can't put it on right away. But she can sit down on the floor next to me and cut out scrapes of material and sew on buttons as she creates doll dresses to the hum of the sewing machine.

Whatever it is that you remember doing with your family as a child, if you take the time to do it with your own children, you will be passing on love, and caring, and probably values, without even

knowing it.

That's what tradition is all about.
