How Uncle Sam Measures Snow

Following snows of this winter, when the depth of snowfall as measured at the Big Spring bureau of the U. S. weather service was published a number of people were of the opinion the measurement was incorrect.

The snow, as measured, "in the paper" was not "deep enough," John A. Cummings, superintendent of the bureau here, was asked to outline the methods used in computing depths of snowfall.

His statement follows: "The accurate measurement of the depth of snowfall is very difficult unless it is possible to make the measurements in a large open field.

"Even then it is necessary to make several measurements, discarding those that obviously are erroneous, and taking an average of those that seem nearest correct.

"On a small town lot the nearby buildings, fences and trees make an accurate reading of the snow impossible. Contrary to popular belief the snow drifts on the leeward instead of the windward side of an obstruction. Because of this the average person will, when he makes an attempt to measure the snowfall, select a place to the leeward of a fence or building and the resulting measurement is too great.

"The reason that snow piles up on the leeward side of an obstruction is easy to understand. If the wind is from the north, passing over a board fence running east and west, it will create an area of dead or calm air immediately to the south of the fence. As the snow is borne over the fence it settles into the spot of calm air and forms a slight drift.

"The average person will make his measurements in such a spot and this accounts for the fact that the official measurements are always less than those made by the 'man in the street.'

Tasty Christmas Eve Suppers For Santa's Hungry Helpers

After the children are tucked snugly into bed, the tree trimmed and all joyful tasks of Christmas Eve finished, is a pleasant time to sit down with family and guests and enjoy an informal, easily-prepared late evening supper. Most of the day has been busy with Christmas preparations and meals have been mere snatched bites. Now with everything finished there is time to rest, relax and enjoy Christmas Eve. These menus suggest the delightfully informal type of meal, suitable for such an occasion. You will find such suppers appeal to Santa Claus' hungry helpers!

Fried Oyster and Bacon Sandwiches
One pint large oysters; 2 beaten eggs; cracker or Rice Flake Crumbs; 1-2 pound bacon, sliced thin; 1-2 teaspoon salt; 1-2 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce; pepper; slices of buttered whole wheat bread; Dip oysters in beaten eggs, seasoned with salt, pepper and Worcestershire Sauce. Dip into cracker crumbs and fry in skillet in which bacon has been cooked, then removed. Fry oysters until crisp and golden brown. Place oysters and hot bacon between slices of buttered whole wheat bread and serve with Prepared Mustard or Chili Sauce.
Baked Apples Stuffed with Mince-meat
Six large red apples; 1 cup pure mince-meat; 1 cup sugar; 1-2 cup water. Core apples, removing all core, but do not cut through to other side of apples. Pierce with a fork in several places, and arrange apples in a shallow baking dish. Fill cavity of each with mince-meat and pour over them a syrup made by boiling together for six minutes, the sugar and water. Sprinkle apples with sugar and bake in a mediumly hot oven (400 degrees F.) until tender, basting often with the syrup.
